Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, three editors and a women's editor. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Hugh M. — I wish I could make my mother see what a pet means to me.

Mrs. C. M. — It's not fair to keep an animal caged in an apartment.

Hugh M. — I'm 11 years old and live in a fancy three-room apartment in New York with my parents. I sleep in the bedroom and my father and mother use a convertible bed in the living room.

We moved to the city a few months ago. Before that we lived on Long Island and I had four pets — a dog named Puffy, a turtle, a parakeet and a lizard. When Puffy died, I wanted a new dog but my parents said no because we were going to move soon. When we were packing, I set the lizard and the turtle free, and I gave my bird away. My mother said there was no room.

I miss my pets. I haven't any friends in the neighborhood. The kids around here go to private schools. I would even settle for a kitten or a few puppies. But Mom says apartments and pets don't go together.

Mrs. C. M. — No one has to tell me how much Hughie loves dumb creatures! He once brought home a caterpillar and said, "Now I have a pet." But it died an hour later. I think he'd be happy with a fly or even an ant.

But now he is in a tiny apartment and the big city. We couldn't find any other quarters that would be within our means and still near enough to my husband's work. He's doing research and works long, irregular hours.

I thought Hughie could find new interests, make lots of new friends and forget about pets in the home. He doesn't realize it takes more than love and a few chores, to keep a puppy well and happy. Incidentally, he used to leave many of the chores to me. Here in town there'd be even more work, and I'm too busy to add that to my duties.

Maybe in spring he'll be satisfied helping with the school garden.

The Council: Here is an only child, relatively friendless in a new environment, and longing for that touch of nature that "makes the whole world akin."

Surely there are apartment-size pets Mrs. M. can consider for filling Hugh's need to love something in the animal kingdom! We've heard that hamsters are highly recommended for small care, big fun. Also, canaries and kittens.

The finger here is on Mr. and Mrs. M. Naturally, despite Hugh's enthusiasm and promises to take "full care" of his charges, his parents must be prepared to take up the slack. This, rather than the "inhumaneness" of confining creatures indoors, may be the main objection of Mrs. M. to providing Hugh with a pet. But, for a shy, lonely child, this is as important as his vitamins and galoshes. Part of caring for Hugh will be helping him care for the quiet companions that he can love

and can feel loved by.

As a first step, however, we'd suggest that Mrs. M. speak to Hugh's teacher about the problem, and offer to present a tank of goldfish to the class. Hugh might be in charge, with a rotating committee of assistants. Besides giving him some pets and a responsibility for them, this would serve as a powerful wedge toward new friendships and increased stature for Hugh among his peers.

Parents have gone to unbelievable extremes to foster this type of tenderness and interest in their children. We read the other day of a father who bought his daughter a 6-foot snake as a house pet, because she was allergic to the fur of other creatures.

We're rooting for Hugh — even if he winds up with nothing more than a trained flea.

It was suggested here just before Christmas that an Oriental gong would be an excellent gift for the man who had everything.

Dick Van Osten, of Beverly Hills, writes that he once knew a man who owned such a gong.

This, Van Osten writes, was in the pre-beatnik age. His friend lived in Santa Monica Canyon above the Pacific. He was not beat. Maybe he was odd. He had a Biblical white beard, a crew cut and eyes the color of blue butterfly wings.

He was a puzzling and formidable man, but fascinating. He had a sense of humor that was delightful, but it sometimes looked unnerving. It lay in wait for the innocent like a playful dragon.

His house was hidden in the primeval brush 100 feet above the road. The craggy path broke into three forks, variously marked by lamp-lit signs "To the Witch's Cottage," "To Sleeping Beauty's Castle," "To the Dragons Den." In reality they led to the back door, the front door and the garage.

If a visitor took either side path he would be led smack into a sign reading "You Have Fallen into Sticky Bog. Lose One Turn."

But the arduous climb and the forked path merely set the scene. Van Osten recalls, for what his friend considered his masterpiece — the Gong.

The gong was 5 feet in diameter and made of bell metal. "When struck, however lightly, it seemed to come alive."

"The gong had been mounted in the traditional manner to allow full freedom for its incredible voice and resonance."

It was fitted with hammers that struck it dead center and were ingeniously wired to the doorbell circuit.

"Even the gentlest caress of the doorbell became an electrifying experience. The gong boomed out with the terrifying, almost painful sound only a large gong or temple bell can make."

"The host's arrival at the door, opened slowly on squeaking hinges, disenchanted all but the most determined. After dark the effect burst into full bloom with the aid of a spotlight focused to light only his face."

In time, of course, the canyon was invaded and subdued by suburbanites who imposed their own culture on the natives. Our hero vanished from the scene.

