The stadium would be built on a 92-acre site in the North Bank Park area across the Willamette river from the campus and would seat 40,000 people along the side-lines. The stadium, which would be financed by private contributions and other non-tax monies, would have 18,000 covered seats and 22,000 uncovered seats. Further cost and financing studies are now underway, Chairman Joe McKeown of Coos Bay said in his announcement.

## UO Stadium Plans Tentatively Okehed

Eugene—UPI—Tentative acceptance of plans for a new 40,000-seat University of Oregon football stadium was announced Saturday.

The stadium is to be built in the north bank park area across the Willamette river from the campus. No date has been set, but the stadium has been listed in building plans for the 1963-65 biennium.

Joseph McKeown of Coos Bay, chairman of the athletic advisory committee of the Alumni association, said "We are most pleased with the results of the work done by the stadium building subcommittee of Marshall Bessonetie of Medford and Athletic Director Leo Harris, and I think the result of their studies is a real step toward a new stadium at Eugene."

**92 Acre Site**—Bessonetie and Harris studied a number of stadium plans on a cross-country trip and that a model had been prepared based on engineering studies of the local site, which covers 92 acres.

McKeown said the committee still must obtain and study final cost estimates and then prepare plans for financing the project. He said he felt the design was economical and financing "will involve no tax monies."

The model has all 40,000 seats on the sidelines with no end zone seats except for a novel and new "view" type 400 cars in the end zone. Fans could watch games there without leaving their automobiles. **20,000 Seats Each Side**—Each side of the proposed plan has 20,000 seats with 11,000 being built of concrete on a filled area covering 50 rows and the other 9,000 in 34 rows in a reinforced concrete structure on top of the fill.
