First Lady To Disclose Discoveries

Washington - (UPI)—What are the "startling discoveries" Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy has made about the White House?

This was the mystery intriguing the capital today. The first lady's press secretary, Miss Pamela Turnure, made the titillating disclosure Friday that Mrs. Kennedy came across startling discoveries during her first two weeks in the executive mansion.

Mrs. Turnure said the first lady would make the discoveries public soon. She said she did not know what they were. The attractive press secretary would say only that Mrs. Kennedy "has learned some startling things she wants to share."

These things were discovered, Miss Turnure said, during Mrs. Kennedy's tours of the White House with members of the Fine Arts commission. Capital observers speculated about what the discoveries might be.

Had Mrs. Kennedy discovered secret passageways or rooms in the White House? Were some of the historic treasures missing? Were heretofore unknown valuable paintings and furnishings found?

Keep watching for the startling conclusion of the "mystery of the White House discoveries."
