

SOC Students To Have Interviews

Ashland - Two Southern Oregon college students, Wally Guber, Klamath Falls, and Chuck Nevi, Grants Pass, will be interviewed at the University of Washington in Seattle Monday for a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship Foundation scholarship.

Guber and Nevi competing with other college students in the area, were selected by the Southern Oregon college faculty because of their high scholastic standing, Dr. Fellers said.

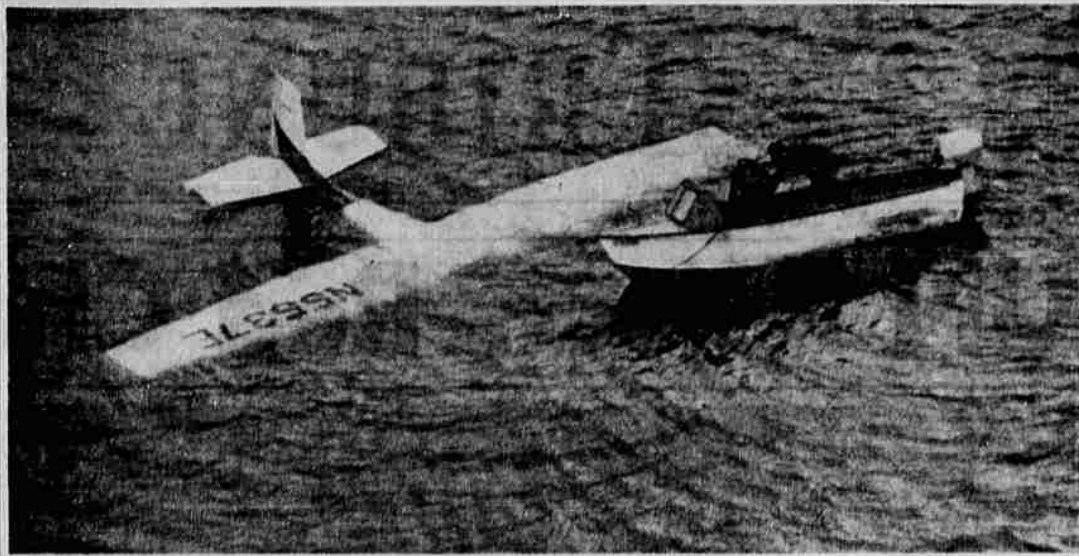
The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation grew out of a fellowship program established by Princeton university in 1945 to encourage promising men or women to consider careers as college teachers, preferably in humanities or social sciences.

Outstanding college seniors and graduates who have not yet entered a liberal arts graduate school are eligible for nomination by faculty members of their college or university. Nominated candidates are invited by the regional chairman to make formal applications which are then submitted to regional committees for screening.

Only candidates who appear most promising to the regional committee are invited for an interview at a regional center.

One thousand fellowships are available for candidates in the academic year 1960-1961. Students who are not selected to win scholarships are listed as honor students with other college and university students throughout the United States.

'South American' Speaks at SOCTFA Meeting on Friday

"Alverado Gomez," chief of conservation and forestry in Colombia, told members of the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association Friday night that more of Colombia's hardwood forests will be developed when better roads are built and more modern methods of forestry are used.

Most logging is now done with horses, Gomez said. He also noted that it is hard to get good horses for logging. Foresters there prefer big stallions and some of the teamsters have devised ingenious methods for controlling them.

"There are great opportunities in Colombia for logging engineers and foresters," he said.

The graduate of the University of Bogota noted that Colombia is keeping a careful balance between the conservatives and liberals in government. This has resulted in greater development of the country, he explained.

Colombia has more than 737 secondary schools, 300 commercial schools and 28 universities and colleges, he said.

People in Colombia know more about their country than the people of the United States know about theirs, the South American remarked. Although Spanish seems to be one of the universal languages few U. S. diplomats sent to South America are able to speak it intelligently. However, Colombia youngsters know English when in the fourth grade.

After the "South American" completed his talk and sat down he was reintroduced as Lee Hunt, of the bureau of land management, Roseburg.

His Spanish accent and fluent use of the Spanish language had everyone fooled. In other business, Bill Atting, Timber Products, Medford, was elected to the SOCTFA board of directors for three years and Ed Smith, Southern Oregon Plywood, Grants Pass, also was elected to a three-year position on the board. Jack Sims, Bate Lumber company, Grants Pass, was elected for a two-year term.

Committee Report
Dick Swan, timber committee chairman, noted that committee sessions have been attended regularly by 20 to 30 people. Discussions have covered timber sales, scaling practices, recreational uses of national forest and timber lands and Christmas tree theft prevention.

Al Smith, chairman of the public relations committee, said the biggest aim of the committee is to tell the people of Jackson county what the lumber industry is doing and why. He praised Russ Hoag and Dale Prentice, association secretary manager, for the work they had done.

Steve Wilson, chairman of the trucking committee, said the state highway commission is removing some of the curves on the Crater Lake highway. The public utilities commission has agreed to allow low more length in logging trucks, and the committee now is fighting to keep the flat rate system instead of the former charge by mileage.

Transportation Report
Russ Hoag, chairman of the transportation committee, said the industry has been able to get more equalization of rates for Pacific Northwest lumber shipped into the south and southwest. The committee has been able to shut off the extra assessment charged mill owners for committee promotion and now has \$5,000 in reserve funds.

Young, Flattering

The recently formed wood waste disposal and utilization committee is studying, analyzing and will promote improved methods of waste disposal or utilization to provide greater employment in the local lumber industry.

The committee will be a clearing house for exchange of ideas for wood product utilization and will support experiments found feasible on use of presently unusable by-products. Prentice reported for the chairman, Paul Doe. Considerable improvement has been made by the larger mills, but the smaller mills are having a more difficult time.

Plywood Supervisors To Meet in Medford

Plywood mill supervisors in southern Oregon and northern California are scheduled to meet here with a staff team from the Douglas Fir Plywood association, Tacoma, Wash., Wednesday, Jan. 18.

The two-hour presentation will begin at 10 a.m. in the Medford hotel. Representatives from Bate Lumber company; Fir - Ply, Inc.; Grants Pass Plywood, Inc.; International Paper company, Weed; Medford Veneer and Plywood corporation; Oregon Veneer company; Southern Oregon Plywood, Inc.; Timber Products company; and White City Plywood company, are expected to attend.

Heading the agenda will be discussion of the new commercial standard governing the manufacture of fir plywood. The standard became effective this fall.

DFFPA staff members participating include John Hess, technical director; Bob Ripley, chief, quality control; Art Larsen, chief quality supervisor; John Price, assistant to the chief supervisor; Tom Flint of the technical department; George Sisterhenn

of the technical service division; Doug Walker, assistant to the field promotion director.

Hess will begin the program and Larsen and Flint will discuss revisions in the standard. Price will speak about grade-trading policies and Ripley will discuss adhesive policy, mold and moisture content. Sisterhenn will cover special mill service provided through the plywood association. Walker will conclude the program with an outline of promotion efforts of the DFFPA's 81-man field staff.
