

Tornadoes Thump Comet Five 70-38

Sharper shooting, more effective defense and greater endurance paid off for the Black Tornado Friday night as the Medford high basketball team got back on the victory trail in the Southern Oregon conference by thumping Crater at Central Point. The score was 70 to 38.

The ruggedly-embroidered

conflict opened with a furious battling pace, with first Crater getting the jump and then Medford evening. Tornado hoopmen hopped ahead for keeps at the start of the second quarter and completely dominated the second half.

Bob Quinney, whose 17 first half markers helped Medford to establish first half command, was the game's high tabulator with 27 points on 11 field buckets in 19 tries and five free tosses in six efforts. Aggressive Jim Barry had 13 points for the Tornado

and long range artist Louis Alvarez compiled 11 for the Comets.

45th Shooting
Medford had only a slight margin in the skirmish under the boards as Bryson LaCasse pulled in 16 rebounds for the Comets and Dennis Edwards 12. Quinney collected 11 retrievals for the Tornado. Rebounds were 41 to 38 for Medford.

Tornadoes fired at a 45th clip from the field to Crater's 27.3. The Comets' second half was damaging to their cause.

They made only five buckets in 28 shots for a meager .79.

First quarter score was knotted at 16 each. At the start of the second period, Quinney sank a close to the hoop pusher. Barry followed with a free toss and a bucket on a swipe. That made it 21 to 16. Crater was not able to catch up. The Medford's had a 34 to 25 gap at halftime and after three stanzas the difference was bulging 52 to 20.

LaCasse, with three buckets, was the only one to score from the field for Crater in the second period and he and Loyal Higinbotham put in the two third quarter fielders for the Comets.

Comets Tally First

Crater scored first in the game, had the lead five times on Medford in the opening chukker and once was in front 12 to 8. Each time the Tornado caught up and on one occasion the Medford's popped ahead 14 to 12. Quinney got eight of his counters in this stage of the struggle and Alvarez potted seven.

While LaCasse and Edwards teamed for some rugged effort under the boards, Dick Ragdale, Barry, Quinney and Bruce Bray turned in stiff defense for the Tornado. Crater's Higinbotham, who has been second high point producer in the loop, was limited to five counters.

Play was at times erratic on the part of both clubs. But, the Tornado was better able to recover from miscues and take advantage of the Comet errors.

Crater Jayvees Win

Paul Branson dunked two free tosses with 14 seconds left to play for a 39 to 38 Crater nod in the junior varsity game. Medford won the sophomore scrape handily 44 to 25.

Medford jayvee had a chance to tie or win with two seconds left. Mike Neathamer missed on a one-and-one free toss try and Crater grabbed the rebound. The Junior Tornado had a 38 to 35 margin with less than two minutes to play when Gibb Mitchell put in two free tosses but Pat Pepper swished a long push with 45 seconds remaining for 38-37.

Crater went into the last panel ahead 31 to 29. Medford went on top 32 to 31. The count was tied at 32 and Crater went on top 34 to 32. Medford knotted and went in front 36 to 34. The Comets headed 31 to 8 at the quarter and 29 to 19 at the half. Howard Tomlinson had 11 points for Crater and Neathamer 10 for Medford.

Tornado sophs had 9 to 3, 21 to 14 and 33 to 21 period standings. Dennis Salyers had nine points, and Harold Reid, Mike Rallton and Darryl Stockton each eight for Medford and Mike Gardener eight for Crater.

Each of Friday's winners scored their third win over its respective rival.

Prospect high's Cougars pushed into strong advantage in the Jackson County B Basketball league Friday night by outlasting their toughest opposition for the mantle, St. Mary's of Medford, 37 to 34.

Victory in the scuffle marked by potent defense on each side restored the Cougars to the league leadership. It was the second win over St. Mary's in three games for Prospect. The teams meet again at Medford on Feb. 14 in the regular season finale. Cougars entertain cellarite Butte Falls this Tuesday.

Prospect on Friday had a 10-point lead with two minutes to go. St. Mary's whittled this 25 to 35 deficit down with a full court press seven points to 32 to 35 with 54 seconds left and the Cougar edge was just 35 to 34 with 21 seconds to go.

