Bowls Here Monday

Buzz Fazio To Give Bowling Exhibition

Buzz Fazio, one of the greatest bowlers of all time will display his ability here on Monday, Feb. 13.

The diminutive Brunswick staff of champions member is scheduled for 2 and 8 p.m. appearances at Medford Bowling lanes. Fred Anderson, proprietor of the lanes, said Fazio will roll exhibition matches and give free instruction.

Dick Weber, Gary Couch and Charles McWhorter will face Fazio one game each in the evening. They won the right to meet the star knegler by participation in an elimination event.

Fazio will oppose three junior bowlers in the afternoon. Although small in size—only 5-6, 145 pounds—Fazio has been a giant on the lanes. He's one of the few bowlers in history recognized as both a top team player and individual star.

Biggest Victories

Some of his biggest victories were achieved in the American Bowling Congress Masters, the Detroit Times Classic three times, the 1958 Michigan State All Events and

the Maxie Kosof Endurance Classic three times. In the grueling 40-game endurance test, Buzz holds two records—highest game, 200, and most total pins, 8,555 (an average of better than 213).

As a team captain, the 28-year veteran led the historic Strohs of Detroit to three straight BPA national team match game championships and one ABC team all-events title.

Also as captain, Fazio directed Falstaff to the 1958 ABC team and team all events championship.

His other achievements include a record-setting 300 game in the 1950 All-Star Tournament; five-time billing as All-American; reign as "King of Bowling" in Detroit for 1955; first 800 series on live TV; and 28,300 games.

Red Raiders Split With OCE Wolves

Monmouth—This was the week end to halt losing streaks in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

Southern Oregon's basketball crew on Friday ended a seven-game winless skein by rallying to a 72 to 44 triumph over Oregon college. Saturday afternoon, the Wolves of OCE turned the tables. They bounced the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon 84 to 62. This victory was the first for the Wolves after 10 straight defeats.

Second half action told the story. In each case, the victor took advantage of the adversaries scoring drought to gain command. The Wolves led 27 to 25 at halftime Friday. Ted Schopf reportedly administered a tongue lashing to the Raiders during intermission. They responded to romp away from OCE.

Yesterday, Oregon college had a 30 to 28 halftime gap. Whatever Schopf had to say in the dressing room during the rest was to no avail. The Wolves blazed away, while the Raiders turned cold, and outdistanced the Southern Oregon men.

Furious Fast Break

There were around 11 minutes to go before SOC got its first goal of the second half Saturday. The Raiders picked up four free shots while misfiring from the field. Meanwhile, OCE moved to a 47 to 32 margin.

Oregon College cagers ripped the Southern Oregon zone with a furious fast break and got close in shots as the Raiders wilted. The Wolves swished at a 516 clip from the field and the Raiders cashed in at a rate of just 317.

Leading the OCE parade were John Rankin with 23 points and Dennis Spencer with 25. Gordon Carrigan, who made 12 of the last 14 SOC points, had 21 for the afternoon. He also had 10 rebounds as did Tony Wolf and Bill Habel of the Wolves.

For an eight-minute period in the second half Friday night, OCE went without a point. SOC during this time ran up 18 to boost a 39 to 36 difference to 57 to 38. When Spencer finally broke the Wolves' cold spell, less than five minutes remained to play. Off and Running

The Raiders lit out from the second half tipoff. Jerry Shults pulled the Ashland school even at 27-all. Carrigan's up shot put SOC ahead for good. Then, Bob Jensen, sophomore from Mapleton, making his first varsity start, hit a driver for 31 to 27. SOC was off and running.

John Payne, who led the Ashland school with 21 points and 12 rebounds, headed the second half drive with 14 of his points and his backboard play. Carrigan had a 13 point total and the spirited Jensen cleared the boards 10 times. Toby Wolf's nine points were tops for OCE and Bob Colburn had 11 rebounds.

Southern Oregon displayed a good zone defense during the evening. In the first half the Wolves were able to hit over it. Over the last 20 minutes many of their shots were forced and missed.

The Raiders fired at a 424 field clip on Friday while OCE managed just 232.

Men's Church Cage Loop Has Two-Way Tie

Phoenix Presbyterian and First Methodist were tied for first place after last week's games in the men's church basketball league here.

Phoenix kicked First Baptist 46 to 41 in a Thursday game close all the way to break a three-way knot for top spot. The Methodists had it easier, taking a win by forfeit over First Christian. YMCA beat First Nazarene on Thursday 45 to 41.

