

Fruit Growers Pick Spatz as President

Tom Spatz, manager of the Chrystal Springs orchard, was elected president of the Jackson County Fruit Growers league at its annual meeting Friday afternoon in the National Guard armory south of Medford.

At 28, Spatz is probably one of the youngest presidents of the long established organization.

Edwin Gebhard, Central Point fruit grower, was named first vice president; Bill Bagley, Ashland cannery operator, was elected second vice president; and Shelby Tuttle was reelected secretary-treasurer.

Other directors elected were Orville Hamilton, Martin Luther Jr., and Bud Barnum.

In making his president's report, Charles Henry noted that one of the many uncertainties facing the pear industry is the fruit labor. This resulted in extensive recruiting.

Joe Wilson, of the local employment service office, made a business trip to Texas last winter and surveyed agencies there to recruit help. Federal labor officials had suggested to Medford area growers they start their recruiting in February due to the light labor supply.

Wilson found Texas was using Mexican nationals to pick citrus fruit, and did not have any labor surplus.

In July, Shelby Tuttle, Al Gonzales and Wilson went to Dayton, Wash., during the pear harvest, and convinced 35 of 100 Mexicans from Texas to help in the Medford pear harvest. Seven arrived and stayed.

"We have continually sought outside white harvest help and have been severely criticized for using Mexican nationals," the league president said. "Two years ago we got harvest help from about 2,000 miles away, at Eagle Pass, Tex. Few of these people stayed to complete the season. They were older men, heavier and not used to the ladder work."

The local employment service office personnel have been cooperative, and understand the labor problem in the Medford area and so does Gov. Mark Hatfield, the league president noted.

In giving the labor committee report for chairman Bob Norris, Henry noted that Mexican nationals average \$1.43 per hour last year season, and assumed that the average pay of other workers is comparable.

Real estate loans totaling \$745,866 were disbursed in Medford during 1960 by the western home office of Prudential Insurance company, according to B. F. Crisler, local investments manager for the company's mortgage loan department.

Of the total, \$686,487 was for residential loans and \$59,379 was for commercial and industrial properties.

Total disbursements throughout the state of Oregon amounted to \$14,233,527 last year. The aggregate amount disbursed by the company throughout the 13 western states during 1960 was \$183,444,758.

Memorial Lecture Set at University

Eugene—Herbert Brucker, editor of the Hartford, Conn., Courant, will be the Eric W. Allen Memorial Lecturer for 1961.

Brucker, whose paper is the "oldest newspaper of continuous publication in America," will speak during the 42nd annual Oregon Press conference at the University of Oregon. His lecture, the feature of the two-day conference, will be Friday, Feb. 17.

A staff member of the Columbia university school of journalism from 1932 to 1944, Brucker has been associated with the Courant since that time and has been editor since 1947. For a year during the war he was associate chief of the bureau of overseas publications, Office of War Information.

Currently Brucker is chairman of the American Council on Education for Journalism, representing the American Society of Newspaper Editors. He is the author of two books—"The Changing American Newspaper" and "Freedom of Information."

The 1961 Oregon Press conference, sponsored by the University of Oregon school of journalism and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' association, will have as its chairman, J. W. Forrester Jr., editor and publisher of the East Oregonian, Pendleton.

Pravda Displays JFK's Message

Moscow—Pravda displayed President Kennedy's thank you message on its front page Monday along with a renewed demand for "universal and complete disarmament."

Kennedy's message thanked Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and President Leonid I. Brezhnev for their congratulations on his inauguration and said the United States was ready and anxious to join in "genuine dedication" to means of assuring peace.

The demand for disarmament was in the text of a speech to the recent central committee meeting by Mikhail Suslov, a secretary of the committee and a top ranking Communist theorist.

The speech reiterated the theme of the 1961 Communist manifesto, issued in December, that the world Communist movement now is so powerful it can prevent war and will work for "peaceful co-existence" among states with different social systems.

This can be achieved, Suslov said, through a system of disarmament which would "abolish the very possibility of waging wars."

Feeding the Family

Put Family in Fine Fettle With Kettle of Fragrant Stew

Julia's immortal words to Romeo "that which we call a rose, by any name, would smell as sweet..." provided the inspiration for today's feature since it is so true that a fragrant, flavorful stew, by any name, makes wonderfully good eating; is certain to put the family in fine fettle.

Give your stew an Irish lilt and cook the meat with golden carrots and green beans. Borrow a curry accent from the mysterious East and add tender rice and a festive array of snowy coconut, chutney, bacon bits, raisins or other favored condiments. Call it Hungarian goulash and serve it with buttered caraway noodles.

Beef or Lamb in Savory Irish Stew

Made with the thriftest meat cuts, either beef or lamb may be used in this stew with an Irish lilt. Eight generous servings and it is wonderful warmed over.

- 2 pounds lean beef or lamb stew meat cut into 1-inch pieces
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3 tablespoons shortening
- 10 black peppercorns
- 1 teaspoon bouquet garni for beef or 1/2 teaspoon lamb garni
- 1 large onion, coarsely chopped
- 2 large stalks celery, cut up
- 2 medium carrots, cut up
- 2 medium potatoes, cubed
- 3 tablespoons flour
- Dredge meat in flour mixed with salt to coat on all sides. Brown in hot shortening or cooking oil. Add peppercorns and beef or lamb garni along with onion, celery, carrots and potatoes. Add enough boiling water to cover vegetables. Cover pan with tight fitting lid and simmer gently for 2 to 2 1/2 hours or until meat is very tender. Serve with buttered egg noodles sprinkled with caraway seeds.
- Combine flour with a little water and stir into mixture to thicken gravy to desired consistency. Add additional salt if necessary.

Easy Lamb Curry With Condiments

Heaps of fluffy hot rice extend the superb flavor of this easy-to-make curry. Individual dishes offering condiments are customary. Choose five or more from the following—flaked coconut, raisins, chutney, slivered almonds or chopped peanuts, chopped green peppers, crisp bacon bits, finely chopped hard-cooked egg and diced green onion tops. Eight generous servings.

- 2 pounds lamb stew meat cut in 1-inch pieces
- 2 tablespoons shortening or cooking oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- Pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon bouquet garni for lamb
- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 to 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons curry powder
- 2 tablespoons cold water

Brown lamb on all sides in hot shortening. Add onions and continue cooking until onions are golden. Stir in salt, pepper, bouquet garni for lamb and boiling water. Cover tightly and simmer slowly until lamb is tender, about two hours. Combine flour and curry powder. Add water to form a smooth paste. Stir into lamb to thicken gravy. Taste for seasonings and add additional curry powder if desired. Serve over hot fluffy rice.

Hungarian Goulash With Caraway Noodles

This recipe is a modern version of famed Hungarian Goulash, made easy with bouquet garni for beef which mingles the flavors of half a dozen herbs and spices ready for teaspooning out. It is usually served with buttered egg noodles sprinkled with caraway seeds. Eight servings.

- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 2 pounds lean beef stew meat cut in 1-inch cubes
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon bouquet garni
