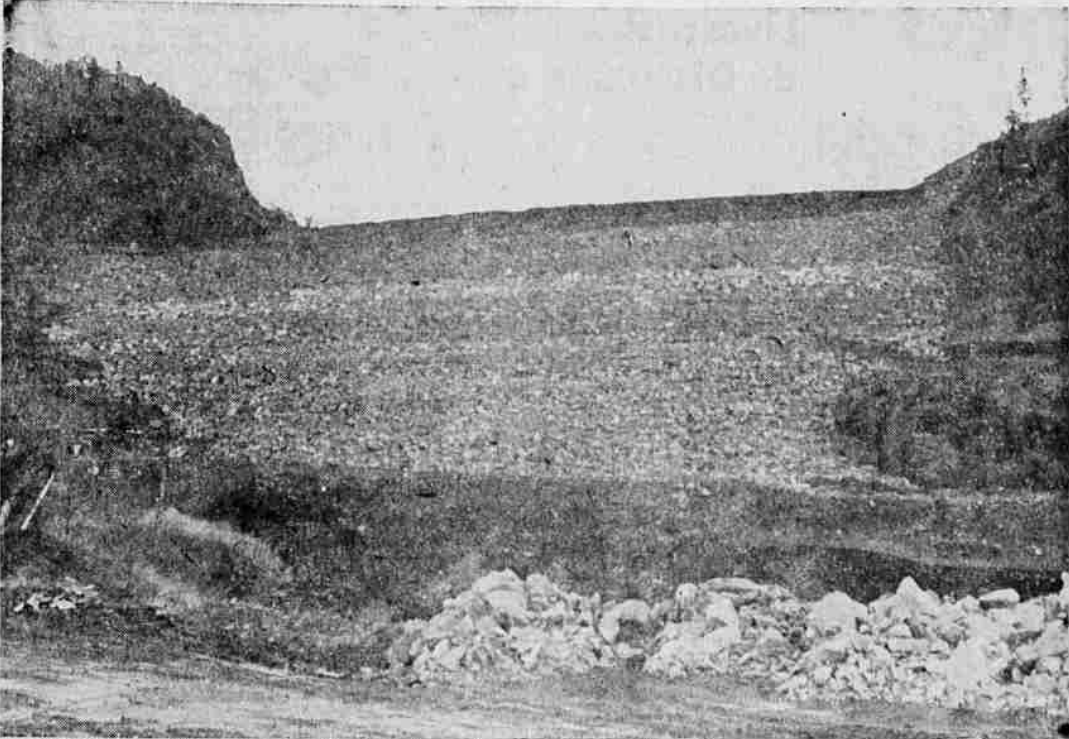


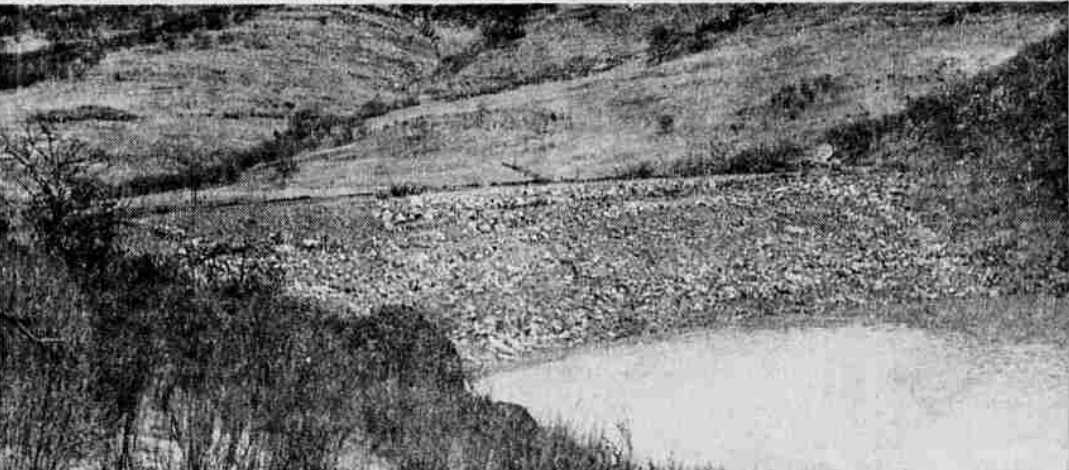
Pictures Show Rock Work on Face of Dam, Dike



