100th Birthday Celebrated By Former Resident

Eagle Point - Mrs. Mabel Kingery has returned to her home after a trip to Santa Clara, Calif., to be with her father, James Daniel Culbertson, on his 100th birthday anniversary.

Mr. Culbertson, who came west as a small boy, lived in Jackson county from 1870 until 1950, when he went to Santa Clara to make his home with a son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Otto Dalkey.

The centenarian was born December 8, 1860, in Missouri. With his family, he traveled to San Francisco in 1870 by train, and from that city they went by boat, "The Big America" to Astoria. Mr. Culbertson recalls that the ship sank on the next trip.

From Astoria the family traveled to Portland and Salem by wagon and team, and from there to southern Oregon where his mother filed on a homestead near the area which is now Medford.

In 1885 he was married to Cora Swingle, daughter of Joseph Swingle, pioneer settler who had migrated to California in 1849 during the gold rush days. The couple moved to a ranch at Lake Creek in 1886, where they lived for 41 years. In 1927, the Culbertsons moved to Central Point where they made their home until Mrs. Culbertson's death in 1949.

Six of Mr. Culbertson's seven children are living, and he has 14 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren. One of his sons, Cecil Culbertson, lives in the Applegate area.

Raw Apples Used For Quick Pudding

This apple pudding is quick and delicious. Use 1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup shortening, 1 egg, 2 cups apples, diced raw, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and dash salt. Cream shortening and sugar together, add egg. Sift dry ingredients and add to the first mixture, stirring well. Lastly add the apple and chopped nuts. Pour into square cake pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Serve warm with whipped or ice cream. Serves 8.

Safeguard Good China Is Warning

Corvallis-When holiday entertaining brings "company" china to the table, safeguard it by observing a few precautions before putting it in a dishwasher, says Miss Bernice Strawn, Oregon State college extension home management specialist.

Although dishwashers are a boon to housekeeping, some treasured silver and china may fade from heat and detergents used in the dishwasher, she cautions.

Underglazed plain and patterned china, which makes up most of today's tableware, can be washed in the dishwasher without worry of fading. The glaze protects the colors. Some overglazed china also can be washed safely in the dishwasher. But to be safe and sure, wash by hand or test run one small piece in the machine, advises the specialist. Gold or platinum edged trim is usually applied over the glaze and may fade in the washer.

Miss Strawn recommends that hand-painted china be washed by hand. These pieces have not been heat treated so the pattern fades.

Sterling, plated silverware and stainless steel flatware may be washed satisfactorily in a dishwasher. However, some silver knife handles are attached with cements which loosen in hot water. These should not be machine washed. If in doubt, hand wash.

Wash wooden salad bowls by hand. Unless sure of the type of plastic, play it safe and hand wash plastic dishes, advises the home economist.

For most purposes, hostesses find they can machine wash almost all dishes and utensils in daily use. Miss Strawn reports recent research which shows that a dishwasher saves 37 minutes a day on an average or slightly more than four hours a week.

Installation of the new officers will take place in February during a visit of the grand gila monster, Mrs. Margaret Holt, Monmouth, Ore.

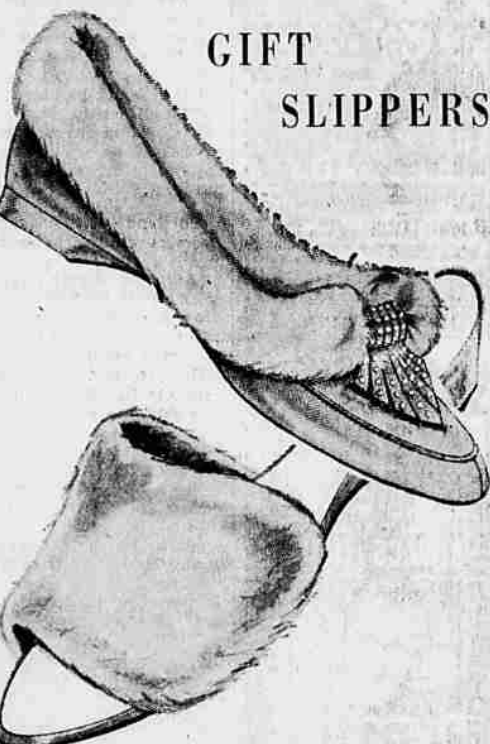
Samuel Porters Gold Hill Visitors
