John Day's Alaska Rescuer Receives Medal for Heroism

Pittsburgh—AP—A daring Alaskan helicopter pilot has been awarded a silver medal by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission for rescuing two mountain climbers from Mt. McKinley.

Twenty-two other persons earned bronze medals for heroism, including three from California, one from Oregon and one from British Columbia.

The silver medal winner was Link Luckett, 32, of Anchorage. Westerners awarded the bronze medals were Gale H. Wilcox, 48, Albany, Ore.; Donald I. McCain, 30, Edmondton, Alta.; James R. Rand, 16, Oakland, Calif.; Billy G. Carnes, 34, San Leandro, Calif.; and Eugene V. Long, 48, Sunnyvale, Calif.

81 Persons Reply To Invitation for Oregon Bank Party

Eighty-one 73-year-olds have responded to an invitation from the Rogue Valley State bank to attend tonight's special celebration of the merger of the Rogue valley financial institution with The Oregon Bank.

Persons born in 1887 are being honored at the party since that was the same year in which the forerunner of The Oregon Bank was founded. The bank now has the oldest trust department west of the Rocky mountains.

The merger celebration will be held in the Pioneer room at the Jackson hotel. Each 73-year-old guest will receive a boutonniere or corsage, and will be called on to say a few words about where he was born and where he lived.

Also at tonight's celebration, Dr. Arthur Taylor, professor of history at Southern Oregon college, will deliver a talk on early banking in Oregon. He will give special attention to the role played by the Eagle Point State bank in the development of this area.

An open house will be held at the two Medford branches of the Rogue Valley State bank tomorrow, with the 73-year-olds serving as hosts and hostesses.

Clarence Young, president of the local bank, said the only change in the operation of the bank locally, when the merger is completed, will be the addition of The Oregon Bank's trust department. No changes in personnel or general policies is anticipated.

Area Teachers To Attend Institute

Portland—Lynn D. Bernston, a teacher at Crater High school, and Esther L. Hopper, a teacher at Eagle Point High school, are two of 25 candidates accepted for the 1961 Guidance and Counseling Training Institute which will be held at the general extension division's Portland Center, Feb. 6 to May 28.

Dr. Harold Bernard, director of the institute, said that those trained at the institute will be on leave from their positions during the 16-week period. He reported that carefully-selected enrollees will come from six Western states—Oregon, Washington, California, Nevada, Idaho and New Mexico.

The institute, for high school counselors and those training to be counselors, is one of several conducted around the nation under contract with the U.S. office of education. The training sessions are set up under provisions of the national defense education act.

The U.S. office of education has signed new contracts for a 1961 summer and a 1961-62 regular year counseling and guidance institute, both to be held at Portland. Applications are now being taken, Dr. Bernard said.

Wilcox and McCain were honored posthumously. They gave their lives while carrying out rescue attempts.

Luckett flew repeatedly to the 17,200-foot level of Mt. McKinley—1,000 feet above the maximum ceiling for his craft—to rescue Oregon rancher John S. Day and Peter K. Schoening, of Seattle, Wash. His landings were the highest accomplished by any type of aircraft.

Stripped Helicopter
The pilot stripped his helicopter of all unnecessary equipment and carried only a minimum of gas to make the flights to a jagged ice plateau, where Day and Schoening were stranded, frostbitten and injured.

In addition to the silver medal, Luckett received a \$500 cash award and \$700 reimbursement for his losses in the rescue operation.

Forest Ranger Wilcox drowned in a vain effort to save a fellow ranger who broke through the ice on a lake near Moran, Wyo., last March 9. His widow received the posthumous bronze award and a \$60-a-month pension from the commission.

McCain steered his brakeless tractor-trailer down a winding mountain road near Field, B. C., and managed to avoid hitting 30 sightseers and road workers at a lookout point. He was crushed to death when the truck overturned.

His widow received a medal and \$1,000 in death benefits. California Rescuers
Rand and Carnes were honored for saving 15-year-old Mary Jane Santosoussa when she broke through ice on a lake near Pinecrest, Calif., on Feb. 28, 1959.

The girl and a teen-age boy fell through the ice into 10 feet of water, and Rand and Carnes fell through as they went to the rescue. They were able to help the girl and her companion to safety, although the ice broke beneath the group on two other occasions as they inched their way to shore.

Long was honored for saving the life of Louis V. Podgornik, 40, a fellow workman, who was buried in the collapse of a mountain of salt at Redwood City on March 30, 1960.

Long crawled into a hole made in the side of the salt pile by rescuers and revived Podgornik with mouth-to-mouth respiration. He became partially buried himself, but stayed with Podgornik administering oxygen and keeping the sliding salt from his face while rescue workers dug away enough salt to free them.
