The group discussed the role of the home, school, the church and community in effective citizenship training.

A "Dragnet-type" skit, "The Missing Subscriber," was presented by Mrs. Richard A. Pfeiffer, Mrs. Clifford Sikes, Larry DeHaven and Douglas Harshbarger. Mr. Harshbarger, the new English teacher and wrestling coach at Eagle Point High school, was introduced by Mrs. Raymond Charters, magazine chairman. Accordionist Diane Putman provided background music.

Mrs. William Pomeroy reported on legislation which is to be introduced into the state legislature this session.

Mrs. DeHaven was authorized to appoint a committee to set up a new honor code of ethics for high school students which would be endorsed by the PTSA.

Gifts to State Hospital Welcomed by Patients

Applegate Valley—"Even a comic book makes them happy. A room is brightened with Valentines pinned on the wall or a yarn doll tied to a crib."

This was the way Mrs. Robert Minear, South Stage road, described the eagerness with which gift articles are received at the Oregon State hospital, Salem and at Fairview home, when she spoke to women of Upper Applegate Home Extension unit meeting recently at the home of Mrs. Ray Lampkin.

"Sometimes a shoe store will send 200 pairs of surplus high heel shoes, and the girls have a real party wearing them. They also enjoy the discarded jewelry sent occasionally by a jewelry store," Mrs. Minear related.

Local unit women expressed a desire to send gift items throughout the year instead of waiting until Christmas. Mrs. Minear said that all kinds of articles are usable throughout the year.

"Someone is always having a birthday, and even magazines and bean bags are much enjoyed," the speaker said, adding that even old Christmas cards can be used by the children for play purposes any time. Special celebrations are arranged for Fourth of July and Christmas. Discarded nylon hose is acceptable for occupational therapy in weaving, rug, and clothing, with the exception of wools and shoes, is acceptable.

Those wishing to send articles to the home may leave them any time with Mrs. Harry Watson at Bear Creek motel.

Mrs. Minear is one of eight members from throughout the state on the committee of visitors for the Fairview home for mentally retarded children.

She was invited to speak at the unit meeting by Mrs. Lynn Valentine, who believed a follow-up talk on Christmas gift items would be of interest in view of the fact that the local unit and many others in the county send large quantities of gifts at Christmas time.

There were 250 pounds of gifts last Christmas, the first time that each patient had received a gift. The packages were wrapped and sorted to suit the types of patients at a control depot maintained by the Salem Mental Health association.

At the Fairview home gifts were distributed by Santa Claus, Mrs. Minear said. Secretaries sent out 450 thank-

you letters for the gifts received at Christmas.

Mrs. Minear briefly described Fairview, saying there are 2,820 patients there; 118 from Jackson county. Two hundred of them work in shops and industries about the institution. The oldest patient is 85, the youngest, infants of six months. Many are there for their lifetime. Their schooling is formal, much as the public schools, and many patients are trained in some line of work. Boys learn to handle hammer and saw and do general work as farmer's helpers. Others work in poultry, dairy, and bakery departments at the school. Some are in orchard work. Girls are limited to household and laundry duties.

Supervised by School.

Mrs. Minear said that 25 per cent of the youngsters are trained to make their own living, but are under supervision of the school even after entering community life. They still may not know how to manage money and other phases of normal living. There are some who marry and establish their own families. Parents visit their children once a month, the speaker related. She added that several state legislators had also visited the home this month.

The institution includes 630 acres of land. Mrs. Minear described the setting as rural, with many knolls and trees and an expanse of farm land.

The local extension women had as their afternoon program a project on landscaping given by Mrs. Clifton Childers and Mrs. John Byrne, who advised on size of shrubs to use near a house and listed many varieties for general planting.

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Thespians To Represent West Coast at Conference

Medford High School troupe of the National Thespians society has been invited to represent the West Coast at the 1962 national conference of the society. It will be held at the University of Indiana during the week of June 25 that year.

The invitation was extended during the Oregon High School drama conference held February 3-4 at the University of Oregon, Eugene. Leon Miller, secretary-treasurer of the National Thespians society, was present for the conference and after watching Troupe 358 from Medford present "A Sunny Morning" during a one-act play demonstration in the University theater, extended the invitation.

Medford High school is one of seven schools throughout the nation to be asked by Mr. Miller to present demonstrations at the conference. About a thousand delegates customarily attend the national conferences, it was stated.

Representing Medford High school at the Eugene conference were Linda Jo Waltermire, Beverly Gebhard, Margie Childers, Nola Robbins, Jim Douglass and Mark Goodman. Miss Gebhard and young Goodman were finalists in the acting competition, with the

latter placing second in the men's acting competition.

While in Eugene the Medford group saw the university production of Graham Greene's "The Potting Shed" and a demonstration by Portland university of scenes from O'Neill's "The Great God Brown."

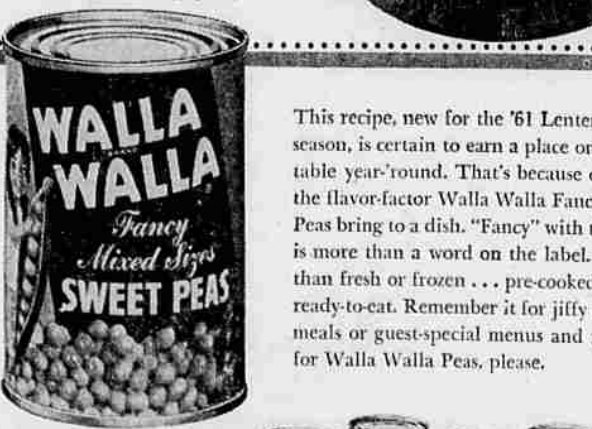
