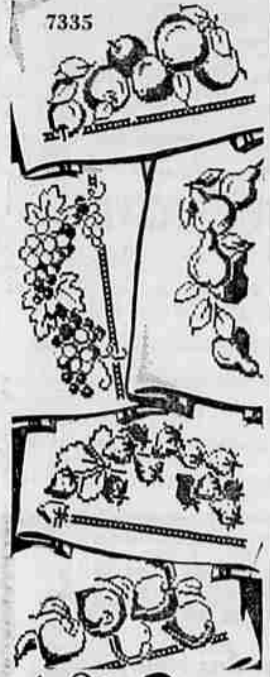

Washington—Secretary of State Dean Rusk held a 45-minute briefing session Saturday with House and Senate delegates to the first U.S.-Mexican inter-parliamentary council meeting which will begin tomorrow in Guadalajara, Mexico.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and Assistant Secretaries of State Thomas Mann and William B. Macomber also sat in for the talks at the capitol. Rusk later visited briefly with Johnson in the latter's office.

The Congressional delegation leaves today to meet with a similar group of Mexican lawmakers. The two delegations will discuss trade and investment, cultural interchange, and "other matters of mutual interest." Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said,

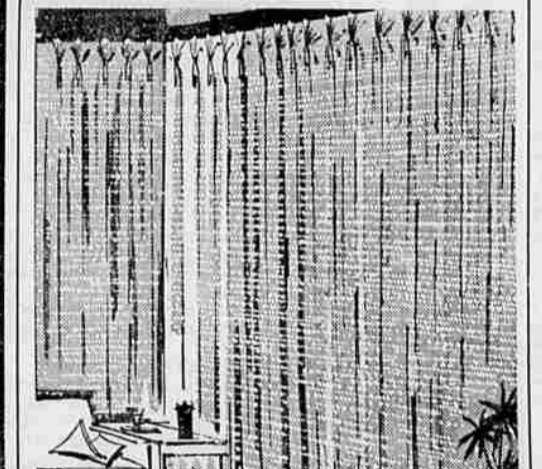

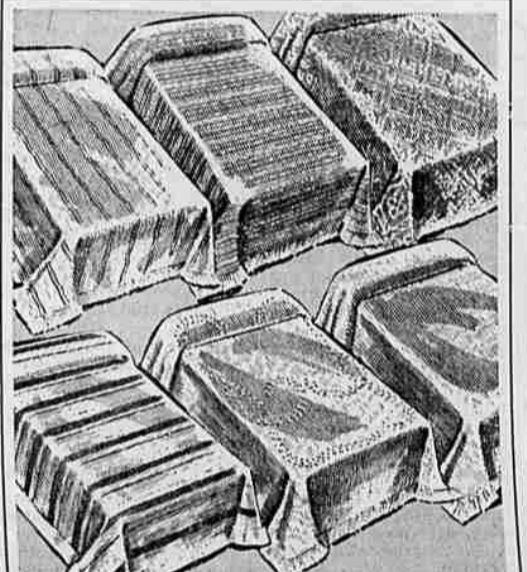

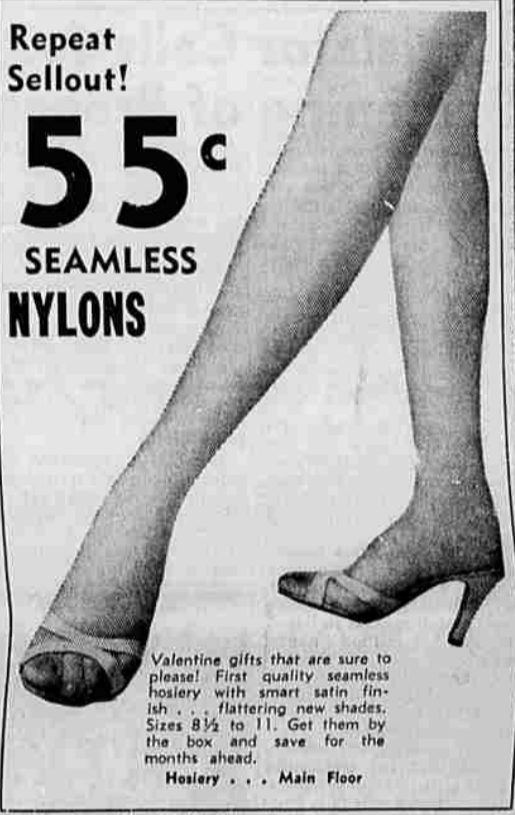
