

MH Black Tornado Grapplers Win Clackamas Invitational

Medford High school's wrestling team was the class of the Clackamas invitational tournament on Saturday.

The Black Tornado won six championships, took five runner-up spots, gained three thirds and three fourths to win the tourney with 166 points.

Host Clackamas was second with five titles in the 13 divisions and 98 points. Milwaukie grapplers took two crowns. Points for Milwaukie, Oregon City and Tillamook were not listed.

John dePlace, Wayne Fields, Al Funston, Doug Robertson, Chuck Shaw and Monte Jones took individual honors in their weights. Funston and Shaw beat teammates Chuck Holt and Terry O'Sullivan, respectively in the finals.

Funston won four matches

all by falls in the first round. Larry Gunn, Medford, took matches by first round pins and lost in the titular scrap 7 to 5 in overtime. DePlace pinned all three of his rivals. Jones took two matches by falls, one over a 316-pound foe.

Shaw scored pins in three matches, one in 12 seconds in the opening round. O'Sullivan allied won first round pins before losing to Shaw.

Tornados took 27 matches by pins and 20 by decision. They lost only four on falls and 17 by decision.

Seal Owner Fagan Dies

Hillsborough, Calif. - (UPI) - Paul I. Fagan, the man who brought class to minor league baseball in a manner never seen before or since, died Sunday at the age of 70.

Fagan was a multimillionaire and he played his part to the hilt when he decided in 1945 to go into baseball, a game to which he hadn't paid much attention previously.

He started by paying \$250,000 for a one-third interest in the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League, a big money-maker in those days. Soon afterward he bought another third, and eventually he gained complete ownership.

Thus started a nine-year reign remembered as one of the most startling in baseball history.

Redmond Defeats EP

Crater had 47 to 42 edge in retrieving the ball from the backboards. Dennis Edwards collected 13 rebounds for the Comets and Jeff Anhorn 11. Stan Traxler and Bill Chandler had nine retrieves each for the Pirates. Edwards, troubled by an ailing back, was able to cash in for just one field goal.

The Comets hit 18 of 85 from the field, a 21.7 average and 16 of 34 from the gift line for 47.1. Marshfield, capitalizing on one and one free opportunities while Crater couldn't, put in 29 of 45 charity tosses.

Pittsburgh Nabs Titles In Hitting

Cincinnati - (UPI) - Pitching is supposed to be 75 per cent of baseball, but the Pittsburgh Pirates won the National league pennant practically on hitting alone.

That's what the official batting averages, released at league headquarters here, indicated today, anyway.

Led by shortstop Dick Groat, who won the league's batting crown with a .325 average, the Pirates swept virtually every title in the hitting department.

They paced the league in team batting with .276 as compared with .265 compiled by the runner up Milwaukee Braves, and also led in runs batted in 689; hits 1,493; total bases 2,201; doubles 236, and runs scored 734.

The only important department in which the Pirates were not first was home runs. The Braves were high with 170. The Pirates hit 120.

Outside of Groat and Larcker, only three other regulars managed to hit 300. Willie Mays of San Francisco was third with 319. Roberto Clement of the Pirates fourth with 314 and Ken Boyer of St. Louis fifth with 304.

Banks Homer Leader
 Shortstop Ernie Banks of Chicago led in home runs with 41, and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee drove in the most runs, 126, and hit for the most total bases, 334. It was the fourth straight year that Aaron finished first in total bases.

Mays' 190 hits were tops in that department.

SE Axemen Outgun Medford's Cagers

A hot, stubborn-guarding South Eugene high basketball aggregation romped 59 to 40 over cold Medford at Eugene Saturday night to divide a week end series with the defending Oregon Class A - 1 champs.

It was the second win in four games for the SE Axemen and the first setback in four conflicts for the Tornado.

While firing at the hoop at a torrid 47.7 pace, South Eugene jammed the area close to the basket. Medford couldn't find the range from outside to unchoke this stiff defense and had trouble on shots that were obtained within close range.

The Tornado, with tall veteran Bob Quinney seeing only 12 minutes of duty because of a badly cut tongue suffered the night before, made only nine field buckets in 52 tries for 17.3 average. Medford hoopmen were limited to two field goals each in the first three quarters and made three in the final quarter.

South had quarter spans of 20 to 7, 31 to 11 and 47 to 19. Axemen led in the final canto to be once 33 points at 53 to 20. The Tornadoes picked up 21 of their points, more than half the total, in the final stanza with the aid of 15 gift markers. Howard Brown, Medford high man for the night with 11 points, got eight in the fourth session when he plunked six free tosses.

Bo Blair with 21 counters and Dave Tobey and Don DuShane with 13 each were the big guns for the Axemen who collected 21 field goals in 44 shots.

Personal fouls in the early part of the fracas hampered the Medfordites.

Medford's Quinney had only limited duty because of lack of sleep and inability to eat after the injury. He was struck on the head by an elbow in the Friday night en-
