Feeding the Family

Delicious DeLuxe Pear, Apple, Date

We read that 70 per cent of dinners end with dessert; research conducted by Good Housekeeping. Our personal research sleuths revealed that certain neighborhood wives and homemakers plan the dessert before they plan the meat or fish course because their husbands think dessert is the main course. These are reasons enough for our doing a galaxy of deluxe desserts today. If we needed another good reason, it could be that now is the time to use up all those pears, apples and dates leftover from the holidays.

Creamy Pear Pie

The Bosc and the Anjou pears are high among family fruit favorites. Give a man a pie with a wedge of cheese on the side or topside and he'll sigh with contentment. Here is a pear pie recipe popular with past generations, certain to continue so as we explore the new frontiers. Makes one 9-inch pie.

5 fresh Bosc or Anjou pears
1/4 cup sugar
3 tablespoons flour
3/4 cup table cream
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
Pastry for 1 crust, 9-inch pie

Prepare pastry and line pie plate. Pare, core and thinly slice 2 pears into unbaked pie shell. Halve, pare and core remaining pears. Place halves cut-side down in circle with stem ends toward center on top of sliced pears. Combine sugar, flour, cream, ginger and nutmeg. Pour over pears. Bake at 425 degrees, 40-45 minutes.

Glazed Baked Pears

These baked pears come to the table glazed and lovely to look upon. Serve them warm, fresh from the oven.

Select firm Bosc or Anjou pears; wash, halve and core them. Place enough water in baking dish to cover bottom of pan; add 2 tablespoons lemon juice and any given number of pear halves, cut side down. Cover and bake at 375 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Remove cover, turn pears with cut side up; dot with butter. Sprinkle each half with 1 to 2 teaspoons sugar and spice or brown sugar. Return to oven 10-15 minutes to finish baking and to glaze pears.

Apples on Cinnamon Rounds

Washington Rome Beauties are baking beauties. They're the apples, yellow or green, mottled with red carmine stripes. For a showy as well as delectable way with baked apples, base them on cinnamon toast rounds. Apples are just naturally juicy, so don't use too much water when baking them. Six apples, six servings.

6 medium baking apples
1/4 cup boiling water
1/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
8 teaspoons butter
6 rounds cinnamon toast
Wash and core unpeeled apples. Cut off one strip of peeling from top of apple about 1/2 inch wide. Place in a buttered 8x2 inch round baking dish or one of comparable size; add 1/4 cup hot water. Mix sugar with cinnamon and spoon into apple cavities. Add 1 teaspoon butter or margarine to each cavity; cover. Bake in preheated moderate oven, 350 degrees, 20 minutes. Remove cover; baste with liquid around apples. Continue cooking 35 to 40 minutes or until apples are tender.

Cinnamon Toast Rounds

Cut 6 slices bread into 3 to 4-inch rounds with a large cookie cutter or other round object as a glass or can. Spread each with butter. Place under broiler to toast. Mix 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar with 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon and sprinkle over top of each as soon as removed from the broiler.

Bake Chapatties

Chapatties are the modern version of a thin griddle cake of unleavened bread used in North India. These are made from refrigerated biscuits, rolled thin, brushed with melted butter and sprinkled with sesame or poppy seeds or with grated Parmesan cheese before baking. Recipe makes 10 good-size chapatties. 1 package refrigerator biscuits

Butter
Sesame seeds, poppy seeds and/or Parmesan cheese
Place biscuits on large ungreased cookie sheet. Roll and pat out biscuits to 4 inches in diameter. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with seeds and/or cheese. Might do some one way, some another. Bake at 450 degrees, 8 minutes. Bread will be rather soft and chewy when first baked but will crisp up if held overnight at room temperature.

Cheese Tray

A combination of cheese is used for the dip for pears and is accented with candied ginger. Soften one 8-ounce package cream cheese; add 1 5-ounce jar Old English cheese spread and 2 tablespoons candied ginger. Whip until light and fluffy, adding cream as necessary to make the mixture light and of the right spreading consistency. Makes 2 cups cheese spread for serving with those luscious Bosc, Anjou or Comice pears.

Thornton Renders Revenue Opinion

Major Distillers Finding Out Diversification Not All Roses

"It's a case of 'shoemaker, stick to your last,'" the survey stated. The reason simply is that the industry the distillers were diversifying away from proved to be more profitable than the new fields they were so eager to gambol in.

Tax Relief Obtained

Excess inventories have been worked down in the dis-

tilling industry, and relief has been obtained from the former unrealistic federal tax regime on the bonding period. The prospects for the industry itself have improved, Value Line declared.

Standard & Poor's goes along with this belief. It said increased volume, particularly of the higher-priced brands, resulted in a somewhat larger earnings for distillers in general in 1960 despite higher costs, and a further modest gain is expected in 1961.

The statistical agency noted that consumption of distilled spirits in 1960 equalled the record 231 million gallons set in 1946.

With more individuals coming of legal age, a further gain in consumption is a reasonable expectation for 1961. Other favorable factors are strong consumer purchasing power and good general economic conditions.

The resumption of the trend toward higher-priced bonded and straight whiskies is aiding dollar sales. Bottling of bonded whisky rose 2.8 per cent

in the first nine months of 1960 and accounted for 6.2 per cent of all whisky, against only 5.9 per cent a year earlier.

Straights and straight blends were off 1.2 per cent but still accounted for 42.6 per cent of total sales. Spirit blends were down 1.8 per cent in the same period, accounting for 51.2 per cent of all whisky bottled, down from 51.5 per cent in 1959.

Over on the other side of the competitive fence in the brewing industry the picture also is brightening. After a decade of virtually level demand, the consumption of beer is expected to expand anew in the 1960s as the population profile changes.

Increased sales and earnings are in prospect for the brewing industry, Value Line said.

At the same time, it noted that a progressively larger share of the nation's beer production is being concentrated in fewer and stronger hands. The small regional brewery is rapidly becoming a rarity.
