Back Stairs: Respect for President

Washington — UPI — Back stairs at the White House:

The public, it seems, is highly sensitive about respect for President Kennedy and his family. The mail on this subject has been only short of amazing since the inauguration.

Radio and television commentators, columnists and reporters in general have been receiving torrents of letters about the Chief Executive. The general tone of this most unusual public response is that Kennedy is entitled to more courtesy than he is receiving.

Regarded Flippantly

Possibly this is a manifestation of public concern related to the youthfulness of the first family and the possibility of their being regarded somewhat flippantly. Some of the concern also has to do with the President's news conferences in which the public, via live television, is seeing for the first time the rather curiously American antic of 20 or 30 correspondents on their feet shouting simultaneously in an effort to get the President's recognition.

Numerous Americans did not like quick commercialization of the so-called "Jacqueline Look" and so expressed themselves. It might be said, to that the President, himself, thought a well-known New York store had gone a

bit far in using an unmistakable pen-and-ink sketch of his wife to advertise pillbox hats, a style which she undoubtedly has helped push to the fashion forefront.

No Respect for JFK?

Hark to M. McFarland who writes from French Lick, Ind.:

"I did not think that Kennedy was the right man to be put in as President of the USA, but he was. What I would like to know is why he is not honored and looked up to now that he is the President, instead of lowered in the eyes of all the people by making dress model images of him and his wife . . . and having them in store windows along with Mickey Mouse, Popeye and bathing beauties?"

Any merchant in French Lick who invested in Kennedy mannequins probably will hear directly from M. McFarland.

Dale E. Leber, social studies teacher in Lancaster, Pa., writes:

"I was appalled at the lack of respect accorded President Kennedy by some (not all) of the reporters at Tuesday's live TV coverage."

From Homestead, Fla., an unsigned but nonetheless pointed observation: "Such disgusting, stupid, ill-mannered conduct (because there was general laughter at one point during a televised conference) . . . It would be a good idea if you men would be more

courteous and respectful to the President instead of yawning, sitting sleepy-eyed and inattentive and with eyes closed."

Newsmen Called Rude

Thomas Farrell of Philadelphia, Pa., writes: "I was shocked at the lack of manners among many of the newsmen as they submitted their questions to the Chief Executive."

An unsigned note from Dallas, Tex.: "I don't think it is properly polite the way the reporters jump up and yell at the President time after time. I'll bet they didn't do this with other Presidents."

Not necessarily in defense of anyone, but the facts are these: There is nothing new about the manner in which reporters seek the President's recognition at news conferences. This has been going on for years. The public, however, is seeing it for the first time and somebody gets the idea that bidding vociferously for his attention is something peculiar to this administration. The public may rest assured that the President, himself, understands the situation and takes no offense whatever.

And as for the correspondents, this word: You're on television now and this business of coming to work sleepy-eyed must stop. No matter if you've heard the same question — and answer — a dozen times, look attentive.

SOC Institute Has 1,200 Applications

Ashland — Twelve hundred requests for application forms have been received and filled for the Summer Institute for General Science Teachers at Southern Oregon college, according to Dr. Irene Hollenbeck, associate professor of science.

One hundred and ten application forms have been returned, and it is anticipated that another 300 will be received. A committee composed of Dr. Clarence Diebel, Southern Oregon college professor of science, Dr. Elliot MacCracken, chairman of the science-mathematics division, Dr. Betty Lou Dunlop, associate professor of education, and Dr. Irene Hollenbeck, the summer institute director, will select 50 of the applicants as participants, and list another 50 as alternates.

Preference will be given to those teachers who have had the least training in science and who have shown by means of an independent study proposal that they have a clear idea of their teaching needs.

Successful applicants will be notified between March 5 and 15, and have until April 1 to decline.

The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, three editors and a women's editor. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors. (Copyright 1961—General Features Corp.)

Mrs. T. E. — The doctor says my husband can return to his job.

Mr. L. W. — Suppose he gets another heart attack?

Mrs. T. E. — A few months ago my husband had a coronary attack. He's been under treatment, following the doctor's orders carefully, and is looking forward to returning to his job as a timekeeper in a baking plant.

To pave the way, I called on Mr. W., who's the personnel manager. He's a bit hesitant and says he has to talk over the advisability of re-hiring my husband with a few people first.

I know it would be a terrible blow to Todd not to get his job back. The doctor has impressed him with the importance of continuing his work, which is sedentary and not too great a strain. Of course, if he'd been a coal-heaver he'd have to train for something else. But we're sure he can give full satisfaction again at the same desk as before.

These weeks have made him smarter about taking care of himself, too, so there'll be no more absences, we hope.

Mr. L. W. — I wish I could just say, "Of course, Let Todd start Monday." To Mrs. E. But it's not as simple as that.

I have to clear matters with the union and the insurance company, first. We'll have to study the medical picture, and be pretty certain about Todd's future health, and his regular attendance.

Up to now we haven't employed any known cardiacs. Most of the positions here are too strenuous. And many of them involve the safety of others, with which we can't take any chances. A sudden heart attack of a machine-

operator could cause a serious accident.

We've been approached before by the local Heart Association's Placement Center to reserve a few openings for heart patients. But the officials here haven't decided on a company policy about it.

Todd's case, however, is different. He's one of our own and we'll make an individual ruling about him.

The Council: Fortunately for Mr. and Mrs. E., reports and statistics pile up to bolster the arguments for employing cardiac patients in jobs which do not demand unusual physical exertion. Here are a few fresh facts for Mr. W. to present to the men he must consult on the question.

When Todd's doctor told him he could return to work, the physician was outlining what is becoming s.o.p. (standard operational procedure) for members of the Coronary Club. And of all the patients who take regular jobs, it has been found that 7 out of 10 go back to their original one and make eminently good at it.

While the rewards of this trend are obvious from the emotional and morale angles, there are hard-cash returns, too, for all concerned. Todd's union, for example, might rather have him earning a salary than drawing upon union welfare funds. Similarly, the insurance companies and the employer who must tote up compensation costs. And, most important, the cardiac worker has proven himself a more productive worker than the average.

A study was made of 2000 cardiacs placed in positions in New York, to see whether they caused disability payments, under the Workmen's Compensation laws, to go up. Over a period of several years

Oregon Public Lands Affected

Portland — UPI — Approximately 16 million acres of Oregon land are affected by two major changes in the handling of public lands announced by Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall.

One of the changes is establishment of an 18-month moratorium on most types of non-mineral applications and petitions for public lands. Applications already filed are not affected.

Udall said the suspension of applications and petitions will permit the department to review the land management picture, eliminate a backlog of 60,000 applications and develop land management policies and programs.

The second change was approval of a major land conservation policy which sets up a "public interest test" for transfers of land from federal ownership.

Washington — More than 85 per cent of all the churches in the U.S. have Sunday schools. Their estimated enrollment is now about 30 million.

Mr. W. can rest assured that work, for Todd, will not precipitate another attack. In fact work, say the doctors, does not produce heart disease which comes, rather, from a pre-existing arteriosclerosis. Actually there's less chance of an attack for Todd than for the hundreds of "well" employees who think they're in top shape and overstrain.

Yes, Mrs. E., — the news on hearts is heartening.
