

Special Program To Step Up America's Campaign Against Fidel Castro

Teachers Will Be Students at Oregon At Summer Institute

Eugene - Junior high and high school teachers of the natural sciences will be students this summer in the University of Oregon's Summer Institute in the Natural Sciences.

The institute, from June 19 to Aug. 12, is planned especially for teachers of biology, chemistry, physics, and natural sciences. It is sponsored by the National Science Foundation through the University of Oregon.

Participants will be limited to 70-100 in the geology program, and 20 each in the other three fields of biology, chemistry, and physics. Each participant will receive a stipend of \$800 for the eight-week session, plus \$120 per dependent and travel expenses.

In biology, field laboratory methodology will be emphasized. Recent advances in biology and field botany will be secondary phases of study.

The study course in chemistry will be divided into lectures and work in design and development of high school laboratory equipment.

The physics program will include a lecture sequence

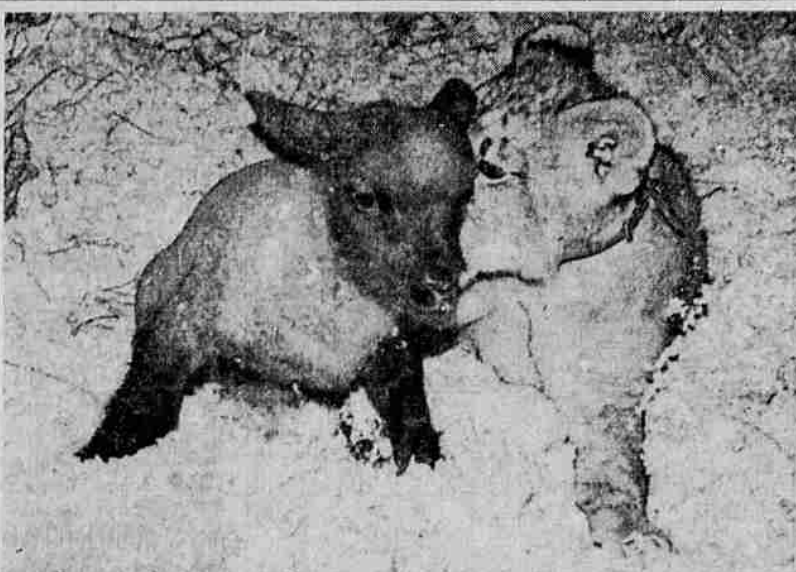
concerning physical principles, including problem-solving and reading assignments, demonstrations by instructors on laboratory and class techniques, and construction of instruments.

On the faculty for the institute will be: biology, James Kezer, associate professor of biology; geology, Ernest H. Lund, associate professor of geology; physics, John L. Powell, head of the physics department; and for chemistry, Floyd Reese, associate professor of chemistry, Chico State college.

Teachers interested in the institute should apply to director, Summer Institute for Science Teachers, department of biology, University of Oregon, Eugene. Deadline for applications is Feb. 15. Applications must be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the applicant's immediate supervisor stating the applicant's aptitudes for the institute. Notification of award of stipends will be made by March 15.

Duncan Works Out Free Medical Deal For House Members

Statehouse, Salem (Special) - Free medical services for members of the Oregon House of Representatives will be provided by Salem area doctors this session.

The unprecedented arrangement was worked out this week by House Speaker Robert B. Duncan (D-Medford) and Dr. Richard Upjohn, president of the Marion-Polk Medical Society.

This action will save Oregon taxpayers at least \$1,000 this session.

Medicare for ailing lawmakers has cost taxpayers \$3,000 for the past three sessions of the Legislative Assembly.

The Senate this year, under President Harry Bolvin (D-Klamath Falls) will continue its long-standing practice of paying one doctor a per diem fee basis. His fee this session is \$10 per day (\$1,000 for a 100-day session).

Dr. Ralph Purvine of the Salem Clinic has served as the "family physician" for Oregon legislatures since 1947 and continues to serve the Senate in 1961.

Total Increases

The cost of medical service has gone up year after year. In the 1955 session, Dr. Purvine was paid at the rate of \$250 from the House and \$250 from the Senate for a total of \$500 for the session. In 1957, the total was \$1,000. In 1959, the total was \$1,500.

This year, Speaker Duncan, who has been trying to save taxpayers' money on legislative expenses wherever he could, found another way to look after the health of House members.

"Recognizing the financial sacrifice many legislators must make in serving their state, the doctors expressed a willingness to make a contribution of their professional services, just as the Oregon State Bar Association has done in providing a staff of attorneys to assist lawmakers at no cost to the taxpayers, and as the Ministerial Association has done in providing clergymen to open each day's session with prayer," Duncan said.

