

Kennedy Holds First Formal Meeting With New Cabinet

Reorganization Of ICC Started; Pair Appointed

Washington (UPI)—President Kennedy held his first formal cabinet meeting today and began reorganizing the top structure of the Interstate Commerce Commission, a major government regulatory agency.

Kennedy selected for membership on the ICC John William Bush, Columbus, Ohio, and William Tucker, Athol, Mass. Bush is currently state director of commerce in the cabinet of Ohio Gov. Michael DiSalle. Tucker is an attorney who has a long record of practice before the ICC.

A revamping of the practices and policies of the government's six top regulatory agencies has been recommended to Kennedy in a special task force report.

The special task force was headed by James M. Landis, now special adviser to Kennedy. It urged major changes in ICC personnel and procedure, particularly a strengthening of the role of the ICC chairman.

Both appointees are Democrats. Their nominations will go to the Senate shortly.

The White House also announced that Kennedy personally will welcome the two U.S. RB47 fliers when they arrive here Friday from their Soviet captivity.

The formal cabinet session gave the President and his official team their first chance to discuss a wide range of problems facing the new administration.

Senate Probers Eye Tighter Anti-Racketeering Measures

Washington (UPI)—Senate investigators of the Teamsters Union were preparing today to ask Congress to tighten up anti-racketeering provisions of the 1959 labor reform law.

Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.), fresh from a new round

of verbal clashes with Teamster President James R. Hoffa, was reported drawing up new proposals designed to rid unions of corrupt influences.

McClellan is chairman of the Senate Permanent Investigations subcommittee which just concluded two days of hearings on the Teamsters, particularly on charges Hoffa allowed corruption to flourish.

Racketeer Invokes Fifth
The labor reform law enacted two years ago prohibits any person convicted of certain crimes from holding union office. McClellan was expected to recommend that perjury be added to the list.

The latest phase of hearings

ended Wednesday with New York racketeer Antonio (Tony Ducks) Corallo invoking the Fifth Amendment more than 50 times in refusing to answer questions about alleged misappropriation of a local union's funds.

In another highlight of the final session, two members of Teamster Local 107 in Philadelphia testified they were harassed by paid "goon squad" after taking part in efforts to rid their union of corruption.

Denies Previous Testimony
Another witness, Harold J. Gibbons—Hoffa's executive assistant—denied previous testimony that he knew of union money being used to bribe policemen in Philadelphia.

Hoffa had plenty to say when questioned about a tape recording taken at Corallo's apartment on which a Teamster official quoted Hoffa as saying: "I don't care if you want to steal, you want to rob, go ahead... but don't get caught, don't get caught."

The Teamster president charged that the recording was "doctored"—in his opinion, "deliberately." Even if the statement was made by a Teamster official, he added, "I still say he's a liar."

Nikita May Attend UN Sessions, Meet Kennedy

Moscow (UPI)—Diplomatic observers believed today that Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev will go to New York to attend the United Nations General Assembly in March, with the way possibly cleared for a meeting with President Kennedy.

The observers felt that Khrushchev had removed the key obstacle to a summit conference with Kennedy when the Russians released the two American RB47 airmen.

In Washington Wednesday night, after announcing that the two fliers had been released from a Soviet prison, Kennedy said there still were no plans at present for a meeting with Khrushchev. He said there was no relationship in the U.S.-Soviet discussions between the two matters.
