

Sears Considering Whether To Protest Arbitrator's Ruling

San Francisco — Nathan Berke, attorney for Sears Roebuck and company, said Friday the company is seriously considering whether to protest an arbitrator's decision involving employees fired last year for refusing to cross a picket line.

Arbitrator Arthur C. Miller ruled last week that Sears must rehire and give back pay and other benefits to such employees.

However, he said the company did not have to give back pay to employees who "actively participated" in a boycott launched during the dispute by the San Francisco Labor Council.

The amount of back pay involved was yet to be determined.

More than 100 clerks refused to cross a machinists picket line and were fired. Most were rehired, but some received lower-paying jobs.

The National Labor Relations Board dismissed charges of unfair labor practices brought by the Retail Clerks Union. The company may protest the arbitrator's ruling because it conflicted with the NLRB ruling.

When the consumer boycott started in Medford last fall, pickets appeared at the Sears store in the Medford shopping center. They have continued to picket the store since that time.

Local Retail Clerks Union officials said that the picketing would continue until Sears Roebuck company rehires all of the former employees.

Two men have been picketing the local store during the daytime and three during the evening hours that the store is open for business.

Former AF Major Is Sent to Hospital

Waco, Tex. — Claude Robert Eatherly, 42, former Air Force major who fingered Hiroshima and Nagasaki for the first atomic bombing and has lived in horror of it ever since, was sent back to a mental hospital Thursday night.

A jury of four men and two women in the county court of Judge Raymond Mormino decided he should be committed to the Veterans Administration Mental Hospital in Waco and placed in the violent ward "for his protection and the protection of others."

It was the 10th time he has been in a mental hospital. All but two of those times, he entered voluntarily. He was ordered held in the violent ward to prevent him from escaping.

Ashland Post Plans To Change Name

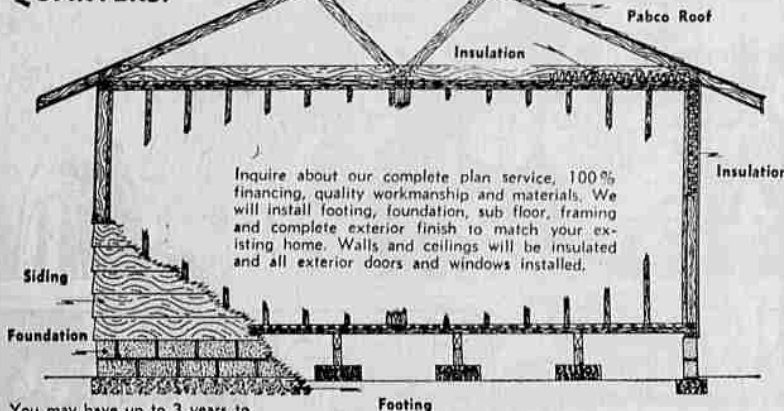