Tom Atchison led Presby with 19 points while Wayne Zimmer had 13 for the Baptists, who had 24 to 23 edge at the half.

Mel Jackson put in 20 points and Fred Sapp 13 for YMCA and Ron Wheeler 16 for Nazarene. The Nazarenes had 23 to 18 midway margin. Y didn't score at all in the third quarter and Nazarene got only one point. There were 46 fouls in the game and five men fouled out.

The Trojans, led by Olympians Murray Rose by Australia and Lance Larson, defeated UCLA, 61-32, and California, 55-28. UCLA beat Cal, 60-35.

Improved Idaho Vandals Snap Ducks' Win Streak

Eugene—The Oregon Ducks had their winning streak snapped at seven Friday night.

The Ducks fell before Idaho's improved Vandals 61-57. Despite the loss, they kept the lead in the Northwest college basketball independent's race for an at-large NCAA Far West playoff spot.

Oregon stands 12-8. Both Seattle and Oregon State are 12-7.

Idaho won in the final four minutes after Oregon overcame a 13-point deficit in the early minutes of the first half and went ahead by as much as 10 in the second half.

Chuck White and Dale James paced the Vandals' offense. White pumped in 21 points and James had 18.

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Palmer Grabs Palm Springs Lead

Phoenix, Ariz.—(UPI)—Incomparable Arnold Palmer blizzared the Arizona Country club course with a 33-33-66 Today and vaulted into the third round lead of the \$30,000 Phoenix Open Golf tournament with a 54-hole score of 200.

While second round leader Henry Williams skyed to a six-over par 76 to fall off the pace, Palmer grabbed a two-stroke lead from defending champ Jack Fleck, Los Angeles, who posted a 67 for a 202.

Williams had to sink a 25-foot putt on the last hole for a 76 and a 207—seven strokes off the pace.

Flawless Golf

Palmer, tagged by a crowd of nearly 10,000 around the sun-baked course, played flawless golf, the kind that won him the National Open, The Masters and six other tournaments last year. He already

has won one event this season—the San Diego Open.

Bill Collins, Crystal River, Fla., with a 68 and Don January, Dallas, Tex., with a 69, were tied at 203.

January was helped along with an eagle-two on the 380-yard 13th hole when he knocked in a 85-yard wedge shot.

Tied at 205 were Dave Marr, Sun City, Ariz., who had a 72, and Johnny Pott, Shreveport, La., who had a 70.

Palmer had one of his better putting performances of this year. He had five birdies as he rolled his putts from 20, 12, 10 and six feet. His other bird came when he got on in two on the 523-yard par five 18th and two-putted.

29 Putts

His only bogey was on the par-three fifth hole when he took three from the edge of the green. He missed four greens and took 29 putts.

A pro-amateur spring tourney, the Southern Oregon Junior tourney and the Southern Oregon Golf championships are the principal links events slated this year at Rogue Valley Country club according to the schedule listed in the club's February bulletin.

The tour of Oregon pros to southern Oregon will see play at RVCC on March 27 and 28 after March 26 rivalry at Roseburg. Junior tourney action is set for July 17 and 18 and the 33rd annual Southern Oregon championships will run from Aug. 30 through Sept. 4.

The holiday handicap at the local links will end on March 1. Spring handicap play runs Feb. 25 through May 7 and the men's two-ball partnership event from May 6 through June 11. Men's club championship action is to be June 10 through Aug. 13 with senior title play June 17 through Aug. 13. The fall handicap will run Sept. 2 through Nov. 12, and the holiday handicap will begin on Dec. 1.

The awards certified Bellino UPI All-American back, UPI Player of the Year and UPI Back of the Year.

Bellino also received the Annapolis Touchdown club's Silver Helmet award and was commissioned an "Admiral of the Chesapeake Bay" by Gov. J. Millard Tawes.

Braun was referring to the New York Knickerbockers' inability to get a shot off with five seconds remaining that cost his team a 133-131 National Basketball Association decision to the Philadelphia Warriors.

New York had trimmed the Warrior margin from 130-121 to 133-131 when the Knicks received a chance for a last ditch shot.

The Knicks tried to get off the possible tying basket, but were stymied by the elongated arms of 7-2 Wilt Chamberlain who appeared to be everywhere at once.

The name of Wilt just didn't apply to the Philadelphia skyscraper as he played his 27th straight game without substitution and scored 48 points.

The Eastern division-leading Boston Celtics had their margin trimmed to six games over the second-place Warriors when the Detroit Pistons racked up a 137-134 victory in the only other NBA action.
