Carmen Victor, But Suspended

New York — (UPI) — Carmen Basilio returns to his home at Chittenango, N. Y., today with a comeback victory under his belt and congratulatory echoes in his ears; but he must wait till Friday to learn the length of his suspension for breaking a weight agreement.

The former welterweight and middleweight champion was suspended Saturday night at Madison Square Garden immediately after his unanimous decision over Mexican Gaspar Ortega in their nationally televised 10-round fight.

Members of the New York State Athletic commission planned to announce the length of his suspension today but postponed their action until next Friday's commission meeting.

Carmen broke a 155-pound agreement when he scaled a surprise 159½ for the fight with Ortega, who registered only 149½ — exactly 10 pounds less.

Houston, Tex. — (UPI) — K. S. Bud Adams, owner of the Houston Oilers, revealed he lost \$710,000 in operating the American Football League championship team in 1960. Troy, Dons Maplecourt Surprises

Maybe they only are morning glories, but Southern California and the University of San Francisco rate as big surprises this season in the West Coast basketball picture.

The Trojans made it two straight over California Saturday night with a 65-57 victory at Berkeley and grabbed undisputed possession of first place in the Big Five standings. And USC's gang of sophomores carved out a similar mark in the West Coast Athletic conference race with week end wins over Pepperdine, 72-60, and highly-touted Loyola, 52-51. That left the Dons in a first place tie with Santa Clara.

Other principal results of the Saturday schedule were UCLA 62, Washington 58; Santa Clara 45, San Jose State 31; Portland 47, Oregon State 44; Idaho 64, Oregon 49; St. Mary's 88, Pepperdine 81; Santa Barbara 67, Fresno State 54, and Los Angeles State 106, Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) 77.

John Rudometkin, the Trojans' mighty center from Santa Maria, meshed 22 points in leading them to their second straight win over the Bears on the losers' home court. Cal moved away to an 8-2 lead but Rudometkin got hot from the outside to send USC back into contention and put his team ahead for the night with a free throw for a 16-15 margin. USC beat Cal on Friday, 57-50.

Loyola, regarded as the team to grab the WCAC crown, held a 28-26 edge at halftime over USC. But the Dons, paced by Charley Range who bucketed 15 points, rallied to win. They also got a break at the final buzzer when Brian Quinn of the Lions lofted what seemed to be a winning basket only to have it spin around and fall out.

Free throws in the clutch by Ron Lawson and Dave Waxman helped UCLA down the Huskies 62-58, and avenge Friday's 58-45 loss. Washington took the lead three times during the final half but then John Berberich pocketed a field goal to nudge the Bruins to the front, 50-49. As time ran out, he and Lawson also sank final one and one charities.

Portland's Pilots scored an upset at Corvallis by downing Oregon State, the Far West Classic champs, 47-44. Roland Carpenter hit for two field goals and Bill Garner and Mike Doherty added one each as the Pilots overcame a 39-36 Beaver lead to go in front with three minutes left.

Idaho rallied to down Oregon, 54-49, to avenge Friday's two-point loss to the Ducks. Captain Dale James led the Vandals with 25.

Steve Gray and Tom Sheridan each scored 21 points while St. Mary's outlasted slumped Pepperdine, 88-81. Noel Smith, the Waves' fine sophomore, scored 36 points to break the Los Angeles Sports Arena collegiate scoring mark.

Santa Barbara, with Ray Bosch hitting for 22, won its second straight California Collegiate Athletic conference tilt by downing defending champion Fresno State, 67-54. In another CCAA game, Los Angeles State boomed past the century mark for the fifth time this season with a 106-77 win over Cal Poly. Dale Ferber scored 28 for the Diablos.

Among the key games next week end, Washington is at Los Angeles for a brace of contests with Southern California. UCLA faces Arizona Friday night then returns to Big Five action against California on Saturday. All of these clashes will feature twin bills at the sports arena.

Cal has a previous Big Fiveer with Stanford on Tuesday. The WCAC race is down to two league games as the boys dig in for exams. Pepperdine faces Loyola on Tuesday and San Jose State battles University of Pacific. Santa Clara departs for three games in Hawaii.
