

Moyer Wins in Substitute Role

New York—UPI—Substitute Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., beat welterweight contender Charley Scott of Philadelphia Saturday night with persistent left jabs and short rights for a unanimous 10-round decision in their nationally televised fight at Madison Square Garden.

Moyer, scaling 159½ pounds to Scott's 147, staggered the Philadelphian in the first round, but Scott came back to make a great fight in which he started Moyer's nose bleeding in the second round and gashed his right brow in the seventh.

There were no knockdowns. Favor Moyer.

The three ring officials favored 21-year-old Moyer on a rounds basis as follows: referee Al Berl, 6-3-1, Judge Artie Alda, 5-4-1, and Judge Tony Rossi, 7-2-1. The United Press International had Moyer ahead, 6-4.

Moyer, who recently out-

grew the welterweight division, replaced welterweight contender Federico Thompson of Argentina as Scott's opponent. Federico withdrew last week because of slow-healing mouth cuts suffered in his title fight with champion Benny Kid Paret, Dec. 10.

Despite his substitute role, heavy support in the late betting sent Moyer into the ring favored at 6-5.

The crowd, estimated at 3,000, witnessed an excellent fight in which each boxer tried to keep the pressure on the other.

All three ring officials agreed on giving brown-haired Denny the first, third and eighth rounds. But they were unanimous only in the seventh for Scott.

Sherry Gets Raise for Relief Work

United Press International Larry Sherry of the Dodgers is one of those guys who doesn't know when he's well off.

The 25-year-old native of Los Angeles keeps insisting he'd like to be a starting pitcher, but for two straight years now he's been rewarded for his relief stints.

Sherry practically held the Dodger pitching staff together down the 1959 National league pennant stretch and then followed with 12 2/3 innings of clutch hurling in the World Series with the Chicago White Sox.

That earned him nearly a 100 per cent boost in pay to \$15,000 for 1960 and a chance to work as a starting pitcher. But Sherry, who gets by on a good fast ball and curve, fumbled and stumbled and finally wound up back in the bullpen.

Rebuilds Confidence
The familiar surroundings seemed to help his confidence and he finished the season by winning eight of his last 11 decisions for a season mark of 14-10 and a 3.80 earned run average.

The Dodgers felt that was sufficient to warrant another raise—about \$4,000 worth—to place the likeable right-hander in the \$19,000 bracket. Sherry, modestly claiming he'd like another chance as a starter, agreed to the terms, along with catcher John Roseboro, outfielder Ron Fairly, rookie infielder Tim Lincecum and utility player Al Norris.

Chain-Smoking Hungarian Wins Mile

Philadelphian—UPI—Istvan Rozsavolgyi, the man who chased Ron Delaney to his indoor mile record and who believes he himself will break it some day, glowed Saturday in the satisfaction of wiping one of the Irish harrier's records from the books.

The chain-smoking Hungarian ripped into Ron's record for the Philadelphia Inquirer mile Friday night and clipped four tenths of a second from the Delaney mark before a capacity 10,650 fans at the Inquirer Charities' 17th annual games.

It was the fastest mile of the current indoor season.

"I finally made a record in the United States," Istvan said through an interpreter, pointing to the posted time of 4:05.8.

Don Bragg, upset by young Henry Wadsworth in the Millrose Games last week, turned the tables on the Florida vaulter by winning at 15 feet, 5 inches, the best vault of the indoor season.

Islanders Buy 3 PCL Players
Honolulu—UPI—Nick Morgan Jr. has announced the purchase of three Pacific Coast league players for his Hawaii Islanders baseball team.

They are Chuck Harmon and Sam Miley, both from the Salt Lake City Bees and Milt Smith of the defunct Sacramento team.

Harmon and Smith have had some major league experience.

Thirty-five year old Harmon previously played with the Cincinnati Reds, St. Louis Cardinals and Philadelphia Phillies.

He was voted Salt Lakes "Player of the Year" in 1959 after the Bees had won their first league championship.

Smith, 30, had a short trial with the Reds in 1955. Last year, he batted .255 in 140 games for the Solons.

Miley, 28, comes to the islands with three solid years in the PCL as a hitter. In 1958, he hit .344 in 125 games, followed by a .333 mark in 138 games in 1959 and .319 last year.

Phoenix put in only 14 of 65 field tries for 214 average while the Honkers connected on 20 of 55 for .364. Gerald Sloper of Phoenix and Gary and Larry Peters of Lakeview each had 13 points.

A fast start also paid off for Henley. The Hornets, using a fast break and long passes, had a 26 to 9 first quarter bulge. With three minutes to go, however, Hen-

ley lead only 62 to 61. Two free shots by Bert Allbritton helped the Klamath county club shake off the threat.

Scores were 37 to 20 and 38 to 47 at halftime with the Hornets ahead. Ray Brown put in 22 counters for Henley and Dan Johnson and Chuck Baird of IV and Allbritton each had 15.

In junior varsity play Phoenix beat Lakeview 51 to 19 with 14 to 3, 30 to 8 and 36 to 13 quarter standings, and Henley took its 16th straight win 43 to 28 by topping IV.
