

SBA Indefinitely Delays New Timber Sale Program

Washington—The small business administration has delayed indefinitely the implementation of its new regulation providing timber sales to small timber operators.

Reps. Edwin R. Durno (R-Ore.) and Jack Westland (R-Wash.) both urged SBA to hold hearings on the new proposal.

The proposal, as announced Dec. 29, was that timber set aside for sale to small timber

operators must be disposed of, in turn, to other small businesses.

That is, if a small logger bids successfully on timber set aside by the forest service or the bureau of land management for small operators only, the logger cannot then sell the logs to a large lumber company. He would be required to sell them to a small lumber company.

Dividing Line
The dividing line between large and small in this business has been set at 250 em-

ployees. To qualify as a small operator, the company must have no more than 250 workers and be independently owned and operated.

Congressman Durno explained that he has heard from a number of timber officials who were protesting this new regulation. He said he had not received any favorable comment on it from Oregon.

An SBA spokesman said the agency has decided not to abide by its original intent to implement the regulation on

Jan. 28. It will not hold hearings, however, as the congressman requested; but testimony will be accepted in writing on the issue.

How long the issue will be held up for possible revision was not determined.

Urges Freeman

Meanwhile, Durno said he has urged the new Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman, to have the forest service reduce its appraised prices for timber sales in Oregon. The forest

production, thereby putting men back to work in the woods and sawmills.

This, he said, would be more effective in reducing unemployment than a federal program of area redevelopment aid, which is presently under consideration in the Senate.

Congressman Durno has completed formation of his congressional office staff by hiring as administrator assistant, Robert B. Parkman, a veteran aide of a number of previous senators from Oregon.

Employed By Cordon
Most recently Parkman was employed by Guy Cordon be-

fore he retired and closed his Washington office several weeks ago. Parkman served as administrative assistant to Senator Cordon for nine years until Cordon's defeat in 1954. He served briefly for Sen. Wayne Morse when Morse succeeded Rufus Holman in 1944.

Durno's personal secretary is Miss Genevieve Cooper, who served in that capacity for Sen. Morse until the senator bolted the Republicans in 1952. Miss Cooper and Parkman both worked for Holman before Morse defeated Holman in 1944.
