Ashland Seeks More TID Water

Ashland—Ashland City Superintendent Elmer Biegel reported results of a meeting he and Harry Skerry, city attorney, had with officials of the Talent Irrigation district at the city council meeting Tuesday night.

Biegel said the meeting was held to discuss the terms and charges for acquiring additional water for Ashland from the district. Biegel said no agreement was reached at the meeting. However, he said that negotiations will be continued. Presently the city has a contract with the district for 769 acre feet of water each year. At the meeting, Biegel presented a plan for an additional 795 acre feet.

The council voted to install traffic signs and flasher signals at Walker ave. on the corners of Highways 99 and 66. The state will furnishing the signs and signals and the city will finance maintenance and installation.

Winter Starts Officially Today

Winter is here. Despite indications around the valley of earlier arrival, the new season did not begin until this afternoon. Winter officially was heralded at 12:27 p.m. Today is also the shortest day of 1960. Sunrise came at 7:36 a. m. and sunset was due at 4:41 p. m., giving this area nine hours and 5 minutes of daylight today.

Christmas Tree Lift Is Planned

The annual Moose Christmas tree lift sponsored by the Medford Moose lodge will be held Jan. 2 with the slogan "Help Keep Sacred Heart Hospital Open." Lodge members have announced.

Proceeds from the lift will be donated to Sacred Heart hospital, they said. The Moose lodge will organize and direct the drive with the cooperation of car dealers, who loan pickup trucks to be used to collect trees throughout the city. City Sanitary Service company will provide trucks at collection points in parts of the city, members said.

Moose lodge officials said that checks may be made payable to either Sacred Heart hospital, or the Moose lodge, and attached to the tree. The tree, they said, should be left on the front porch of the house, in order to protect the donation from being picked up by vandals. The drive will end with a Christmas tree burning near Medford. Location of the burn will be announced later. The public is invited to the burning.

Little Success Is Noted in Project

"Little success" was reported in a Tuesday morning attempt to clear the fog at the Medford municipal airport, Norman Croy, city purchasing agent, who is in charge of the project, said today. A balloon carrying dry ice in a perforated bag was sent aloft about 10:20 a.m., he said, and a little snow was reported between 10:45 and 11:15 a.m. Croy said that an attempt to clear the fog from the runway was not made today since the temperature must be 32 degrees or lower to be effective. He added that conditions have to be "just right" before snow will form and the fog dissipate. Each test uses approximately \$1 worth of dry ice, Croy said.
