

## Laos Situation Discussed by SEATO

Bangkok, Thailand—(UPI)—The Southeast Asia Treaty Organization Council of Representatives discussed the Laos situation again today but came to no decision regarding possible action by the alliance.

The council has been discussing the Laotian crisis off and on for several weeks without making any move to intervene.

Laos is not a member of SEATO, but it falls within the protective umbrella of the defense alliance made up of the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Thailand and the Philippines.
