Solomon, Cisneros On NAIA Star Team

Kansas City, Mo. (UPI)—The 1960 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) All-America football team features an offensive unit with a 215-pound line and a backfield averaging 198 pounds.

There are 10 seniors and one sophomore on the No. 1 offensive unit. Drew Roberts of Humboldt (Calif.) State, the lone sophomore, set an NAIA record this season by

catching 75 passes and was named the outstanding lineman of the Holiday Bowl game at St. Petersburg, Fla. Others on team:

Line Averages 228

The No. 1 defensive unit has a line averaging 228 pounds and a backfield averaging 184 pounds, led by 6-foot 3-inch, 270-pound tackle Ray Jacobs from Howard Payne (Tex.) college.

Others named to the defensive first team are ends Dick Lage, Lenoir Rhyne, and Ed Becker, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) State; tackle Bruno Raso, Slippery Rock (Pa.) State; guards Marv Cisneros, Willamette, and Frank Cornelius, Lenoir Rhyne (N.C.) college; linebackers Sal Slind, Humboldt State, and Powell McClellan, Arkansas Tech; and backs Jim Pribula, West Chester (Pa.) Teachers, Mike Cutchan, Colorado Mines, and Elbert Harris, Southeast Louisiana.

Moore, Brooks Take Over Lead In Holiday Golf

Paul Moore and Bud Brooks won five points from Forrest Casey and Ford Hagan last week to move into first place in the holiday golf handicap tournament at Rogue Valley Country club.

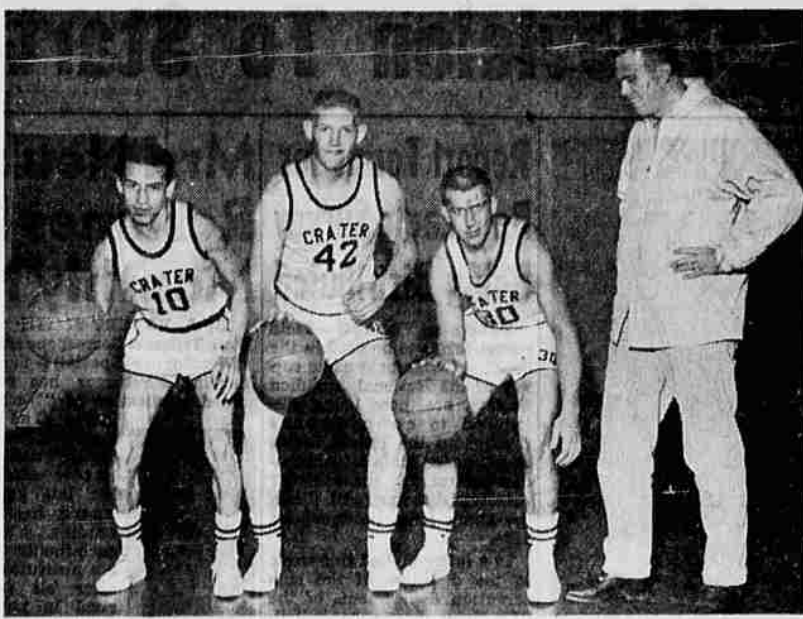

Crater, Medford Vie Thursday In Conference Hoop Skirmish

Crater High school's Comet play hosts Thursday night to the defending champions as the new Southern Oregon conference basketball season gets underway.

Medford and Crater meet at Central Point at 8:15 p.m. in one of two loop inaugurations. Grants Pass goes to Ashland for the other.

Friday night tangles also are slated as the loop gets off to an unusual December start. Medford will entertain Crater on Friday while Crater journeys to oppose Klamath Falls, the team rated No. 1 in the state and the pre-season favorite to garner loop laurels.

Sophomore and junior varsity conflicts are to precede the varsity skirmishes. Klamath Unmarried

Klamath Falls will enter circuit play with an unblemished record. The Pelicans (6-0) hold twin triumphs over Roseburg, Springfield and Bend. Medford is 5-1 for the season with victories over Marshfield and North Bend, a split with South Eugene and a pair of decisions over Tillamook.

Crater stands 3-3. It defeated Eagle Point once and Stayton twice and has lost twice to Marshfield and once to Myrtle Point. Record for Grants Pass is 2-4. The Cave-men downed Yreka and Del Norte then lost to Marshfield, and North Bend and twice to Roseburg.