"It might be reported that eventually he found his way to a worldless retreat or met a violent, faceless end in the Orient," Van Osten concludes. "I suppose it all should end like that, Mr. Smith. But it didn't."

"He let his hair grow, shaved his beard, bought new clothes, moved out of the canyon, married a charming girl, has a couple of almost-grown children and is a much-respected member of his community."

"He still has his gong."

Much surely is to be said for domestic respectability, the warm hearth, the love of one's neighbors, the happy gabble of one's plump grandchildren.

But sometimes, perhaps on foggy nights, after the late, late show, our friend must hanker to hear again that unearthly tocsin, and to open his door and peer once more with eyes like butterfly wings into the gaping face of a stranger who has just been transfixed by the incredible voice of that 5-foot gong.

I suppose he is too brittle and entrenched now to risk it.

Siskiyou Crashes Snuff Two Lives

Yreka, Calif. — Two youths were killed in separate auto accidents in Siskiyou county over the Christmas week end.

Highway patrolmen said Paul Ernest Collins, 21, Fort Jones, died when his car missed a turn on Salmon river rd. and plunged over an embankment about 10:30 p.m. Saturday. Ronda Lee Cummins, 16, Fort Jones, suffered minor injuries.

The other accident occurred a half mile south of the Klamath river bridge at 5:50 a.m. Saturday. Patrolmen said Russel Brian Rose, 23, Del Monte, Calif., was killed when his car went over an embankment. Daniel Lee Harvey, 17, Tacoma, a sailor stationed at China Lake, was treated at a hospital for injuries.

Man Voluntarily Returns to Jail

Los Angeles — An admitted bank robber voluntarily returned to jail Tuesday following a Christmas holiday at home with his family.

Haas T. Zeghabe, 35, was released from jail Dec. 19 without bail when his 11-year-old daughter Nadya wrote Federal Judge Thurmond Clarke pleading that Zeghabe be allowed to visit home at Christmas.

"I am most appreciative that you honored the trust and confidence I placed in you," said Clarke when Zeghabe surrendered to await sentencing Jan. 9.

Zeghabe was held in lieu of \$20,000 bail set for the \$400 robbery of a Los Angeles bank. He has no previous arrest record.

Eggnog Excitement

Perfect accompaniment for oggog is said to be thinly sliced fruit cake and salted almonds. The eggnog can be the kind your milkman leaves on special order, can be picked up at the super market's dairy section, or made in your own kitchen like this:

Beat four egg whites to a dry froth. Into the egg whites, beat four tablespoons powdered sugar and then the beaten egg yolks combined with four tablespoons brandy or rum. Add three cups milk and a slight grating of nutmeg. Serve at once, plain or topped with whipped cream or egg-white meringue.

Eggnog Magic. Customarily, one sprinkles eggnog with bit of nutmeg but if you want something different and certain to excite comment, do this: Sieve pulp of a fresh pomegranate to extract the juice. Float juice on top of each drink.

Holiday Punch

This Holiday Punch for a crowd is quick to make and simply delicious to drink. A sophisticated California wine combines California wine with fruit punch concentrates and other fruit beverage combinations. Your guests will delight in its lovely color and mellow flavor. Easily, quickly made. About 30 servings.

Have all ingredients well chilled. Combine one four-fifth quart bottle California Sauterne, Rose or Burgundy, two six-ounce cans frozen concentrate for raspberry-lemon punch, two six-ounce cans frozen concentrate for pineapple-lemon punch, one 3c ounce can pineapple juice, one pint bottle cranberry juice cocktail and two cups water. Pour over ice in large punch bowl; stir until well blended.

Add two quarts ginger ale or sparkling water just before serving in punch glasses.

Spiced Cream

For a fine flavor garnish, top holiday pies or cakes with gingered whipped cream made by adding one-quarter teaspoon ginger to one-half cup of whipping cream.

Have Happier Holidays

Holiday season breakfasts deserve glamorizing and breakfasts throughout the year deserve more attention. Let your waffle baker and pancake griddle work overtime for family fun, good nutrition, simple but satisfying meals.

Sauces Waffles

Use any flavored waffle and pancake mix or follow this simple recipe; then ladle the orange and prune sauce from chafing dish or bowl.

Sift two cups cake flour once; measure to get two cups sifted. Add two tablespoons baking powder and three-quarter teaspoon salt and sift again. Combine two well-beaten eggs and one cup milk. Add to flour mixture; add five tablespoons melted shortening, then mix only until smooth. Do not beat. Bake in hot waffle baker. Serve hot with butter and this sauce.

Orange-Prune Sauce. Combine half a cup maple-blended syrup and one-half cup diced orange sections, one-quarter cup cooked pitted and quartered prunes and bring to simmer.
