Feeding the Family

Caramelized Filberts In Dessert Delights

Here is a fun and fancy version of the famed French creme Brulee; no less elegant but much easier to prepare. A creamy instant pudding mix is prepared with half and half or regular cream and the whole flavored lightly but brightly with rum or brandy; is topped with Oregon filberts.

After chilling thoroughly, the pudding is then topped with chopped filberts and covered with a thick coating of brown sugar. Pudding goes beneath broiler until the sugar bubbles and melts and the nuts are a roasted, toasted brown. This can be served immediately or chilled again. For each four servings:

- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped filberts
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 package vanilla instant pudding mix
- 2 cups cream or half-and-half
- 1/2 teaspoon rum or brandy flavoring

Combine chopped filberts and sieved brown sugar. Combine pudding mix and cream following package directions. Add flavoring; pour pudding into shallow baking dish or pieplate; chill. Sprinkle top with brown sugar-filbert mixture; place under broiler until sugar melts, bubbles and turns brown.

Skillet Potatoes

Potatoes and onions head list of vegetables plentiful at low cost. Here we combine cooked potatoes and raw onions in a skillet-creamed dish for serving from the skillet. Sauce is made with milk providing extra nutrients. Cold cuts of any kind are good with this. Four servings. Sauté one-fourth cup minced onion in one-fourth cup butter until golden brown; blend in two tablespoons flour, one-half teaspoon celery salt and dash of pepper. Gradually add two cups milk; cook, stirring constantly until slightly thickened. Add two cups diced

cooked potatoes and heat. Before serving, sprinkle generously with parsley.

These are good too when served with crisp bacon, Canadian bacon, little pig sausages or cooked salami slices.

Unusual Apple Bake

There's an abundance of baking apples which are so perfect for baking in orange juice as welcome dessert. We suggest serving these hot. Six apples, six servings.

Pare and core six large baking apples. Arrange in buttered baking dish. Combine one-third cup flour, two-thirds cup sugar, one-third cup butter or margarine and one-fourth teaspoon cinnamon and work together until crumbs are formed. Fill cavities of apples with crumb mixture and sprinkle remaining crumbs over top. Add one-fourth cup water and one-half cup orange juice to pan. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 1 to 1 1/4 hours or until apples are done.

Oriental Pork Popular With Egg Noodles

Oriental pork is tremendously popular with west coasters, gaining right along as newcomers try the new seasonings and favorites such as water chestnuts which are readily available in cans, make conversation. The Chinese were making macaroni products long before Marco Polo arrived there. Egg noodles are their favorite pasta. Recipe makes 6 servings.

- 1 tablespoon a 11-purpose flour
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 2 pounds lean pork, cut in thin strips
- 1 4-ounce can water chestnuts, chopped
- 1/2 cup peanut oil
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 8-ounce package medium egg noodles

Combine flour, sugar and soy sauce; blend. Pour sauce over pork and chill one hour, stirring occasionally. Heat oil; add pork, water chestnuts, sauce and cook over medium heat 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. The chestnuts cooked with the meat adds crunchiness without changing flavor.

Meanwhile, cook egg noodles according to package directions; drain in colander. Center the Oriental pork in egg noodles in warm serving dish.

Good Time to Check On Vitamin C Foods

This is the change-of-weather time of year when meal planners might well pay special attention to foods rich in vitamin C which is needed every day because the body is unable to store much of this essential nutrient. This vital vitamin protects the body against infections and is the vitamin needed in largest amounts.

A variety of fruit and vegetables that rate high in Vitamin C are in our markets. The golden orange is top ranking fruit on a list of thirty five. The orange stands

first in vitamin C, first in calcium and iron, fourth in vitamin A. You can depend on one-half of a medium grapefruit for bountiful supply of vitamin C. The juice of a couple of lemons is a fine source.

Other good sources are raw cabbage, green pepper, tomatoes and tomato juice, fresh or canned. All are abundant at very reasonable cost. Crop of new green cabbage now reaching our markets is so plentiful that it is listed on U.S. Department of Agriculture's list for featuring in store displays, advertisements and in menus.

Other Plentiful

Lamb of fine quality is abundant, reasonable in cost. Prices on beef cuts fluctuate sufficiently that it is wise to watch displayed and advertised specials. Pork, fresh and cured, is seasonally higher except on occasional advertised leaders. Broiler-fryers continue a good buy.

Fish and shellfish displays should put these items in menus more often: Dungeness crabs, fish sticks, flounder, sole, halibut, oysters, rockfish, scallops, shrimp.

Fruit display feature apples, bananas, grapefruit, grapes, lemons, oranges, winter pears. Plenty of Fuerte avocados; some tangerines.

Vegetable offerings feature hardy winter varieties; beets, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, onions, potatoes, spinach, squash and turnips. Lettuce and other salad greens are subject to changing weather and current harvesting problems in the winter lettuce growing areas.
