Landscape Clinic Scheduled at OSC Starting Jan. 12

Corvallis—Trees form the backbone of most landscape scenes. And the best way to use trees in home, city, and community landscape projects will be explained at a special landscape design study course at Oregon State college Jan. 12 to 14.

Trees can be used to indicate the walls and ceilings of outdoor spaces where people carry on their outdoor-living activities, according to Donald J. Martel, head of the OSC department of landscape architecture and coordinator of the course.

Trees can do this job either as single specimens, or as part of a complex composition, he noted.

Some trees are shaped so they are most useful in forming walls, Martel said, while others have widely-branching tops that serve best to indicate ceilings. Size, structure, form, texture, and color of trees are the main factors in influencing their use, he added.

Way To Be Explained

Ways to use trees will be explained in detail at the special study course, being sponsored by the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, in cooperation with the OSC cooperative extension service and department of landscape architecture. Persons attending the course will also learn how to prepare planting plans, clear and grade landscape sites, and used paved areas, buildings, and water in landscape designs.

The course is open to all interested persons, regardless of past training or experience in gardening or landscaping. Martel emphasized. It is aimed primarily at garden club members, nurserymen, city planners, members of park boards, landscape architects, and others who plan or design public or private landscapes, but any person who attends should be able to pick up a wealth of ideas on ways to improve landscaping of their own home or community.

Fee for the course will be \$10. Enrollment fees and more information about the course can be obtained from county extension offices, garden club chairmen, or the OSC cooperative extension service, Corvallis.

As a mother, I couldn't see that. So I said they could share my apartment temporarily, until something suitable turned up. Time and sober second thoughts may remedy this rift. Its cause, after all, isn't malice but plain human in-very-smart behavior.

West Agrees on Program in Laos

Washington—The Western Allies have agreed on a series of political steps to try to bring about a settlement in Laos, diplomatic informants said Wednesday.

Key features of the agreed policy are:

- To promote and encourage a neutral Laos.
- To prevent Laos from becoming a base for Communist expansion.
- To press King Savang Vatthana and his government to form a broader government including nationalists and to install the new regime.
- To ensure that the new regime is not a puppet of any one power.
