

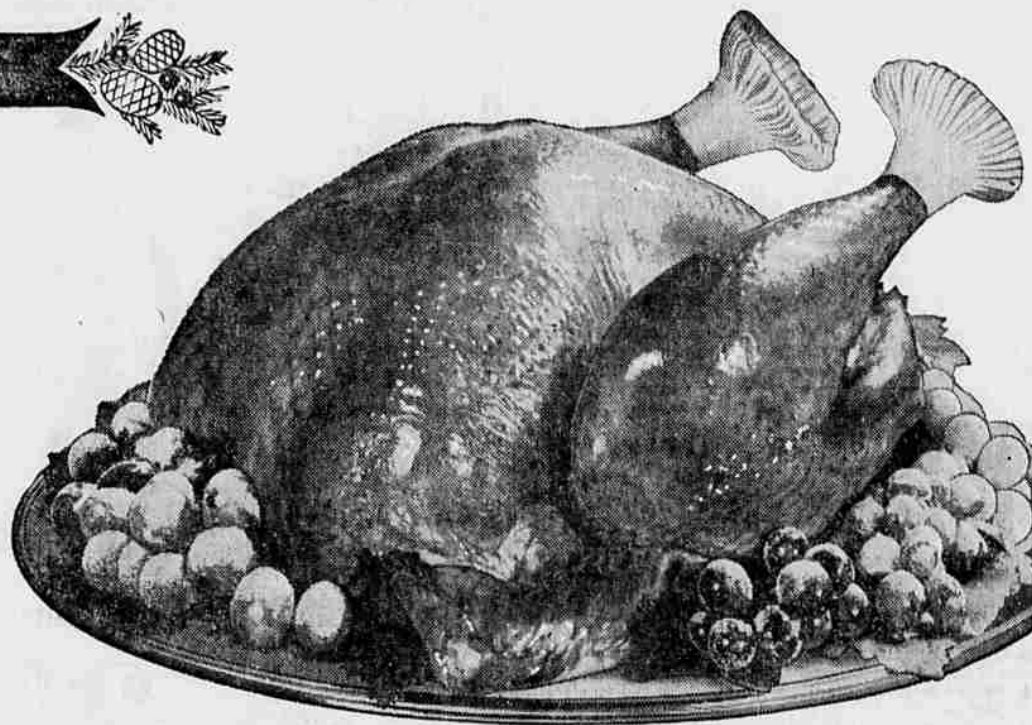

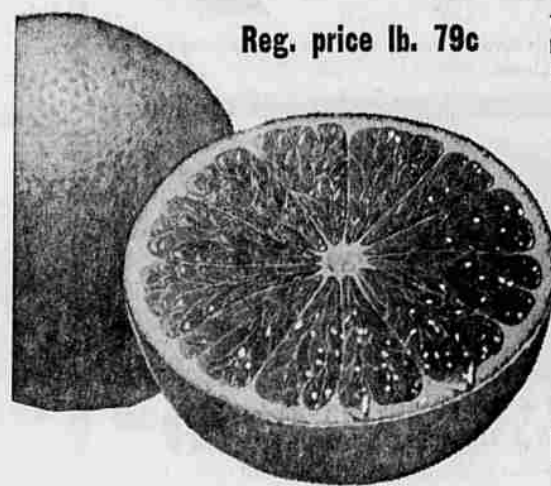

Pilgrims Gather In Field To Hear Bethlehem Bells

Jerusalem—UPI—In the open fields south of this city pilgrims gather every Christmas morning to listen for the far-off bells of Bethlehem.

They congregate before dawn to sing, pray and meditate. In one glance they can see the entire landscape which Jesus knew so well—the little town where he was born and the city where he died.

In the mists of dawn they see the rooftops of the birth town, now owned by Jordan, which has been in an official state of war with Israel since 1947. Pilgrims can go there only by making applications which must be approved by both governments.

But in the open fields on the Israeli side of the border, as the sun rises higher in the eastern sky, little groups strain their ears to catch the sound of bells from the Church of the Nativity down in Bethlehem.

Throughout the Israeli and the Jordanian sides of the Holy Land many special services are held on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Americans living here have an advantage over many others because they can see day-by-day all the places where Jesus lived.

Cross Border
They can attend Mass in Nazareth where He prayed and stroll the streets where He spent his youth. They can go freely across the border, closed to people of both sides, and spend the holy night in the grotto where He was born.

The busiest man in Jerusalem on Christmas probably will be Herbert L. Minard, director of the YMCA, the most popular and by far the best-equipped club in the Israeli capital.

Minard, who comes from Sacramento, Calif., and his wife, Marcella, from Fresno, Calif., will be too busy on Christmas day to go to Bethlehem.

Celebrations at the "Y" go on for a whole week. There will be a party for some 400 children of all Christian religions, a Christmas Eve carol service and many other activities.

At midnight the carillon will ring out from the top of the 152-foot Jesus Tower. The day after Christmas there will be a dinner for 100 guests.

With all their preparations completed, Mr. and Mrs. Minard usually steal away late on Christmas Eve and leave the city for a plateau amid the Judean hills, a mile from Bethlehem.

Open-air Service
There in the Field of the Shepherds a brief open-air service is held at dusk in the crisp winter air.

Worshippers utter a few words of welcome for the star over Bethlehem and thanks for the quiet of the Holy Land.

They eat Oriental-style roast lamb and pitta bread, just as did those shepherds more than 1,900 years ago, when the news came to them that a miracle had been wrought and the Savior was born.

Federal Court Judges Block Louisiana Move
New Orleans—UPI—A three-judge federal court Wednesday handed down a far-reaching ruling to block Louisiana's attempt to grab control of the New Orleans schools and bring integration to a halt.

The court, in a many-faceted ruling, enjoined the state from:

—Trying for the fifth time to unseat the New Orleans School Board.

—Appointing the state attorney general to replace the school board attorney.

It ordered:

—New Orleans banks must honor any checks the school board may write so long as it has enough money on deposit to cover them.

—The city of New Orleans must turn over to the school board immediately the taxes it has collected but held in escrow.

The court said, in effect, that it will also restrain any further segregation legislation the diehard Louisiana legislature may come up with.

In a separate action, the court told three top state officials, including the lieutenant governor, to appear Dec. 13 to show cause why they shouldn't be held in contempt for trying to interfere with integration.
