

Tunisia President May Be Key Man In Bringing Peace

Paris—(AP)—President Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia, a stocky North African leader with a toothpaste ad smile, may be the key man in bringing together the Algerian rebels and President Charles de Gaulle.

Bourguiba has walked a diplomatic tightrope on Algeria since he began harboring the rebel "provisional government" two years ago. Since then his problems have increased and he is anxious to see them solved.

Rebel Group Grows

When the rebel "government" first set up shop in Tunisia it comprised a relatively small group. Now its guerrilla army is estimated at about 30,000, all armed and trained.

Bourguiba made a concession to letting pressure when he let the rebels in but he has made statements from time to time indicating he is firmly behind the rebels.

On the other hand, he is said to have a personal liking for De Gaulle and would like to know he could rely on French protection should any threat to Tunisia develop.

Has People's Support

Bourguiba has been called the "prophet of modern Tunisia" and has nearly complete support of his 4 million people. He waged a 30-year struggle to achieve independence from France in 1956.

Now a successful move by him to secure peace between France and the Algerian rebels would greatly enhance his stature in the rest of the African world.

Bourguiba is anti-Communist himself and undoubtedly would be upset by Communist Chinese or Russian intervention in Algeria.

The Algerian rebel leaders, now talking over the results of the three-day French referendum in Algeria, will likely lean closely to whatever he says.

Friendship Close In Telephone Booth

McKeesport, Pa.—(AP)—The friendship between two 15-year-old girls was never closer than it was Wednesday, and they had a telephone booth to thank for it.

Squeezing into the phone booth to make a joint call, Christian Duran and Peggy Weisman found they couldn't open the door when they finished.

Practically they waved to passersby for aid. But all they received in return were smiles and handwaving from persons apparently believing the girls were just trying to be friendly.

Finally, one of the captives managed to squeeze a hand into her purse and pull out a dime. They called police who were forced to remove the door.

Stars to Remain On Station Roof

New York—(AP)—The stars on the ceiling of Grand Central Terminal won't be blacked out by a bowling alley.

A proposal to suspend a three-tier bowling alley in the lofty dome of the famous railroad station was turned down this week by the Board of Standards and Appeals.

The proposal would have cut the 60-foot ceiling height to 15 for New York Central passengers using the terminal.

"The monumental character of this building would be affected," Max H. Foley, chairman of the board said in voting down the plan.

Judge East Signs Confiscation Order

Portland—(AP)—Federal Judge William C. East Wednesday approved an order of final confiscation of 24 bars of gold bullion seized here by treasury agents nearly three years ago.

U.S. Marshal Paul Kearney will have the job of transporting the newly \$21,000 worth of gold to the U.S. mint in Denver.

Judge East approved confiscation on a default basis asked last Dec. 8 by Assistant U.S. Atty. Roger G. Rose.

The gold had been seized by treasury agents in a hotel following "dickering" with two men who claimed to be miners and wanted to sell the proceeds from the efforts.

LIEN AGAINST ACTORS

Los Angeles—(AP)—Actress Betty Davis and Gary Merrill had a \$24,631 lien filed against them Wednesday by the Internal Revenue service. The couple, divorced last July, was accused of owing the money in income taxes for the 1948-1956 period.

Americans Reach Pole by Overland

Christchurch, N.Z.—(AP)—The first Americans ever to reach the South Pole overland arrived Wednesday in two tractors and a weasel that had carried them over 800 miles of unexplored territory in 35 days.

The 11 bearded men, two Army officers, two civilian scientists and seven Seabees, comprised the fifth party ever to reach the pole by land.

Rear Adm. David M. Tyree, U.S. commander in Antarctica, radioed congratulations to the leader of the expedition, Maj. Antero Hovila, Williamsburg, Va.

The party set out Dec. 8 from Byrd station to deliver the tractor to the U.S. base at the pole for use in maintaining its snow landing strip and doing other construction work.

Hovila and CWO George Fowler, Santa Rosa, Calif., were the Army men on the expedition.
