Astoria-Megler Bridge Discussed

Portland - (UPI) - Legislative Interim Highway committees from Oregon and Washington met here today to discuss a proposed Columbia River bridge between Astoria and Megler, Wash.

State Sen. Anthony Yturri, (R-Ore.), chairman of the Oregon committee, said the meeting was called to "see what can be done" on ironing out differences. Oregon proposed selling \$24 million in bonds to finance the bridge with Washington paying half the cost. The Washington Highway Department in subsequent talks suggested building the bridge on a 75-25 basis with Oregon bearing the larger share. Oregon held out for 50-50.

Oregon officials also have opposed each state paying for its own approach saying Oregon's would cost many times more than Washington's.

Driver Trapped In Wrecked Auto

Salem - (UPI) - A car plunged into Pringle Creek in the southeast section of Salem Sunday and the driver lay stunned and trapped for more than 30 minutes before being rescued by a passing motorist. Donald Turner, 36, Salem, suffered exposure and bruises. His condition today was described as good.

Turner's car failed to make a curve on Strong rd. and went into three feet of water. When the water began to enter the overturned car, Turner kicked some windows out.

Vienna, Austria - (UPI) - The official Soviet news agency Tass reported Sunday that Cuba and Communist Hungary will establish diplomatic relations in the immediate future.

Volunteer Fireman Light Ban Opposed

Corvallis - (UPI) - Mayor Gordon Harris said today he opposed enforcement of a ban on use of red lights on vehicles of volunteer firemen. It was announced in Salem last week that the ban would be enforced.

Harris said the law, which has been on the books for some time but has not been enforced, is "going too far." He said volunteers were giving their time freely to the safety of the community and deserved the protection of the lights while hurrying to a fire.

Selassie Offers To Forgive Rebels If 'Error' Admitted

London - (UPI) - Emperor Haile Selassie, once again firmly enthroned in Ethiopia, showed a forgiving nature today and offered not to punish any of the rebels who tried to overthrow him if they admit their "error," according to reports received here.

Bloodshed Terrific - Although fewer than 1,000 persons were believed involved in the three-day revolt which occurred while Selassie was out of the country last week, travelers reaching Aden and Cairo said the bloodshed was terrific.

They estimated the death toll at more than 1,000. Other reports, not confirmed, said as many as 2,000 to 7,000 may have died.

An American technician in the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa was reported to have suffered leg wounds from rifle fire. His name was not immediately available. Leaders in Prison - Most of the insurgent leaders were reported killed or in prison. An undetermined number of rebels and loyalists were reported killed in a battle in the royal throne room Friday.

Ethiopian airlines resumed operations and began ferrying rations and medicines into the capital.