List Provided

The Medical Society has given the Speaker a list of doctors who may be called whenever any of the House members need medical attention.

Duncan said he was grateful for "this fine expression of public service by the medical profession."

The new arrangement in the House will not only save taxpayers' money, but also doctor's time.

Traditionally, for more than a decade, Dr. Purvine has been appearing with his little black bag on the floor of the House and Senate daily to consult with a legislator (and, sometimes, with secretaries) who might not feel very well.

But on many days there would be nobody sick, although the doctor would be on call for emergencies.

(Lawmakers' families did not get "free" care, but often would be treated as private patients of the Salem Clinic of which Dr. Purvine is one of several staff doctors. Through his frequent contacts with legislators at the Statehouse, and his traditional dinners and teas for legislators and their wives at his home, Dr. Purvine has become well-acquainted with many of the state's political leaders.)

State Bar Service

Free professional service

by the Oregon State Bar, noted by Speaker Duncan, works like this:

The Bar Association maintains an office in the Statehouse staffed by lawyers who are assigned by the Bar to serve two weeks each. The Bar provides these attorneys with room and board while they are in Salem, but the lawyers don't get paid for their service to the Legislature, which consists mainly of assistance and advice in drafting bills.

Lawyers figure that the experience and professional and personal contacts gained while working at the Statehouse make the free service well worthwhile. Marion-Polk county physicians offering their free services to House members may feel equally well-rewarded.

Undergraduate Research Program Set at U of O

Eugene—An \$111,915 undergraduate research program in eight departments of the college of liberal arts will start this summer under grants from the National Science Foundation.

Announcement of the NSF Undergraduate Research Participation Program for 1961-62 points up the fact that of the 14 grants totalling \$151,325, given to five Oregon colleges and universities, the University of Oregon received eight of the grants totalling \$111,915.

The undergraduate research program is designed to give capable undergraduate students the opportunity to work in advanced research projects under faculty, thus widening their understanding and ability in scientific investigative methods.

Contribute to Education

Under the belief that such research experience with faculty direction can contribute greatly to the science education of undergraduates, NSF has made 357 grants totalling \$3.2 million dollars during the

Voice of America Will Send Story All Over World

Washington - (UPI) - The United States is stepping up its anti-Castro propaganda campaign in Latin America and the rest of the world.

Next week the voice of America will broadcast a special one hour documentary on the Cuban premier, entitled "The Anatomy of a Broken Promise."

The U. S. Information Agency said this documentary "is part of a major USIA effort to intensify its world-wide reporting of the Cuban refugee situation, and particularly to get the story into all parts of Latin America."

It said that after the special broadcast, the voice of America's Latin American service will begin airing "a series of interviews in Spanish with refugee Cuban teachers, doctors, newspapermen, artisans, laborers, agricultural workers, small businessmen, and others who will tell why they fled their homeland under the Castro regime."

President Kennedy was asked at his news conference last week what steps the United States was planning to take to counteract Castro propaganda. He replied that "we are giving the matter of Cuba and its export of the revolution throughout Latin America high priority."

"The Anatomy of a Broken Promise" was recorded in Miami, Washington and New York. In it, USIA said "Cuban refugees trace Fidel Castro's rise to power and tell why they turned against him."

Broken Promises Told
According to the USIA, the bulk of the program tells how Castro broke his promises of free elections, freedom of the press, democratization of labor, non-intervention of any kind from any nation in the internal affairs of Cuba, and the attainment of opportunities for the people.

The program will be beamed in English to the Caribbean and Central and South

America at 8:15 p.m. EST on Saturday, Feb. 25. The Spanish version will be broadcast twice the next day.

The week end broadcast hours were chosen to obtain maximum listenership. Latin American listeners will be alerted that the program is coming by means of week long announcements included in voice of America English and Spanish programs.

Going To Other Areas

Later the program will be beamed in English to other areas of the world. The Spanish version also will be recorded and sent to USIA posts abroad.

The program's participants include Dr. Andres Valdespino, former professor of law at the University of Havana and undersecretary of the Cuban treasury; Sergio Rojas Santamaria, former Cuban

ambassador to Great Britain; Dr. Teresa Casuso, former Cuban delegate to the United Nations; Amadeo Barletta Jr., association publisher of El Mundo in exile, and Ulysses Carbo, associate publisher of La Prensa Libre.

Others are Jules Dubois, Latin American bureau chief of the Chicago Tribune, and James C. Buchanan of the Miami Herald.
