

Macmillan To Visit President Kennedy

World Problems To Be Discussed At Conference

Washington—(UPI)—President Kennedy announced today that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan would visit him at the White House during the week of April 2.

The White House said that the President welcomed the chance to get acquainted with the British prime minister and to engage in "a general discussion of world problems."

Macmillan thus becomes the first announced head of a foreign government to arrange a visit with the new American President.

Invited for Talks

The White House said Kennedy had invited Macmillan to come here for "informal talks" while the British leader is in this hemisphere on a trip to the Federation of West Indies.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said he did not think that Kennedy and Macmillan had met previously.

Announcement of the visit was made after Kennedy met with two top military leaders and held his second full cabinet session.

The White House also announced that:

—Gen. Lauris Norstad will continue as supreme commander of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces. The President said after a conference with Norstad and Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, that he was "delighted" that Norstad would remain.

To Appoint Director

—Kennedy intends to appoint William E. Simkin, Wallingford, Pa., to be director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service and Burke Marshall, Chevy Chase, Md., to be assistant attorney general in charge of the civil rights division of the Justice Department.

Simkin, 54, is a labor arbitrator who served with the War Labor Board and Wage Stabilization Board during and after World War II. Marshall, 38, is a Washington attorney.

Boardman Announcement Draws Praise

Salem—(UPI)—Oregon's legislative leaders today praised Gov. Mark Hatfield's announcement that Boeing Airplane Co., Seattle, is leasing the 100,000 acre Space Age industrial park near Boardman in Northeast Oregon.

Legislative sentiment is important because a legislative appropriation probably will be needed to help Boeing pay for moving the U.S. Navy's bombing range from Boardman in Morrow county to

Lake county, 400 miles away. Senate President Harry Boyin (D-Klamath Falls) said "this is wonderful, not only for Eastern Oregon but all of Oregon."

Duncan Pledges Help

House Speaker Robert Duncan (D-Medford) described it as "an extremely important development" and pledged cooperation of the legislature "to the fullest extent" to see the project to a successful conclusion.

Both praised Hatfield and his State Department of Planning and Development for securing Boeing.

Stocks in Hesitant Advance

New York—(UPI)—Stocks made a hesitant advance today.

Industrials and utilities were steady to firm from the outset and rails soon recovered small opening declines.

U.S. Steel led its group with a rise of 1 1/2 as other issues tacked on small fractions.

Chemicals were mixed with Allied ahead 3/4 but Du Pont down 2. Aircrafts and autos showed mostly small fractional gains while vending stocks continued strong featuring Vendo with a 2 point rise.

Among the rails, Southern Railway gained 3/4 while other leaders showed gains of between 1/4 and 3/8 point. In electronics, Texas Instruments lost 1. IBM gained 1, and Beckman tacked on 2/4.

Don't Tell Your Mother-in-Law Just What She Is

Austin, Tex.—(UPI)—Is your mother-in-law in the second degree of affinity or the third degree of consanguinity?

Before you and she get into an argument, those are just terms used by the University of Texas to explain how to comply with the nepotism (appointment of relatives) rules.

"A relative shall be defined," the university said, "as a person related within the first degree of affinity or the second degree of consanguinity, according to the common law... the first degree of affinity includes the spouse of the employee, and the parents, children, brothers and sisters of the employee's spouse.

The second degree of consanguinity includes the parents, children, brothers and sisters, grandparents, uncles and aunts, first cousins, nephews, nieces and grandchildren of the employee.

"The second degree of affinity includes the grandchildren of employee's spouse, and the nephews, nieces, uncles, aunts and first cousins of employee's spouse. The third degree of consanguinity includes the great-grandson, great-grandfather, great-uncle, great-uncle's children, second cousin, first cousin's children, and grand-nephew of the employee."

Bomb Shelters Need Paintings

Chicago—(UPI)—Art dealer Samuel Schwartz thinks no bomb shelter is complete without art.

"Art is no luxury; it's a necessity," he said. "People need something besides each other to look at in a bomb shelter."

Schwartz theorized that art in a bomb shelter might also take one's mind off the dismal surroundings and help relax people.

"Staring at a bomb shelter's blank walls would only add to the jitters which would be natural under the circumstances," he said. He believes cave paintings served these ends for pre-historic man.

Schwartz doesn't think it matters whether bomb shelter paintings are abstract or representational.

"It's more important," he said, "to include something for the taste of everyone in the family. Otherwise, needed individualism might be lost."

Murals might be the most practical form of bomb shelter art, Schwartz suggested, but paintings hung on the wall would have the advantage of being easier to change occasionally.
