Gold Hill Chamber of Commerce Sets Objectives at Thursday Meeting

Gold Hill—The Gold Hill Chamber of Commerce adopted bylaws that will govern the organization and elected two directors to complete a five man board during a luncheon and meeting held Thursday, Feb. 2 at the Gold Hill Grange hall. C. Norman Gail, president presided.

New directors are Charles J. Rogers, salesman in charge of the Gold Hill, W. A. Darling Realtors Inc., and Albert H. Harrison, retired manager-director of the California Freezers association. He is a resident of Sams Valley. Three directors were elected Jan. 9 when the Gold Hill chamber was reactivated. They are Fred Jeddoloh, administrator of Jeddoloh Brothers' Sweet Mills Inc., A. A. Walker, retired grocery man, and H. S. Deuel, manager-partner of Del Rio Orchards.

Jeddoloh acting as chairman of the board of directors presented the by-laws to the members for consideration Thursday. They had been approved by officers and the three directors during a planning session and luncheon Jan. 23.

Jeddoloh pointed out that the most important part of the by-laws are the objectives. These, he said, will be achieved through the people. Objectives of the chamber are to impress, instill and promote a more active spirit of civic pride in the inhabitants of Gold Hill and the surrounding area; to promote and exploit the varied natural resources of the state of Oregon in general, and of Gold Hill and surrounding area in particular; to help, aid and assist every movement for the benefit of the financial, moral, cultural, and educational interests of Gold Hill and its surrounding area; to bring about better acquaintance and closer association between its members and all others engaged in the development of the spiritual and material interests of the Rogue River Valley, and to advance the agricultural, commercial, industrial and civic interests of Gold Hill and surrounding area.

Jeddoloh pointed out that membership will be open to individual persons interested in the promotion of the objectives. Membership he stressed is not limited to business people. The importance of the membership committee was emphasized. And members were urged to be aware of the importance in attending meetings.

Gail told the group that strength in the chamber will be kept up by numbers of members, not just a few.

He appointed a membership committee which includes Delos Walker, proprietor of Walker's Texaco service station, Mayor Milton Stelton, and Mrs. Mary Kell. Mrs. Kell has also been named news reporter for the chamber.

It is hoped that men and women of Sams Valley, Gold Hill and vicinities will join.

Enrollment at Hornbrook School All-Time High

Hornbrook—Enrollment at the Hornbrook grammar school reached an all-time high last month when the number of pupils reached the 125 mark.

With this enrollment, the school is now entitled to five teachers, but until another teacher is assigned by the county school board, Principal Harley Baker has had to do some rearranging of classes. Miss Phyllis Bird, who formerly had the first and second grades, now has the first grade only with 20 pupils.

Mrs. Roy Cummins now has the second and third grades with 38 pupils, while her former fourth graders now are in Ronald Rhodes' room. This gives him fourth, fifth, and sixth grades, totaling 42 students. Harley Baker retains his seventh and eighth graders, numbering 25.

The increases in enrollment is due to the number of people moving in to the community who are employed on Copco's Iron Gate dam project on the Klamath river.

A new project recently undertaken by the school is the publication of a school paper, "The Blue and Gold." The first issue came "of the press" last week. It contains stories of school activities, sports events and timely cartoons submitted by all grades. Editors are Shirley Dickson and Aaron Peters. Reporters, representing the different grades are Barbara Burell, Bobby Hutchins, Steve Eckert, Sheila Yeager, Elaine Eckert, David Rutledge, Ronnie Watt, Kathy Zanotto, Johnny Rutledge and Karen Blakeley.

General manager of the enterprise is Ron Rhodes. The students plan to issue the paper on a monthly basis.
