Group Tries to Woo Germans to Visit America

Frankfurt — UPI — Vacation travel to the United States has long been a bugaboo for Europeans who have to watch their pocketbooks a little closer than Americans.

A group of businessmen and consular officials here has set out to destroy this bugaboo and give the American tourist trade a much-needed shot in the arm.

U.S. citizens are spending \$1 billion annually more on tourism than foreigners visiting the United States. The group hopes that by stimulating tourist interest for travel to the United States, some of the money which American tourists have been spending abroad will find its way back home.

The group, which calls itself the German Committee for Travel to the U. S. A., is made up of representatives of international airlines, steamship companies, the local American Chamber of Commerce and local American consular officials. Its goal is to convince an estimated 200,000 potential German tourists they can visit the United States as cheaply as they could visit Greece or Italy.

Enjoy Prosperity

Due to the post-war boom in Germany, the German people are enjoying their greatest period of prosperity in history. For thousands of Germans, the opportunity to spend vacations in the New World, which for years had been completely out of the question, has now become a reality.

More and more Germans are joining the ranks of international globetrotters and thousands of them flock to the plush Mediterranean resorts of Spain, Portugal, France, Italy, Yugoslavia and Greece every year.

"The Europeans apparently are unaware of the fact they are passing up some of the best bargains in the world today by not taking advantage of the American travel opportunity," said Leon Kelston, an American consular official. For instance, a ride on the Staten Island ferry (in New York City) costs only a nickel.

And, Kelston added, the longest ride in the world for 15 cents or its equivalent can be provided by the New York subway where one can ride from 30 to 50 miles for the price.

An American interstate bus company, he said, is preparing round-trip tours from London to the United States for approximately the same price as a round trip from London to Greece.

Pressure Brought

Pressure is also being brought to bear on international air and surface carriers to use foresight and reduce fares between Europe and the Western Hemisphere. If prices were reduced, it was pointed out, volume would increase and many transatlantic carriers which, in off-season are carrying as little as one-tenth of capacity, could carry full loads and profit by the volume of trade.

Another thing which may tempt potential European tourists is a booklet entitled "See New York on \$5 a day." The booklet lists all the important points of interest, TV and radio shows, hotels with moderate rates, transportation fares and cost of food.

That may be visiting the U.S.A. on a shoestring, but it's breaking the ice—and that, says the committee, is what counts.

Musicians Local Holds Election

Randy Hugdahl was elected president of the Medford Musicians union, local 597, at a meeting and annual party at Tally Ho Dining Inn.