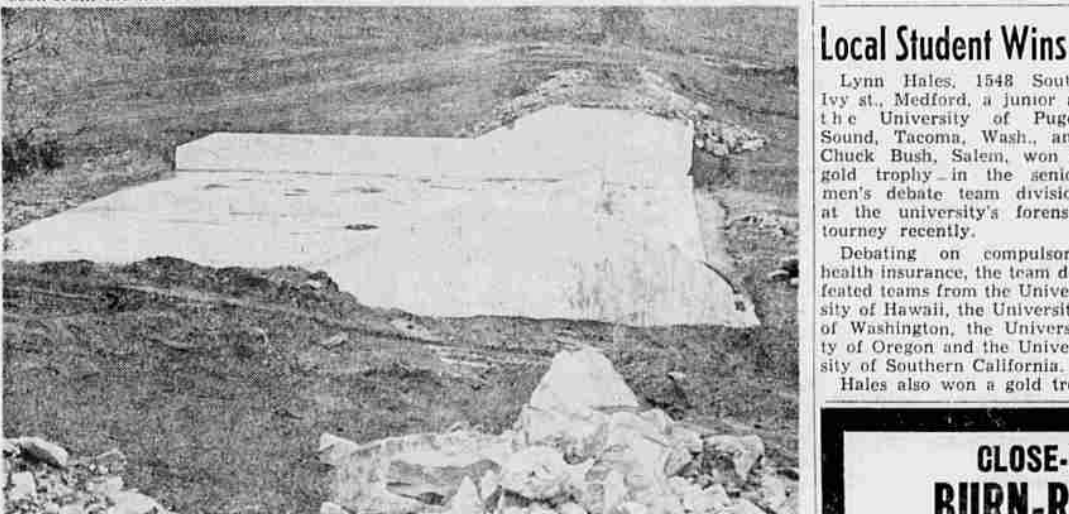
OUTER FACE — The outer face of the dam, shown above, faces approximately north. Although it looks steep because of foreshortening in the photo, it actually has a fairly gradual slope, as shown in diagram elsewhere on this page.



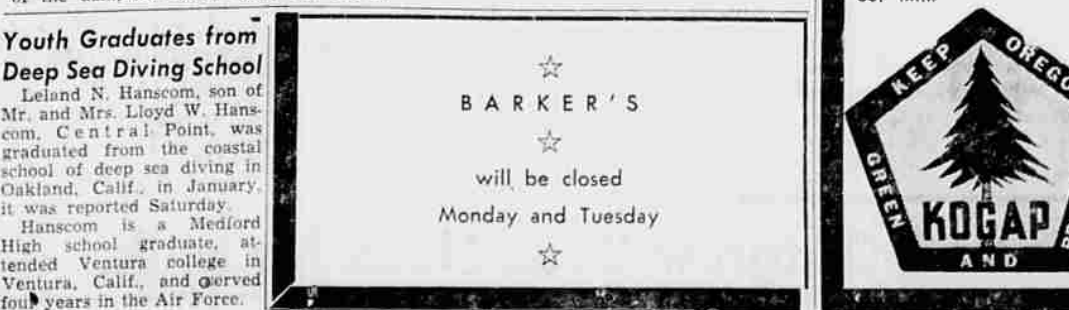
The concrete outflow works, connecting with a tunnel under hill abutment at left, can be seen dimly behind trees in lower left of picture.



HIGHWAY SADDLE DIKE — The dike shown above is in the saddle through which the Green Springs highway used to run before it was relocated (a portion is visible at right of dike), and is near the spot on the lake formerly most used for recreational purposes. Though smaller, it is of a type of construction identical to that used in Emigrant dam.



GENERAL VIEW — A general view of Emigrant dam, seen from the hill southwest of the structure and south of the west abutment, is shown above. The water level here is somewhat higher than the maximum pool with the old dam.



RESERVOIR SPILLWAY — Shown above is the concrete spillway, located about a quarter-mile away from Emigrant dam. It is 150 feet wide, and can carry 11,300 cubic feet of water per second, more than flows into the lake most of the time. It is 12 feet below the crest of the dam, and will thus keep the water level that far below the top of the dam, no matter what the circumstances. A concrete tunnel which can carry an additional 700 cubic feet per second could supplement this if necessary. The spillway is near the boat launching ramp, out of the picture to the right. When completed, earth-fill will be placed between the rock in the foreground and the slanted marks on the side of the concrete spillway.



ROCK SURFACING — The outer surface of the dam, shown above, is nearing completion, with a heavy coating of rocks and boulders. Equipment on access road at left, located below the crest of the dam, is finishing the job, which is expected to be completed within next few weeks. Much of the material for the dam was taken from the borrow pit seen far below; the rest of it was obtained from nearby clay-type areas.

Many Offenses in Vagrancy Charge

A wide range of offenses are included in one of Medford's ordinances, Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin said today.

The charge of "vagrancy" includes a number of activities, Chief Champlin explained that many persons think of a vagrant only in terms of Webster's definition: "One who strolls from place to place; an idle wanderer; one who has no settled habitation."

The city ordinance (Code number 5-260) concerning vagrancy covers such acts as begging, associating with known thieves, being out during late and unusual hours, prostitution, possessing tools or other articles which might be used to commit a felony, possessing stolen articles, being without visible means of livelihood, lodging in any place other than places which are kept for lodging purposes without permission of the owner, and living in or about a disorderly house.
