U.S. Endorses Use of Planes

Washington — UPI — The United States Wednesday fully endorsed the pro-Western Laotian government's use of rocket-armed American planes against Communist rebels in that Southeast Asian kingdom.

The State Department acknowledged that four T-6 observation planes supplied earlier this week to the government of Prince Boun Oum were equipped with .30-caliber machine guns, rocket racks and rockets.

Press Officer Lincoln White said that despite any treaties the Laotian government was fully entitled to "use any methods at its disposal to protect itself against the onslaught against the legal government which is designed to set up a regime under Communist control."

The American spokesman, who Wednesday denied reports that the U. S. had furnished "fighter planes" to Boun Oum's government, now acknowledged that the observation craft were well armed.

Beulah C.—He knocks himself out being charming everywhere but home. Myron C.—Others really listen to me. Beaulah's attention wanders fast.

Beulah C. — My husband is a dual personality when it comes to attractiveness. At home he has the pep of a pail bearer. Ask him what's new and you can count on the answer. "Aw, nothing!"

Yet listen to him a few hours later, when he's holding the stage at a party down the block, and you learn he had lunch with a student from Nigeria and bumped into Spencer Tracy!

Myron C. — When we were

For Myron, talking to Beulah was like directing his best gens into a disconnected telephone. With better manners on her part and less "temperament" on his, this one-man show may again play to a lucky one-woman audience.

Electronics Industry Has Own Department Stores, Markets

New York — UPI — The electronics industry has its own department stores and supermarkets which do more than a billion dollars in business annually.

They are the electronics distributors who keep a ready stock of tens of thousands of items ranging from a half-cent oscillator to a \$5,000 oscilloscope.

The size and quantity of any component or instrument is secondary to the fact that it is made instantly available to the purchaser as it is needed, according to William Miller, president of Terminal-Hudson Electronics, Inc.

He noted that a customer also can buy a number of different items of different manufacturers at the same time on one invoice. This is much faster, with a lot less paperwork, than going to the individual manufacturers, he said.

The annual volume of all

electronics distributors has reached \$1.3 billion, including industrial sales of about \$400 million and is growing at the rate of 20 per cent annually.

Without the distributor, Miller said, electronics would be tied to horse-and-buggy methods of ordering nails from the blacksmith shop and the wheels from the wheelwright.

Defense production contractors as well as scientists and engineers do their shopping at the distributor department stores. Radio and TV stations turn to them for parts that keep them on the air, and hundreds of commercial and industrial users select their electronics requirements from the hefty distributor catalogues.

Some distributors, like Terminal-Hudson, specialize in the high-profit industrial sales area. Exports also are an important area. Terminal-Hudson has an international subsidiary which supplies a rapidly expanding volume of American instruments and devices to customers abroad.

For equipment manufacturers as well as for laboratories, the distributors' shelves constitute a source of

supply that permits them to keep their own parts inventories at a minimum, freeing capital and credit for other needs.

Miller noted that the transistor and other applications of solid-state physics gave a tremendous boost to the electronics field during the past decade. "But what lies ahead will expand it a thousand times," he stated.

There are new things coming that will make today's achievements look like the crystal detector, according to the electronics distributor.

They were on the losing side. The measure carried by a roll call vote of 50-46.
