Word has been received here of the death Jan. 29 in Baker, Ore., of Mrs. Annie Pearl Beale, 87, of New Bridge, Ore., former Jackson county resident. She was born Oct. 12, 1873, near Wichita, Kans.

Her family moved to Colorado, Washington and Walla Walla, Ore., prior to moving to Union Creek in 1887. She married Christopher C. Beale Oct. 10, 1898, at the U. S. Hotel in Jacksonville. A violinist, she won many fiddlers' contests and also wrote verse and articles for Sunset magazine, the Canyonville Call and several mining publications.

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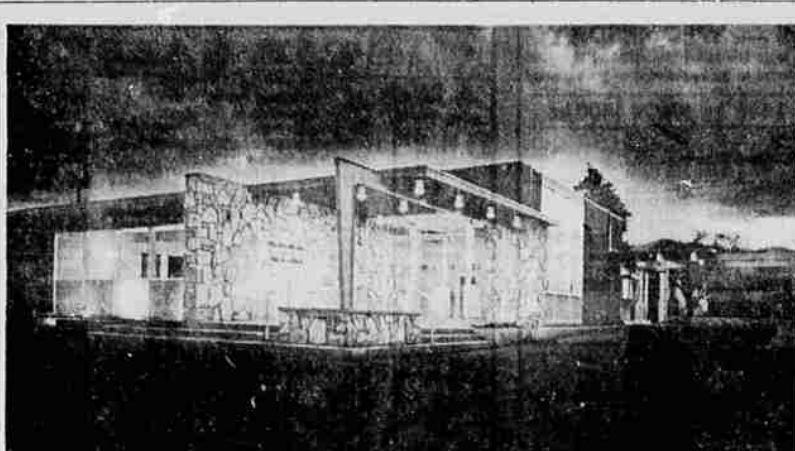
