Religious Emphasis Week Set at College

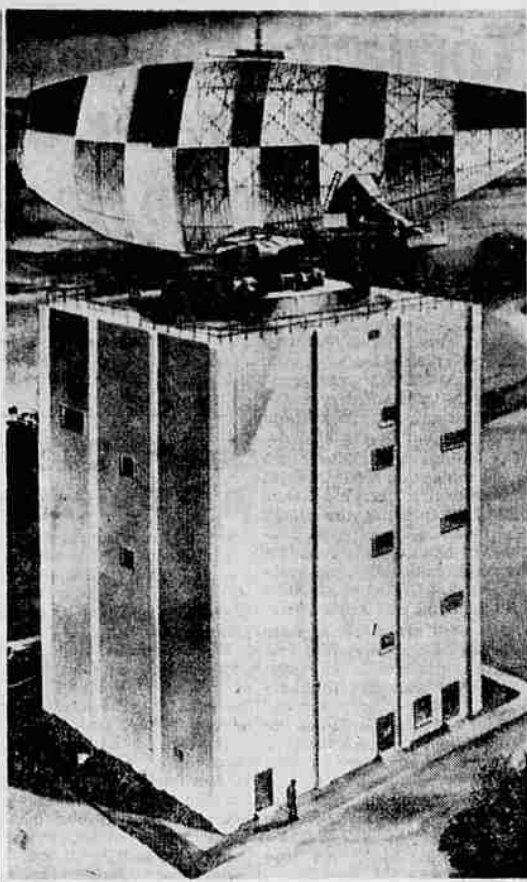

Major Land Conservation Policy Covers Federal Ownership Transfers

Portland - Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall has announced approval of a major land conservation policy to be administered by the department's bureau of land management. The policy statement sets up a "Public Interest Test" for all transfers of land out of federal ownership.

According to the policy statement, lands which cannot properly be developed under existing public land laws will be retained in federal ownership until the necessary laws can be enacted. The Department will no longer continue to try to force present-day land needs in the unworkable straight jacket of out-dated laws. Proposed legislation to meet present and future needs will be submitted to the Congress in the near future, the Secretary said.

Forbids Classifications

The policy statement also bars marginal agricultural developments on public lands by forbidding agricultural classifications under the land laws when the lands are more valuable for other uses or when such classifications would not be consistent with national agricultural policy.

In addition, the land conservation policy statement affirms the department's position that "the government must receive a full return for its property in terms of money or other values. No party to a transaction with the government should receive a windfall." The Secretary said he had directed Director Karl S. Landstrom of the bureau of land management to set up procedures to insure the full implementation of the policy statement, including procedures to determine that the government will in fact receive full value for public lands and that the "disposition or lease of public lands made pursuant to the public land laws must meet the test of serving the public interest."

The policy statement broadens and supersedes a more limited statement on anti-speculation policies issued Feb. 8 and 23, 1960.

Conservation Policies

A copy of the policy statement follows:

Land conservation policies of the Department of the Interior with respect to land classifications and dispositions by the bureau of land management.

1. The government must receive a full return for its property in terms of money or other values. No party to a transaction with the government should receive a windfall. To the extent that the law permits and in the absence of a binding contract, (a) no transaction will be entered into by the bureau of land management where it is not clearly shown by competent evidence that the government will receive full value and (b) no transaction will be consummated where, in the course of processing, evidence develops that the government will not receive full value.

2. Private exchanges will not be entertained or consummated except where it is shown that there are compelling reasons to acquire the offered lands to augment long-range federal resource management programs. Leases, sales or other dispositions of public lands will not be made unless the lease or disposition will serve a sound public purpose, including the satisfaction of bona fide needs of the general economy and improving the administration of the public lands. Leases, sales and other dispositions of public lands will not be made when they would encourage or promote speculation in public lands.

3. Public lands which are marginal for agriculture or which are more valuable for uses other than agriculture or which under national agricultural policy would not be found proper to be reduced to cultivation will not be classified for entry under the public land agricultural development laws.

4. Lands which cannot properly be developed under existing public land laws, taking into consideration such things as full return for the lands, requirements of state, county and other local agencies, and the needs of the local economy will, wherever feasible, be retained in federal ownership, pending the enactment of appropriate legislation.

To Establish Procedures

5. The director, bureau of land management, will establish procedures which will insure the full implementation of these anti-speculation policies. Among other things, he will institute procedures to determine, at the time or times just prior to the actions whereby commitments would be made, that positive and convincing evidence exists that the government will receive full value from the transaction under consideration and that discretionary actions leading to disposition or lease of public lands made pursuant to the public land laws will meet the test of serving the public interest.

Ullman Urges Stand By Udall in Snake River Power Dispute

Washington (Special) - Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) has laid down a set of basic principles on which he has urged Interior Secretary Stewart Udall to take a stand on the Snake river power dispute.

A strong public power advocate, Congressman Ullman is taking a more active role in discussions with the Kennedy Administration over resource policy than any other member of the Oregon congressional delegation.

Ullman has not suggested whether Nez Perce dam or Mountain Sheep dam, or some other development scheme, should be the project supported by the Interior Department, he said, but he has recommended that the decision rest on these principles:

1. The public interest be fully protected by the most full and comprehensive development of this portion of the middle Snake river.

2. That the project be fully integrated and coordinated in its operation with the other large hydroelectric dams in the Columbia basin.

3. That there be no support for the idea of paying local utilities for any downstream benefits that might accrue in federal dams by reason of upstream storage projects.

4. That fish be adequately taken care of.

Legislative Briefs

Salem - UP - Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney (D-Portland) put in a bill Thursday that would require bars in bowling alleys and other athletic establishments to have separate entrances.

He said this would further protect minors, many of whom frequent bowling alleys.

Mahoney also introduced a bill providing collective bargaining for county employees.

Salem - UP - A bill introduced Thursday in the Oregon Senate would prohibit any diversion of Milton creek waters in Columbia county for any use.

The measure, SB442, was requested by the City of St. Helens and put in by Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, (D-Portland).

The bill would not prevent condemnation of land for such things as parks.

Salem - UP - Certain families with heavy medical expenses could have their bills paid for by state welfare under a bill in the Senate Thursday.

This would apply to those not already on welfare. Sen.

Carl Francis (R-Dayton) is the sponsor.

The State Welfare Commission would get \$500,000 to start the program and another \$100,000 would be established as a revolving "catastrophic illness and injury fund" under the secretary of state.

Families would pay the money back when they got on their feet financially.

Salem - UP - A bill to bring state boating regulations more into conformity with Coast Guard small boat rules has been approved by the House Fish and Game Committee.

The committee amended the bill to add greater protection from damage charges for boats pulling water skiers.

Salem - UP - A bill authorizing the Department of Geology's governing board to hold hearings and grant applications for oil and gas well drilling was introduced Thursday in the House.

It was requested by the department.

Another bill would authorize the public utility commissioner to issue standards for setting rates on different types of motor carriers.
