Pullman Says Welfare Commission Doing Good Job, Improvements Made

The state public welfare commission is doing a good job, has made a number of specific improvements, but more can be made, James Pullman, Jackson county public welfare director, told a joint meeting of the legislative interim committee on welfare and the house state and national affairs committee.

Pullman listed as commission accomplishments: (1) manual material on rules and regulations clarified, (2) personnel has improved in quality and salaries are better, (3) communication with the state commission is improved, (4) many administrative procedures are improved and simpler, (5) counties now have essential responsibility for casework services, (6) office buildings for many counties have been improved, (7) staff morale is considerably better, (8) staff has been encouraged to recommend improvement or changes, (9) the medical program is a great improvement, (10) considerable encouragement given to county personnel to work toward self help and rehabilitation of recipient, and (11) use of an IBM machine.

"No one on earth could administer this program without a certain number of persons trying to obtain assistance fraudulently. However the definition of abuses is so ambiguous that to each of us it may mean different things. In most cases it does not mean obtaining public assistance illegally or that the staff has been negligent."

Probation Revoked On Gold Hill Youth

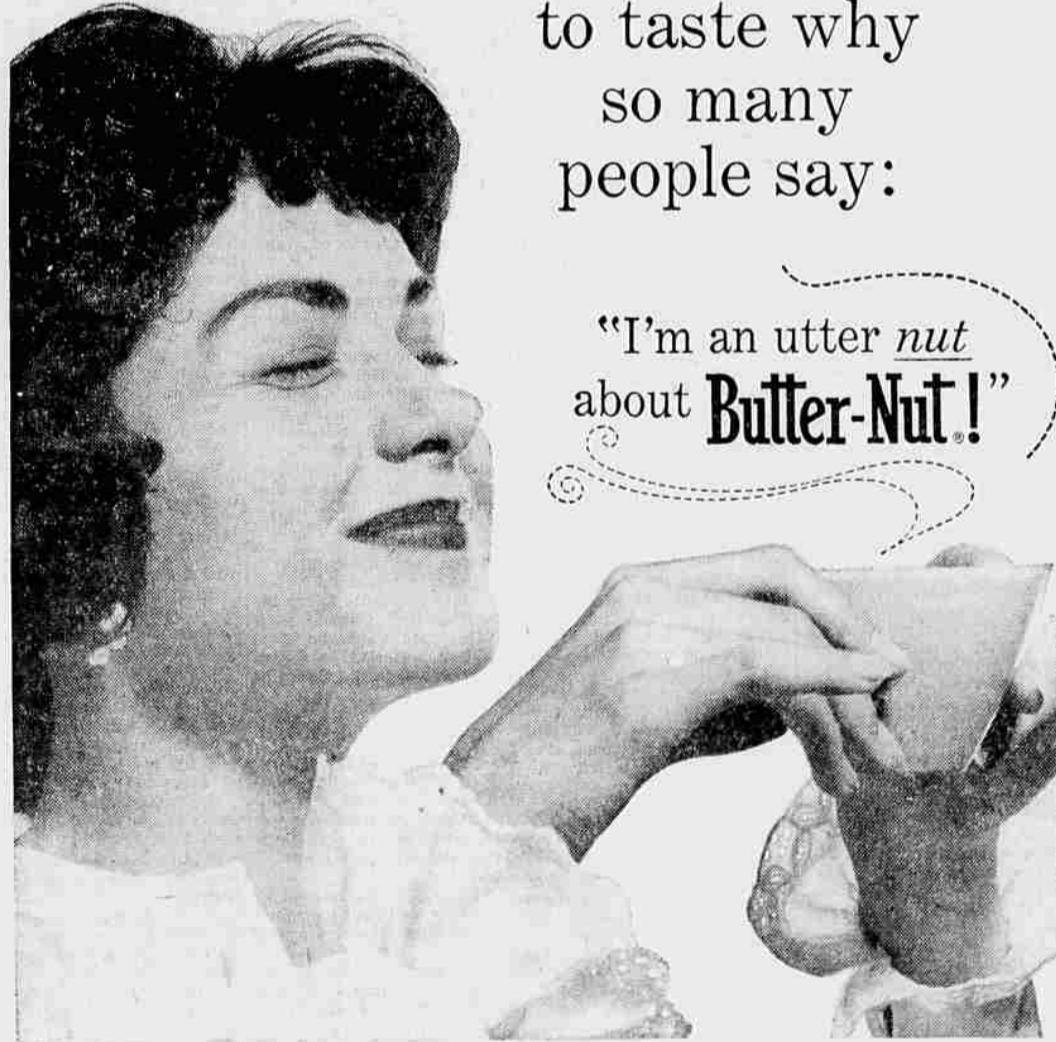
