Ex-Detroit Moundsman Rowe Dies

El Dorado, Ark. - (UPI) - Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, who helped pitch the Detroit Tigers to two consecutive American league pennants in the 1930's, died at his home here Sunday night of a heart attack.

The strapping, 6-foot-4 former major leaguer would have been 40 years old Wednesday.

Rowe equalled an American league record in 1934 when he won 16 consecutive games. He finished that season with a 24-8 won and lost record.

However, he is best remembered for an incident that happened in the 1934 World Series between the Tigers and the St. Louis Cardinals.

While mowing down the Cardinals' famed "Gas House Gang," that included the incomparable Dean, brothers Paul and Dizzy, in the second game at Detroit, Rowe spotted his wife seated in the stands and hollered, "How'm I doin', Edna?"

"Yoo, Hoo, Edna"

Members of the St. Louis team heard the remark and every time Rowe took the mound thereafter they would chant, "Yoo, hoo, Edna . . . How'm I doin', Edna."

In 1935, Rowe won 19 games to again pitch the Tigers into the World Series. After another 19-victory season with the Tigers in 1936, Schoolboy developed a remarkable record of 158 victories and 101 defeats. He had served as a scout for the Tigers since 1951.

NCAA May Censure Tarheels

Pittsburgh - (UPI) - The National Collegiate Athletic association officially opens its 55th annual convention today and the powerful 18-member council may announce whether the University of North Carolina will be censured for alleged basketball recruiting violations.

The precarious position of the Tar Heels came to light Sunday when NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers acknowledged the rules infraction committee had met with a four-man delegation headed by University Chancellor William Aycock.

Aycock was accompanied by Athletic Director Charles P. Erickson, head basketball coach Frank McGuire and Asst. Coach Dean Smith. He was the spokesman for the group during a two-hour session and then departed abruptly for Chapel Hill, N.C.

Byers' acknowledgment of the meeting came as a surprise. The NCAA usually is noncommittal on such matters unless a penalty is imposed on the school involved.

Byers promised a statement today concerning schools facing action and the progress of schools already placed on probation.

Excluding the announcement that the Tar Heels had "presented their case," the North Carolina meeting remained "top secret."

It was reported the Tar Heels came under NCAA scrutiny after McGuire had recruited Northern players who switched from Brooklyn St. John's to Chapel Hill several years ago.

In football, a return to unlimited substitution - which has been outlawed since 1953 - was the main topic Sunday for the rules committee of the American Football Coaches association.

Jack Curtice of Stanford, new president of the AFCA, said the free substitution proposal and nine other recommended rules changes would be submitted to the NCAA rules committee Friday in Miami, Fla.

The coaches also will ask the rules committee to:

-Institute a "more efficient" method of recording substitutes.

-Legalize coaching from the sidelines.

-Permit the kicking team to down the ball at any place on the field. Present rules prohibit it inside the 10-yard line.

-Number players' jerseys consistently.

-Eliminate useless "piling on" to avoid injuries.

-Clarify the rule on touchbacks and safeties resulting from intercepted passes.

-Number officials' jerseys.

-Have official designate against which player a penalty is called.

-Order member schools to adhere strictly to NCAA rules, eliminating the possibility of conflict in intercollegiate games.

Ashland - Southern Oregon perched atop the Oregon Collegiate conference in basketball today after defeating Eastern Oregon 57-53 here Saturday night to sweep the week end series in the opening round of conference action for both clubs.

By winning 78-59 Friday, the Raiders sport a 2-0 record in OCC standings. In other league action Saturday, Oregon Tech earned a split with Portland State by nipping the Vikings in overtime, 46-45.

PSC won Friday by a 42-39 margin.

After being down 32-31 at the half on Saturday, coach Ted Schopf's Raiders battled the visiting Mountaineers on even terms the first 10 minutes of the second panel before a tip-in and free throw by Dave Hughes and a layup by Gordy Carrigan with 8:26 left gave the Ashlanders the lead for good.

Carrigan followed with a jumper, Don Vanice, the Raiders' high point man of the night with 13 counters, dropped in a gift shot and Hughes hit from the field to make the count 54-47 for the hosts and put the contest on ice.

