AAU Trophy Awarded To Johnson

New York - (UPI) - Rafer Johnson, victorious in the grueling Olympic decathlon and considered a model of American youth, has added the highly prized James E. Sullivan Amateur Athletic Union Memorial trophy to his collection of honors.

Wilma Rudolph and Jeff Farrell, who also gained fame as personalities and athletes during the Olympic Games, were second and third in the 1960 balloting by a nationwide tribunal of sports authorities.

The award, named in memory of James E. Sullivan, a founder of the AAU, is presented annually by that organization to "the amateur athlete who, by performance, example and good influence did most to advance the cause of good sportsmanship during the year."

Johnson scored a narrow victory in the Olympics over his close friend and UCLA classmate, C. K. Yang of Formosa, with a record total of 8,392 points for the world games. Earlier, at the Olympic trials, Johnson had established the world mark for the 10-event decathlon of 8,683 points.

Johnson, of Kingsbury, Calif., received 233 first place votes of the 635 ballots cast and a total of 1,611 points.

Miss Rudolph, the premier woman athlete of America, was awarded 103 first place votes and 1,079 points for her spectacular successes in the Olympics when she won the 100 and 200-meter dashes and anchored the triumphant 400-meter relay team. A native of Clarksville, Tenn., she now attends Tennessee State A&T, Triumphant Over Surgery.

Farrell, of Wichita, Kan., amazed both the sports and medical fields when he qualified for the Olympic swimming team just six days after an emergency appendectomy had appeared to end his hopes.

Farrell was the successful anchor man on both the 800-meter freestyle relay and the 400-meter medley relay. He received 702 points in the Sullivan trophy voting.

Chris Von Saltza of Saratoga, Calif., winner of three Olympic gold medals and one silver medal in swimming, was fourth in the balloting with 585 points.
