World Council To Aid Refugees And Homeless

Geneva, Switzerland — Decisions which will aid refugees, homeless and uprooted peoples in many parts of the world were taken at a recent meeting of the Administrative Committee of the Division of Inter-Church Aid in Geneva. To implement these decisions appeals for aid will go out to the World Council of Churches, 178 member churches.

The Division is seeking to raise one million dollars from the churches for relief work in the Congo. Missionary boards are also making appeals, and doctors and nurses are being recruited by the churches to work in the Congo.

Church World Service of the National Council of Churches is undertaking a drive for \$500,000 for Congo needs as the U.S. share of the world appeal.

The committee heard M. Pierre Benignus, of the Paris Mission, on the 10-month long disturbances in the new state of Cameroon, from which he recently returned.

M. Benignus reported that 80 per cent of church property in the districts where fighting has taken place has been destroyed, either by Maquisards or soldiers hunting them. He reported he visited one station that had been bombed by planes.

M. Benignus explained that the attacks on church property were not made because of religious intolerance, but were made because both the Maquisards and the soldiers thought that their enemies were using churches as centers of activity. He was certain that after a year's fighting the people generally were "fed up" with the strife.

The committee authorized the launching of an appeal for up to \$200,000 for the rebuilding work that is necessary and to help the local churches re-orientate themselves to the government's social regrouping program.

Farm Project in Chile
The committee also authorized an appeal for \$80,000 over a three-year period for world church support for the Calama project in Chile, South America. This scheme embraces a small farming project, where better agricultural methods can be studied, and the formation of a social center where mothers can attend courses in home economics, child welfare, and hygiene. Adult education courses will also be provided.

The committee planned to have funds ready to found a third colony of Old Believers if the flow of White Russian refugees from China continues. It is estimated that \$200,000 would be needed to start this third colony in Brazil.

The committee also appealed to the churches to continue their support of the Freedom from Hunger Campaign of the Food and Agriculture Organization.

Roman Catholics Start Lenten Series of Religious Discussion Club Meetings

The Lenten series of religious discussion club meetings is scheduled to begin during the first two weeks in February. It has been announced by Arthur Becker, chairman of discussion clubs for the Sacred Heart parish unit of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

The Rev. R. Morris Devin, missionary to Indonesia, will speak at a missionary rally at 7:45 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 9, at the First Assembly of God church, the Rev. Robert E. Cull, pastor, announced today.

The son of an Assembly of God missionary, Mr. Devin spent five years of his childhood in Indonesia. He returned to Indonesia in 1951 as a missionary and was stationed at Ambon, Maluku. In 1952 he joined the staff of the national worker's training center at Tomohon, Sulawesi (Celebes) where he met and married Miss Joyce M. Munger.

In addition to working at the training center, the Devins ministered in Assemblies of God churches and evangelized in various areas of the islands. The Devins and their three children plan to return to Indonesia in February.

Pastor Cull's message for the Sunday morning worship hour will be "The Spiritual Life" and his subject for the 7:30 p.m. service is "The Tragedy of a Wasted Life."

Four Churches Get \$5,959 for Missions

The four Seventh-Day Adventist churches of the Rogue Valley collected a total of \$5,959.73 in their recent "In-gathering for missions." Volunteers from Eagle Point, Ashland, Valley View and Ashland churches helped in the project.

The funds go toward extending a world ministry of welfare, disaster aid and educational, medical and spiritual services at home and in 188 other countries.

The church operates 384 health and welfare centers in addition to 221 medical units around the world. All activities are coordinated with master plans of civil authorities, church officials said.

Reader friend, the Bible is God's light to man (2 Timothy 3:16-17, 2 Peter 1:19-21, Ephesians 3). Let us study it diligently (2 Timothy 2:15, 2 Peter 1:5-11) and learn to walk in its light (1 John 1:4-7). We must not allow Satan's deceptive devices to hinder our studying the Bible.
