Traffic in State Shows Increase in October This Year

Oregon highway traffic showed a statewide increase of 2 per cent in October, 1980, over October, 1979, according to figures compiled from the state highway department's 82 rural counters. Several Jackson county highways showed an even greater increase.

While counters in Oregon's five largest cities showed a general city traffic increase of 3 per cent, a counter at the corner of Main and Geneva sts., in Medford, showed a traffic increase of 4.5 per cent. During October, 1980, there were 10,625 cars recorded at the corner, compared to 10,166 cars in October, 1979.

A rural traffic counter on Oregon Highway 66, five miles east of Ashland, showed a 29.5 per cent traffic increase when comparing the two Octobers. In October of this year there were 1,539 cars recorded, compared to 1,204 cars in October, 1979.

At Ruch on Highway 228, traffic increased 15.7 per cent from 517 cars to 598 cars. At Talent on Highway 99, traffic increased 18.3 per cent from 7,929 cars to 9,380 cars.

The only decrease in traffic recorded in the county was on Highway 62, four miles south of Shady Cove. Traffic dropped 6.5 per cent from 1,951 to 1,806.

Hourly counters reports showed heaviest traffic statewide was between the hours of 4 and 5 p.m. Oregon gasoline consumption during September, 1980, was down 5.25 per cent, as compared with the same period in 1979, in spite of a rural traffic increase of 6 per cent for the same month.

MacArthur Cites Victory Failure

New York—(UPI)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur said Thursday night that failure to win the Korean war was a major disaster for the free world.

"It is the most basic principle of statecraft that a great nation which voluntarily enters upon war and does not see it through to victory must ultimately suffer all the consequences of defeat," MacArthur said.

"These fatal consequences are now increasingly being felt in the military rise of Red China. It even now threatens all of continental Asia and bids fair to tip the balance of international power."
