

Jim Bond Films Here Saturday

Some of the nation's finest outdoor color photography, featuring mammoth old bull elk, cagy mountain goats, giant 2,000-pound bull moose, grizzlies, caribou and other wild animals, will be offered the public on Saturday at 8 p.m. in the McLoughlin Junior High school gym.

Jim Bond has come up with such exceptional wildlife motion pictures that he has been packing auditoriums night after night. Three colorful features are being offered, "The Sun River Elk," "Trapping and Transplanting Mountain Goats" and "Yukon - Alaska Wildlife Spectacular."

"My elk picture is 50 minutes long and is the best picture I have ever produced," Bond said. "It hits the hunter right in the eye - and he gets a real look at some of the greatest bull elk that ever walked. It's filmed in the 'back country' up along Montana's Continental Divide. I camped month after month with those challenging bulls and photographed them in true wilderness splendor."

Special Attraction
"A very special attraction in this sequence is the bugling of those big elk, this thrilling call captured in stereophonic sound. Elk bugling will ring out all over the auditorium. And, you'll see more huge bull elk in this picture than three hunters would see in a lifetime."

As revealing as it is interesting is Jim's colorful film, "Trapping and Transplanting Mountain Goats," which was filmed in the high Rockies, most of the pictures having been taken at elevations exceeding 10,000 feet.

For a display of some amazing wildlife photography of big grizzlies, moose, stately and awe-inspiring caribou as well as white mountain sheep, Bond's monumental production, "Yukon-Alaska Wildlife Spectacular" is tops. To some people this will truly be the feature.

Bond's personal appearance and the presentation of his two-hour show is sponsored by Oregon Missionary Volunteers and the money will go for youth work in this state.

SOC Grapplers Nurse Injuries

Ashland - Southern Oregon college's wrestling team returned from its week end trip to Eugene and the Oregon Collegiate championships nursing injuries to three key men - George Moses, Rod Napier, and Jerry Hull.

This week end the Raider matmen journey to Portland where they encounter Lewis and Clark on Friday evening, and tangle with Portland State Saturday afternoon.

Next Wednesday the squad opens its home season against Oregon Tech.

The Raider trio were injured during the Saturday meet on the University of Oregon mats in which 130-pound Ken Williams was the only SOC entrant to reach the quarterfinals of the consolation round. Williams was defeated by a decision and a pin in two previous bouts before losing out in the quarterfinals.

Moses, a 167 pound frosh from Ashland, was pinned in his only match of the day and withdrew from further action with an elbow injury.

Napier, an entrant in the 157 pound division, lost his opening match by a pin, won the second on a 10-7 decision, but dropped the third when he defaulted after suffering a knee injury.

Hull was also forced to default in the 147 pound category after losing two matches by decisions and injuring an ankle in a third match.

Moore, Brooks Retain Narrow Handicap Lead

Tinker Toy Autorama Entrant

People's Choice of the November 1959 show will be one of the entries Saturday and Sunday in the third Southern Oregon Autorama at the Medford Armory.

The car is "Tinker Toy," owned by Carl Jensen, Eugene. It is a 1934 Ford "A" competition roadster. Jensen's car was sweepstakes winner in the January 1959 show.

The autorama, a display of personalized vehicles, is slated from noon to 10 p.m. this Saturday and from noon to 8 p.m. on Sunday. Cars will be judged for beauty, construction and originality. Autos have been personalized by changes in body design and upholstery, by special paint jobs and by various other means.

Various Classifications
Mike Batinech, Grants Pass, is promoter of the autorama. Cars entered will be from among these classifications:

Street and competition roadster, coupe and sedan; custom and semi-custom convertible, coupe, pickup and sedan; custom sports car; antique; full custom convertible; roadster pickup; radical full custom, dragster; and go-kart. There will be a motorcycle class.

Awards will include those for best engineering, people's choice, rod, custom and local sweepstakes. There are to be awards in all classes.

With exception of best rod, best custom, local sweepstakes and people's choice winners, cars entered in the November 1959 show must have at least two noticeable changes to be accepted for this year's event.

Annual Medford Bowling association tournament will be held from Jan. 28 to Feb. 19.

Entry in this men's city tourney is open to members of the association. The tournament is American Bowling congress sanctioned and will be conducted under the regulations of the ABC.

For team competition there will be one prize for each four entries and for doubles a prize for each six entries. Singles will offer a prize for each eight entrants. All events will offer a prize for each ten participants in each classification.

Prizes will be awarded on the basis of scores with handicap.
