

Architects Urged To Make Study of Primitive Works

New York, N.Y.—(Scientific American Feature)—In terms of performance the structures erected by primitive, preliterate people considerably outdistance those of contemporary architects, according to James Marston Fitch and Daniel P. Brand, respectively associate professor of history in the school of architecture at Columbia University and a Florida architect.

Faced by the necessity of coping with an environment that is scarcely ever genial and of building with materials that are often appallingly meager in quantity or restricted in kind, primitive architects have evolved a series of

Spaniards Change When Behind Wheel of A Car

Madrid - (UPI) - Spain, the country of siestas and slowness, has caught up with the rush of the modern world in at least one way - traffic. Give a courteous, old-world, hand-kissing Spaniard a car and some change takes place deep down inside him. Possibly it isn't quite as spectacular as the movie horror of a man becoming a werewolf, but the effect is about the same.

Speed is no object, just as long as there is plenty of it. There are plenty of police and traffic lights around, but they don't help an awful lot.

Whereas a few years ago the streets of Madrid were uncrowded and easy to drive in, the growing wealth of Spain has clogged them with ever-increasing traffic. Unfortunately, as Spain has increased the number of cars, it has not increased necessary control on the drivers.

Getting a driver's license in Spain is difficult. There is a complicated written test of some 50 questions. But if that is passed, then the would-be driver is almost to the raceway. The driving section of the test consists of one turn around a local park. If you don't hit a tree, you're in.

On Your Own
Once into traffic you're on your own. The only thing to remember is that each man behind the wheel of a car feels that God granted him at least one thing - the right of way.

The huge fleet of taxis, most of them looking at least 100 years old, don't help. Most of them go about five miles an hour and give faster drivers a sort of moving slalom course to weave in and out of.

There also are little, bug-like cars called "sin-sins" that join with the motorcycles and mopeds to fill any spare inches between cars.

The translation of "sin-sin" means "without - without," which comes from the phrase referring to the drivers of the little bugs: "Without enough money to buy a car and without enough guts to ride a motorcycle."

Wooden Carts
On top of all this, every morning hundreds of huge-wheeled wooden carts pulled by donkeys lumber into the city to take out the trash. They finish picking up the trash at the height of the rush hour and begin their slow way out of town. On the narrow side streets of Madrid traffic moves just as fast as the slowest donkey.

Perhaps the Spanish driver lacks the daring of the French driver, the stubbornness of the English driver or the vocabulary of the Italian driver. But he is learning.

Three Major Counts Listed for Hiring Of Baby Sitters

New York - (UPI) - For safety's sake and peace of mind, hire only baby sitters who come well recommended, who have mature judgment and who enjoy children.

And if you can't be satisfied on all three counts, forget about going out.

The requisites for safety where baby sitters are concerned are part of a new report drawn up by the accident prevention committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The report is titled: "Safety tips for Parents Hiring Baby Sitters."

Leave Phone Number
The committee also advises parents to:

- Tell the baby sitter where you will be and leave the phone number where you can be reached.

- Leave the baby sitter the phone number of the local police department and the children's doctor.

- Leave exact instructions as to the care of the children, what they are to eat, when they are to go to bed and so on.

- Review with the baby sitter various escape routes in case of fire.

The committee's report contains general and specific instructions for the baby sitter also.

"As a baby sitter, remember that these parents have entrusted you with their most valuable and precious possession," the committee said.

Loving Care Succeeds
"Be sure that your actions justify this faith in you. If the children awaken crying and do not feel feverish, tender or loving care will usually be successful in quieting them."

"When an infant is restless and not feverish, burping, changing or feeding may also be needed. If nothing suffices, call the parents."

Among the specific instructions for the baby sitters are the following:

- In case of illness or accident, contact the parents at once. If they are not available, call their doctor. If their doctor is not available, call your own doctor.
