

Pel Wrestlers Trip Tornado Team 36-10

Medford high's bid to dominate Southern Oregon conference wrestling this season was jolted Friday by Klamath Falls.

Klamath's Pelicans, competing on their home mats, took the varsity match 36 to 10 and were junior varsity victors 41 to 11.

Contention, however, was closer in the varsity bouts than the score indicates. Three decisions were lost by one point and two by two points. Inability to get takedowns hurt the Medford cause. Tornado Coach Art Keith pointed out that his crew usually scores six to nine takedowns in a match. Against Klamath, Medford got one.

Dan Eddy by decision and Bob Rix by a pin were the Medford winners. The Tornado's heavyweight, Monte Jones, drew with Gary Hancock.

Grants Pass Trims Crater High 66-39

Grants Pass—Grants Pass high utilized sharper first half shooting and third quarter Comet fouls Friday night in a 66 to 39 hoop decision over Crater in the Southern Oregon conference.

While the Cavemen were averaging .478 from the field in the first half to Crater's .178, Grants Pass established a 27 to 14 bulge. That left the Comets still within striking distance.

In the third quarter, although outgassed from the field five to four, GP collected 12 points on gift heaves and led at the end of the canto 47 to 27.

Grants Pass hopped off to a 10 to 2 gap in the hassle and was on top 13 to 4 at the quarter. The Cavemen stretched to 27 to 8. In the closing portion of the second stanza, the Comets got a couple of quick buckets and Loyal Higginbotham, shooting from midcourt, sank another at the buzzer.

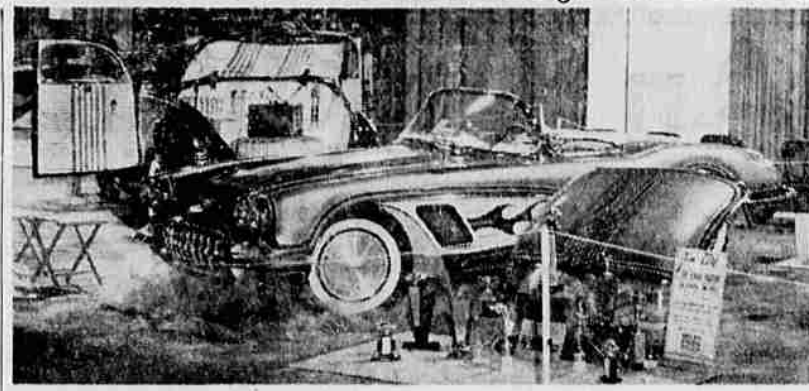

Crater led 35 to 34 after three-fourths of the jayvee clash but could get no field goals in the last quarter while Grants Pass was hitting for eight, GP had 7 to 5 first quarter and 18 to 15 midway edges. O'Leary tossed in 14 points and Benner 11 for the Cavemen and Pat Pepper 11 and Howard Tomlinson 11 for Crater.

Asland—Southern Oregon college coach Ted Schopf cleared his bench here Friday night as his Red Raiders basketballers scored an easy 68-56 win over Oregon College to run their victory skein in Oregon Collegiate conference play to 3 wins, 0 losses.

In wrapping up the win, their sixth of the season against six losses, the Raiders controlled the shooting and clearing the boards of rebounds. Big John Payne not only topped both teams in scoring 13 tallies but pulled down 14 rebounds.

Earle Tichenor was not far behind in both departments with 10 points and a like number of retrieves. As a team the Raiders hauled in 51 stray shots to the visiting Wolves' 39.

Oregon College had three men in double figures but the Raiders' overall balanced scoring was more than enough to cinch the win. Jim Bennett, seeing his first collegiate action as a varsity player topped the losers in the scoring column with 12 tallies. Teammates Dennis Spencer with 11 and Steve Rankin with 10 were next in order.

Shults Gives Lead

Oregon College led only once in the contest, that 2-0 on a fielder by Rankin in 1:30 of play. But Medford frosh Jerry Shults rifled in two straight

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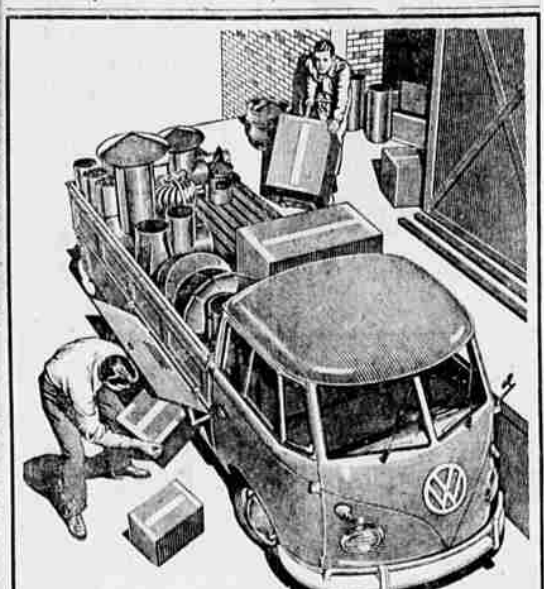
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
