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Commercial Code For State Topic of Hearing in Salem

Salem — **UPB** — Chairman George Van Hoomissen of the House Judiciary committee said today another hearing will be held Feb. 6 on a sweeping new uniform commercial code for Oregon, which would affect virtually every business in the state.

Pros and cons of the proposal, HB 1020, were presented at a three-hour hearing Tuesday, attended by about 50 persons—mostly lawyers.

The bill was introduced at the request of the Oregon Commission for Uniform State Laws and the State Bar.

Purpose of Code
Portland attorney Rupert Bullivant, a member of the commission, was the leadoff witness for those favoring the code, which has been enacted by six states so far. Purpose is to simplify, clarify and unify laws affecting commerce.

Bullivant said among the six are the heavily industrialized states of Pennsylvania and Massachusetts and the reaction there has been "overwhelmingly favorable."

Orderly Solution To Integration in Persuasion, Courts

Persuasion and litigation are the answers for an orderly solution to the integration questions in the South.

This is the opinion of Dr. Herman Lee Turner, for more than 30 years pastor of the Covenant Presbyterian church in Atlanta, Ga., and currently moderator of the 172nd General Assembly of the United Presbyterian church in the United States.

Dr. Turner stopped briefly in Medford Tuesday afternoon en route to Grants Pass where he had a speaking engagement.

Dr. Turner explained that in 1957 the majority of the churches in Atlanta adopted a manifesto which has served as a "guiding light." The manifesto called for communication between races, support of the public school system, obedience of the law and a dependency upon God to guide the churches in the critical days.

Courts Proper Channel
The church leader said that the courts are the proper channel to bring about integration. He added that revolution and riot must be avoided. Dr. Turner stressed that the South represents a culture which took 250 years to form and it will not be changed overnight.

Dr. Turner did not feel that integration was moving too fast, explaining that some persons are becoming impatient. He commented that the sit-in demonstrations are a method to get a hold of the conscience of the people.

Speaking on the recent proposal by Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk of the church, in which he called for the merger of four denominations, Dr. Turner explained that the proposal had not been brought before the General Assembly of the church, but that it would be.

Interested in Unity
He said that all of the Presbyterian church leaders are interested in a greater unity of denominations and stressed the need for moral and spiritual values "if we are to find peace in our time." "United," the church moderator said, "one voice could speak for all people."

Commenting on his own denomination, Dr. Turner said that the United Presbyterian church must promote fellowship and goodwill between members of its own Presbyterian and Reformed families and coordinate as much of its work as possible so a merger of these churches could take place.

Friends, Foes Of Castro Stage Demonstrations

Havana — **UPB** — Friends and foes of Premier Fidel Castro staged rival demonstrations Tuesday night in front of the Church of Our Lady of Carmel, near Havana University, it was reported today.

The official radio said "rapid intervention" by police prevented a Castroite crowd of more than 1,000 persons from "punishing the anti-Castro disturbers of the peace."

No casualties were reported.

Crowd Dispersed
The radio report said Castroites rushed to the scene when opponents of the government tried to stage a demonstration outside the church. The anti-Castro crowd was quickly dispersed, and the Castroites massed to chant anti-religious slogans before returning to their homes.

Castro set the stage for "impeachable persecution" of his political foes by assigning a new commander to the forces battling anti-government guerrillas in central Cuba.

Maj. Victor Bordon took command of Castroite forces cordoning off guerrilla-held areas in the Escambray Mountains, possibly as a prelude to an all-out effort to wipe out the anti-Reds.

Hearings Resume
In Havana's Cabana Fortress prison, the "revolutionary tribunals" which had been idle for five days resumed proceedings against scores of political prisoners held in damp cells.

Among those awaiting trial were six Americans accused of plotting to join anti-Castro forces in the provinces. The Americans actually sailed into Havana harbor, but the Castroites say they did so only because "trouble at sea" made it impossible to carry out their original plan.

Kasavubu Calls For Revision Of Government

Leopoldville, The Congo — **UPB** — President Joseph Kasavubu today called for revision of the Congo's constitution and reorganization of its government to help pull the nation out of its seven-month crisis.

"We must remake the fundamental law (constitution) and the institutions based on it," Kasavubu told delegates who assembled to lay the groundwork for a roundtable conference next month designed to unite warring political factions in The Congo.

The delegates included 450 parliamentarians, tribal chiefs and notables.

Asks Investigation
Before going to the meeting, Kasavubu called on U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld for Security Council investigation of charges of "flagrant meddling" by the United Arab Republic in Congo affairs.

This was a reference to the government's charge that a U.A.R. plane which landed recently in Lisala carried arms for troops loyal to imprisoned ex-Premier Lumumba. U.A.R. authorities said the plane carried only mail and spare parts.

Katanga President Moise Tshombe and South Kasai leader Albert Kalonji sent representatives to today's meeting, but the pro-Lumumba faction which controls Oriental and Kivu provinces were not represented.

NEW INFORMATION CHIEF NAMED IN JUSTICE DEPT.
Washington — **UPB** — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy has appointed Edwin O. Guthman, Pulitzer Prize reporter for the Seattle Times, as Justice Department chief of information.

Guthman, 41, will succeed Luther A. Huston, longtime New York Times Supreme Court reporter, who has held the Justice Department position since 1957. Guthman will assume his duties on Feb. 6.

FOR CUBAN DOCTORS
Tallahassee, Fla. — **UPB** — About 300 physicians who fled Cuba to escape the Fidel Castro government may find jobs in state hospitals and institutions in Florida. They now are undergoing a "crash" course at the University of Miami to prepare for practice in this country. Gov. Farris Bryant suggested Tuesday the state hire as many as needed.

Host Has Flu
W. Alton Jones, board chairman of the Cities Service Co. and Eisenhower's host on the vast 15,000-acre Blue Springs plantation in south Georgia, was suffering from the flu and a fever. He and Eisenhower bagged the full limit of 10 quail each in seven hours of hunting Tuesday.

A cold wave sweeping into Georgia brought rain into the southern part of the state today and put a halt to much outdoor activity. Eisenhower may do more hunting this week at the Thomasville, Ga., estate of former Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey.

George E. Allen, Eisenhower's long-time friend, said it was "living dangerously" to ride with Eisenhower who last drove a car in 1940.

Eisenhower said he also wanted to learn how to use a telephone. For years, as general of the Army and later President, an aide always placed his phone calls for him.

"How do you make a phone call?" he asked reporters. "I haven't looked in a phone book for 20 years."

He was serious for a few moments at lunch. He asked newsmen not to quote him directly about international affairs and then commented that no American should be fooled into believing the Soviet Union wants to stop the cold war.

HOFFA 'LACKS' FIRE
Washington — **UPB** — Martin F. O'Donoghue, former chairman of a court-appointed board of monitors for the Teamsters, doesn't have too much faith in Teamster President James R. Hoffa cleaning up corruption within the union.

"To clean up the Teamsters," O'Donoghue told Senate investigators Tuesday, "a man would have to have fire in his belly. Hoffa just hasn't got it."

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
