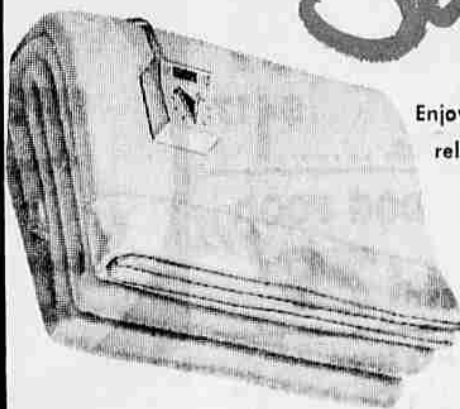

## Fremont's Family To Fight Again To Reclaim Land

San Francisco (UPI)—For the 25th time in nearly a century Congress is scheduled to take up the John C. Fremont family's battle with the U. S. Army over ownership of a piece of land near the Golden Gate.

Fremont, known as "The Pathfinder," was the soldier-explorer who claimed California for the United States during the war with Mexico. A few years later he settled in San Francisco and, the family claims, bought a 14-acre tract on San Francisco Bay.

After Fremont joined the Union forces in the Civil War, the Army in 1863 took over his estate as a fortress against a feared Confederate invasion from the Pacific. It is now known as Ft. Mason.

During the war Fremont earned a reputation for freeing hundreds of Negro slaves but suffered discouraging defeats by Gen. Stonewall Jackson.

When he asked for his land back after the war, the Army told him it never belonged to him. It had been reserved for the military since the 18th Century, the War Department said, and Fremont was no more than a squatter on a military reservation when he lived there. For 25 years Fremont haunted Washington and the White House striving to get the land back. He died in poverty.

In 1891 the California legislature called on Congress to "rectify an injustice of long standing" and pay Fremont's widow Jessie, for the land. In that same year she died.

The Fremonts' son, Maj. Francis Preston Fremont, carried on the fight but died in 1925 still without possession of the land.

Then the general's grandson, Benton Fremont, came back from Cuba to fight for the land. Last October he too died at San Francisco General Hospital, a few miles from the army-held estate that now would be worth around \$5 million.

## Vows To Fight

The general's great-grandson, Air Force Capt. John C. Fremont, vowed as he buried his father that he would carry on the fight. He said he would press the claim to Ft. Mason, an army port of embarkation, until his family is returned the land or paid for it.

Rep. John F. Shelley, D-Calif., will introduce a bill to turn the question of who owns Ft. Mason over to a court of claims. The family's attorney has assembled records of 100 years of fruitless arguing with the government.

## Program Set On Mass Casualty Care

Care of mass casualties is being featured in a training program at the Veterans Administration domiciliary, White City, started this week, according to Henry C. Herzog, manager.

The training will be held each Wednesday from 10:30 to 12 noon in the infirmary classroom.

"This training is designed to orient its staff in the principles of management of casualties resulting from natural or man-made major disaster and will be conducted by Dr. Albert E. Schnee, chief domiciliary medical officer with several Medford physicians participating," Herzog noted.

All physicians, dentists and nurses in the surrounding communities, plus personnel connected with disaster planning are invited to attend all or any of these training sessions, the domiciliary manager said.
