Claude Haggard, director of safety for Oregon California Power company, and his son, Merrill, demonstrated electrical safety do's and don'ts to approximately 100 Girl Scouts and their leaders Saturday, February 11, at Hedrick Junior High school.

Gold Hill Family Visits Grandparents

Gold Hill—Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Netzel and children, Clayton, Sharon, and Carl Netzel were week end guests of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Devall at Crescent City, Calif.

Starting his program with a short history of electricity, beginning in ancient Egypt, he used replicas of the original equipment to demonstrate the development of man's greatest servant.

Describing and demonstrating static electricity he showed how it is generated, how much a person has in his body, and how it can cause an explosion if the right situation presented itself. He explained that this is the reason why nurses in the operating rooms of hospitals are not allowed to wear orlon or nylon uniforms or wear metal items while working, as they could cause a spark, setting off an explosion.

Mr. Haggard used a miniature set of buildings and power lines to demonstrate his safety discussions. Some of the things he showed the girls included a demonstration of how a crane boom could touch a power line and kill two men near it on the ground but leave the crane operator uninjured. He showed how a television antenna on a house could fall across the house power line and set the building on fire.

Extension Members Take Safety Training

Illinois Valley—Three area leaders of Home Extension units attended an all-day session on traffic safety recently in the American Legion hall in Cave Junction.

The area women were Mrs. Vernon Johnson, Cave Junction; Mrs. R. B. Breckenridge, O'Brien; and Mrs. Earl C. Strohmker, Der Creek.

Conducting the session were Mrs. Loy Cole, county safety chairman, and Mrs. Sue Houston, Grants Pass, county extension agent.

One of the things he stressed to the girls was how to fly a kite safely—stay away from power lines. He told the girls never to use a metallic string on their kites, it could be deadly if it touched a line; or a damp string, explaining that the moisture in the air can dampen a kite string. He emphasized to the girls that if they got their kite caught on a power line, to call Copco, as they would send someone to get it down—it might save a life.

Mr. Haggard told the girls that if they were in a car that hit a power pole, bringing a wire down on the car, if possible, until help arrived. He said that if there were danger of the car catching fire, to open the car door wide, and jump as far as possible. If they came upon such an accident they should not get close to the car, but try to rescue the people from a distance by pulling them out with a dry rope or piece of clothing.

Accidents in Home

Citing many case of electrical accident in the home, he said that the home is more dangerous, electrically, than the work done by linemen. He showed the girls the safety gloves and other safety equipment used by linemen and frayed cords, so often found in the home. He explained that the girls should be careful around plumbing, when working with electricity, plumbing being one of the

best conductors of electricity known. He told the girls of many cases where people were killed or injured seriously by being careless with electricity around damp or wet places in the home, especially in the bathroom.

He demonstrated how the northern lights are caused and showed slides of electrical burns and of downed power lines in Medford after a storm.

He also gave the girls information on how important electricity is in the atomic development and in the space age.

His last demonstration of the program was the closed chest heart massage, used to revive heart cases and shock victims.

Scout Selected For States Camp

It will be held in Ross, Ohio, August 16-29. The announcement of her appointment was made February 15, by Mrs. T. R. Lytle, acting president of the Rogue Valley Girl Scout Council, Inc.

Miss Stephenson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Stephenson, is a student at the Grants Pass High school. She has been active in Scouting for 11 years.

The Grants Pass girl is one of 100 Senior Girl Scouts from the 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Canal Zone who will attend the two-week conference. The girls who are expected to continue in Scouting for at least two more years are all between the ages of 15 and 19 years.

The purpose of the conference is to offer Seniors the opportunity to evaluate outdoor careers which make use of the knowledge and skills they have learned through the diversified Girl Scout program and its activities. These careers range from directing camps, supervising recreation, to working as geologists and soil scientists.

The conference program consists of an introduction to career opportunities in the out-of-doors, as well as study and field work in three main areas of exploration. These are recreation, camping and the earth sciences—astronomy, geology, meteorology, etc.

The University of Cincinnati is cooperating in this Girl Scout project which will take place at Camp Ross Trails, about 25 miles northwest of Cincinnati, Ohio.