Ashland is 0-6 for the pre-season. Seabucks were at the hands of Eureka, Arcata and Shasta high (2) and Douglas (2).

Medford will carry a 57.6 points per game scoring average and a 37.5 field goaling mark into its conference opener. The Tornado has piled up 346 points in its six games to rivals' 260. Rivals have a 43.3 average.

Bob Quincey, who saw little action in one of the six

games, heads Medford in scoring with 85 points. Edwards has put in 61 and Alvarez 46. Edwards has 83 rebounds. Crater entering Medford high at Central Point Thursday night in the Southern Oregon loop starter for both clubs. Edwards duty may be limited by an ailing Hoffine. Higginbotham leads the club in back.

Crater has put in 315 points, averaging 52.5, to opponents 314 and has shot at a .337 rate from the field. Loyal Higginbotham heads with 85 points and Dennis Edwards has 61.

Edwards has been a power under the backboards with 83 rebounds. However, the rugged 6-3 players may see little, if any duty, against this week's foes. An ailing back forced Edwards out of the Myrtle Point mix in the fourth quarter last week.

The trouble has not been diagnosed for certain but is thought to be a pulled muscle. Edwards has a doctor's appointment tomorrow. He has been out for practice this week but his pivot duties could go to Jim Allen.

Ohio State Roms In Holiday Tiff

The boys in the Big Town were wondering today — if Jerry Lucas of Ohio State can play that well when he's ill, what'll he do when he's feeling better?

They should find out Thursday night when top-ranked Ohio State plays St. John's of New York, the nation's No. 3 team, in the semi-finals of the Holiday Basketball festival at Madison Square Garden.

Ohio State and St. John's were two among seven of the teams in this week's top 10 which won Tuesday night as the holiday tournament season moved into full swing. There was scarcely an upset

on the program. The other winners were Bradley (ranked second), St. Bonaventure (5th), St. Louis (6th), Detroit (8th) and Louisville (9th).

All-America Lucas, complaining of a sore throat and slight fever, scored only 16 points during a 27-minute performance Tuesday night, but it was enough to start Ohio State off to a 97-57 romp against Seton Hall. Utah, ranked 18th, defeated Pennsylvania, 72-60, in the first game of the evening doubleheader.

In the afternoon, St. John's knocked Providence College from the unbeaten ranks, 76-54, and St. Bonaventure whipped St. Joseph's (Pa.), 83-70.

Kansas (ranked 13th) and Iowa State advanced to the semifinals of the Big Eight Tournament at Kansas City. The Jayhawks trounced Nebraska, 78-53, and Iowa State eliminated Missouri, 72-68.

Kansas meets Oklahoma tonight and Kansas State (ranked 12th) plays Iowa State, the tourney defending champion. Oklahoma and K-State advanced Monday night.

Detroit Beats Yale
Detroit, host team in the Motor City tournament, easily

reached tonight's final with a 83-67 victory over Yale. The Titans' final-round opponent will be Colorado State, which defeated Xavier of Ohio, 71-67.

In the All-College tournament at Oklahoma City, New York University and Baylor qualified for Thursday's semifinals. NYU spurted in the last four minutes to defeat Tulsa, 70-61, and Baylor beat Oklahoma City University, 73-63.

All-America Terry Dischinger's 32 points led Purdue to a 78-58 victory over Notre Dame in the first round of the Hoosier classic at Indianapolis and Butler rallied to upset Illinois, 70-68, in the other game. Purdue and Butler meet tonight for the championship.

Bradley Has Scare
Penn State and Denver eliminated their small college rivals in the opening of the two-day Evansville (Ind.) Holiday tournament. Penn State edged the host Evansville team, 75-74, on a pair of last-minute free throws by Jake Trueblood and Denver beat Los Angeles State, 78-74. The winners meet tonight for the title.

Bradley, ranked second behind Ohio State, had a scare before it defeated Drake, 83-77, in an overtime game at Des Moines. Chet Walker scored nine points in the overtime period to clinch the Braves' 9th straight victory.

St. Louis university romped over Southern Methodist, 74-50; Louisville breezed to its 10th straight victory, 95-67 over Brigham Young, and De Paul won its 6th game without a loss by beating Miami of Ohio, 72-70.

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
