

Stocks Carve Out Healthy Gain Today

New York — Stocks carved out a healthy gain today. The Dow-Jones industrial average scored in the neighborhood of 5 points helped by General Foods and Eastman Kodak up around 3 and gains of a point or more in Du Pont, Alcoa and Anaconda. Most auto stocks were fractionally higher while steel issues moved narrowly.

Rail stocks failed to match the industrials for a change as much of the steam ran out of the B&O which held close to last Friday's close after being ahead around 1 1/2 at one time. The C&O dropped around 2 points.

Hercules Powder soared around 8 points to lead the profit parade while Mergenthaler gained over 4. Plough 3 1/2, Vento 2, IBM 2 1/2, Lehn & Fink 3/4, Cosden Petroleum 1 1/4, Kerr-McGee 2 1/4 and U. S. Borax 1 3/4.

Man Arrested On Larceny Charge

White House Intervention Ends Strike in New York

New York — UPI — White House intervention ended today a strike over the jobs of 62 men that closed down the nation's second biggest railroad, threatened the economy of the nation's industrial heartland, and displaced life of the country's biggest city.

The 13-day strike cost the nation hundreds of millions of dollars in wages and freight and passenger revenues of rail lines stretching from St. Louis and Chicago to Boston and New York.

The first feather in the cap of President Kennedy and his new labor secretary, Arthur J. Goldberg, was the settlement this morning of the strike of 660 harbor tugboat and ferry men against 11 railroads that use barges to get cargo onto Manhattan Island. Goldberg flew here Sunday at the behest of Kennedy and announced a settlement 14 hours later.

William G. Chase, director of labor relations for the closed New York Central railroad, said the turning point in the negotiations came when the principle that the railroads "should be able to operate efficiently and economically" was recognized by the unions.

President Paul Hall of the Seafarers' Union, one of three unions involved in the strike, praised Goldberg for his professionalism and said there was no question that the strike would have dragged on "if he hadn't entered the picture."

The Central began to get its interstate operations started again this morning by scheduling a run from Boston to Albany, N. Y. Other commuter and long distance trains will be put into operation as soon as snow removal, switch inspection, and equipment distribution problems are worked out. Service in and out of Chicago should be restored Tuesday morning, the road said.

The New Haven railroad announced that it would resume service between Boston and New York this evening and scheduled resumption of commuter service into New York for Tuesday morning. Jersey Central and Erie-Lackawanna ferryboats across the Hudson resumed this afternoon.

Commission Reorganized

The tug issue, involving 56 tugs and nine ferries, must be submitted to a 15-man commission within 30 days. The commission will be reorganized to include representatives of labor and management in the New York dispute over the railroad's plan to trim the present five-man tug crews to four.

Settlement on the basis of a fact-finding board has been favored in the past by AFL-CIO President George Meany. A spokesman for Meany said he was pleased by the tug agreement and hoped "this will be the pattern the administration will follow."

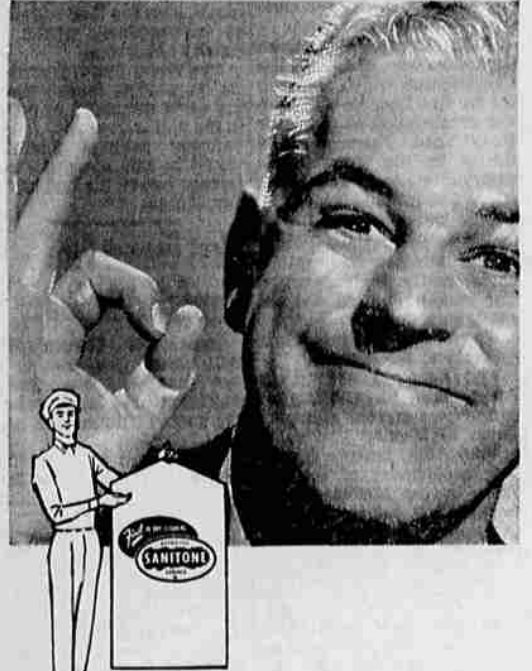