Then, Craig Gardner put in both free efforts on a one and one foul. St. Mary's tried a shot and Prospect rebounded. The Cougars lost the ball to the SM press but time ran out on the Crusaders.

Crusaders Lead

St. Mary's got a 7 to 0 head start in the game with Dick Evans putting in three jumpers. Terry and Craig Gardner sank fielders for the Cougars. Bob Fitch got two buckets and Stan Payne a free toss for a 9 to 8 quarter lead for the Prospectors. Cougars had gaps of 17 to 13 at the half and 27 to 21 after three periods. Terry Gardner bolstered Prospect with six points in the second canto.

Prospect on the work of Terry Gardner and Chuck Poole had the edge in rebounding. The tremendous defense saw the Cougars zoning and SM using stuffing man-to-man. Prospect headed in field goaling 14 to 11 and the Crusaders in gifters 12 to 9.

Grants Pass connected from the field from long and far and found the Ashland defense vulnerable across the middle as Clyde Murray ran up a 23-point scoring total. His points were high for the combat and Stewart Hedges had 15 for Ashland.

Corvallis — UPB — Scrappy Oregon battled back from a six-point halftime deficit to defeat Oregon State 58-55 in overtime in college basketball action Friday night.

A crowd of 9,505 watched Charlie Warren and Glenn Moore carry the Ducks to their victory after Oregon State had gone out in front 31-25 at halftime.

Warren, a 6-foot-4 junior forward, hit four points in the overtime period after regulation play ended at 49-49 to pace his team with 14 and Moore, 6-foot-7 junior center, added 13.

Mack, Hayes Shine — But it was guards John Mack and Leon Hayes who added the finishing touches for the Ducks. Mack hit a field goal to put his team ahead to stay in the overtime period and Hayes wrapped it up with three free throws.

The victory ran Oregon's

record to 11-5 for the season. Oregon State is now 11-8. Terry Baker of Oregon State topped his club with 14 points.

Oregon outshot the Beavers from the field. The Ducks hit 20 of 56 shots for a .358 average and Oregon State was 19 for 59 for .320. Oregon had the edge in rebounds, 47-45.

Denver Grid Stars May Jump to Tulsa

Tulsa, Okla. — UPB — Denver university's football players could be the mainstays of the University of Tulsa team next season if Ramiro Escandon, a much-sought quarterback, elects to move here.

Ten of his teammates and line coach Bob Bollinger changed to Tulsa after D. U. dropped football and Tulsa had a coaching staff shakeup.

Escandon visited the T. U. campus this week but his decision on whether to transfer was pending. The poised, 180-pounder is sought by several mentors, including Tulsa's new head coach Glenn Dobbs.

Replaces Brother

Dobbs replaced his younger brother, Bobby, as head coach at Tulsa when the younger man recently accepted a professional football coaching job at Calgary, Alta. Tulsa's respected quarterback Jerry Keeling plans to play at Calgary.

The new mentor inherited a team hit by graduation, like Keeling, and a freshman squad which was far below expectations.

Dobbs started a player recruiting program and so far 18 men have transferred here, including two from Marquette university, six junior college

men and the Denver transfers. The men from Colorado included five freshmen and five men with varsity experience.

Tulsa got another promising signal caller, Gene Hart, a native Tulsan with junior college experience and recognition whose main drawback may be his size.

Crater Tips North Ninth

Central Point — Vern Swanson got a field goal and Darrell Summerfield two free tosses in overtime Friday to enable the Crater high freshmen to beat the North Grants Pass ninth grade hoopsters 43 to 41.

Burleson Wins

Christ Church, N.Z. — UPB — Dyrrol Burleson of the University of Oregon continued to impress on his New Zealand tour today when he defeated Olympic 800-meter champion Peter Snell by two yards in an 880-yard run.

Roger Moens of Belgium and George Kerr of Jamaica, who occupied the runner-up slots to Snell in the Olympics, were third and fourth Saturday.

Freed, of Salt Lake City