Pasco Arritola, the Mounties' veteran center who topped game scoring honors with 17 tallies, scored Eastern's first eight points of the game to lead his team to a 23-13 margin midway in the opening half.

But the Raiders began to come alive as post man John Payne canned a jumper, Loran Eickworth sank a push shot, and Dave Gardner hit from outside to pull the home team to within 23-19 with 7:09 left in the period.

Vanice took matters into his own hands at that point by clicking on a three-point play, then ripped home two long-range howitzers from the sidelines.

Shooting Edge

Meanwhile, the Mounties were not idle as Arritola and diminutive Ron Hunt hit from the field and Mel Holmes followed suit. With the score 28-26 in favor of the visitors, Eickworth hit on a jumper and then from the foul line, followed by a fielder by Jerry Shults which gave the Raiders a 31-29 lead with 2 minutes remaining.

Hunt hit from outside and Holmes once on a gift try to give Eastern their one-point edge at intermission.

For the second straight night, Southern Oregon outshot the Mounts from the field, 36-4 to 35-9. The Raiders sank 24 of 56 tries while EOC hit 23 of 64.

Coach Bob Quinn's Mounties managed only 7 of 20 from the free throw line while the Southerners nailed 9 of 15 tries.

Led by Payne, who snatched 18 stray shots to run his series total to 31, the Raiders led in rebounds, 37-23. Arritola snagged 11 for the losers.

Harney Gains Shaky Lead in LA Tourney

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Crowd-favorite Paul Harney took a shaky one-stroke lead into what should be the wind-up round today of the sun-blessed \$45,000 Los Angeles Open golf tournament.

But with the field so tightly packed, no less than 15 men were in easy shooting distance of the slender, graying 31-year-old Worcester, Mass., pro's 207 score.

It was almost anyone's choice as to who would take home top prize. And then there's always the chance that the 35th annual event would end up in a tie for the fifth time.

Leads "Fearsome Threesome"

Harney, the man with the sou'easter accent and the deft putting touch, was just one stroke ahead of a fearsome threesome of Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif., Bob Goalby of Crystal River, Fla., and Lionel Hebert of Lafayette, La., at teeoff this morning.

Right back at that trio was another group at 209 - Bob Gajda, Bloomfield Hills, Ill., Billy Casper, Apple Valley, Calif., and sentimental hometown pick Tommy Jacobs of Arcadia, Calif.

Evidence of Harney's tenuous position was the finish of last year's LA Open, Eric Monti of Los Angeles was four-strokes ahead going into the final round of the 72-hole event - only to blow sky-high and finish in a tie for seventh as Dow Finsterwald came from four behind to take the win.

Palmer Out

Finsterwald was in a little less ominous position this year, having a three-round 213 - six strokes back of Harney. But the cautious tee-master from Tequesta, Fla., has done it before and could not be counted out.

An assorted group of top name stars were not present for today's final round. Among the missing was U.S.

and Masters champion Arnold Palmer who failed to make even the third round after shooting a miserable first round 77 (principally because of a 12 on the final hole). Others on the sidelines were Tommy Bolt, Gene Littler, Dick Mayer, Paul Runyan, and Walt Burkemo, all former PGA or National Open champions.

The Portland Pilots, who upset the picture with a victory against Far West Classic champion Oregon State, takes on Seattle at Portland's Memorial Coliseum.

The Beavers, figured as the number one hoop power in the state after winning the Classic for the fifth time in a row the previous weekend, fell to the Pilots 47-44 at Corvallis.

And Oregon didn't fare any better. The Ducks, two-point victors over Idaho Friday night, lost the finale of the two-game week end series 64-49 to the Vandals at Moscow.

Here's how the state's "big three" stands now: Portland 84, Oregon State 64 and Oregon 54.

This week end, all three schools face two-game series. Oregon will be at home at Eugene Friday and Saturday nights against Stanford, Oregon State will face Washington State at Pullman, Wash., the same dates and Portland will be at Spokane, Wash., for Saturday and Sunday night games.
