SHORTENING THE MISSILE GAP

Washington — The remarkable success of the first full-scale test of the Minuteman intercontinental missile is likely to prove a crucially important event in several different ways.

Its most obvious effect is to strengthen the hand of the Air Force in the current Pentagon debate about future defense policy. Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara is supposed to put an end to the debate, and to produce a new defense design by mid-February. McNamara's decision can hardly fail to be influenced by the demonstration that Minuteman is a practical weapon, inside of a weapons designer's gamble.

With just this end in view, Secretary of the Air Force Eugene Zuckert and the air staff are already pressing for an important expansion of the previously authorized Minuteman program.

Under severe Congressional pressure, the reluctant Eisenhower defense planners some time ago accelerated the Minuteman program to allow production of operational missiles at the earliest practicable date — the end of 1962. But although they finally approved production of Minuteman with maximum speed, they refused to approve production of Minuteman in maximum quantity.

Thus the program that Secretary McNamara and Zuckert inherited called for a peak output of 30 Minuteman missiles per month, on a single production line. What Secretary Zuckert and the air staff now want is the immediate addition of a second production line.

The second line can be completed soon enough to reach peak output at about the same time as the already approved production line. Hence the Strategic Air Command, which will now get its first operational Minuteman missile towards the end of 1962, can also count on 60 Minuteman per month by the end of the first quarter of 1963. In this manner, for the first time, a real shortening of the missile gap can now be hoped for.

IF DECIDED ON, the stepped-up Minuteman program will be quite different in kind from the other proposed expedients for dealing with the missile gap. It will not be an emergency measure, like expansion of the Strategic Air Command's airborne alert. It will not add to the national arsenal new weapons which are soon to become obsolete, like the liquid fueled Atlas and Titan missiles. Instead, it will strengthen SAC with second-generation ICBMs of the most advanced existing design.

This is because Minuteman is a solid-fueled rocket, with all the advantages of vastly greater mobility and greater ease of handling that go with solid fuels. It has only one defect. Like the Navy's Polaris, Minuteman's thrust is not as powerful as could be desired. Hence, again like Polaris, Minuteman cannot carry the weight of warhead that the designers have already built into the liquid fueled missiles. But this debit in the balance sheet is heavily outweighed by the credits.

Short Course for Foresters Planned At Oregon State

Corvallis — A variable plot cruising short course will be given by the Oregon State college school of forestry Feb. 22 to 24 as a service to Northwest foresters.

The three-day course has been scheduled again this year to allow practicing foresters to learn the new cruising method that reduces errors and speeds field work. The new system, sometimes called wedge cruising, was developed in Europe and introduced into the United States in 1952.

It has been field tested in both Douglas fir and pine timber types during the last five years with excellent results, according to John F. Bell, professor of forest management who is short course director.

To Answer Questions — A feature of this year's fifth annual course will be a half-day session devoted to answering questions concerning field application of variable plot cruising theory.

Instructors for the course will include Bell, J. R. Dilworth, head of the forest management department; Forrest W. Jones, U.S. forest service, Portland; Edwin Zaidler, bureau of land management, Portland; and Lucien B. Alexander of Mason, Bruce, and Girard, consulting foresters, Portland.

Enrollment in the short course will be limited. Bell said to assure individual instruction. Information about registration and other details may be obtained by writing the school of forestry, Oregon State college, Corvallis.

UN, Time Major Factors in Peace, Landon Declares

Liberal, Kan.—UPI—Alt M. Landon, former governor of Kansas and republican presidential candidate, has warned that "this totally new world has radically and dramatically changed the pattern of war and peace."

Landon told persons attending the annual Liberal Rotary Club banquet that the United Nations and time are the most important factors in working out the conflicts between the East and West.

"What is most needed in the world today is time—time to assimilate, time to adapt, to understand," he said.

"The one place in the world today providing time is the United Nations. The real answer for peace, at the moment, is to provide time to make peace possible."

UN Providing Time — Landon said the United Nations was providing this time because "any institution that restrains the quick decision, the impulsive action and reaction, that cushions shock . . . that institution is a primary requisite for avoiding the holocaust of thermonuclear war."

"What the United Nations has done is provide, by its seemingly useless action, time to delay the day of reckoning that other political forces will have the time and the room to bring their pressure to bear," he continued.

Landon also warned of the danger of allowing the foreign policy of the western alliance to drift.
