Clatsop County Program Helps Area's ADC Mothers

Portland — Helping mothers who come under the Aid to Dependent Children classification of public welfare recipients to learn to help themselves in adjustments as homemakers and active members of normal society, is a prime objective of the Oregon State Public Welfare commission.

Such a self-help program is being tried by the Clatsop County Public Welfare department, Astoria, under the direction of Mrs. Bertha Roth, Clatsop County Welfare administrator. These self-help programs are expected to eventually lighten the load of the welfare department both financially and for service of caseworkers.

Mrs. Roth is conducting the program in two ways: the first by having periodic meetings of the ADC Mothers to discuss their problems and benefit from the way in which they themselves are meeting family and financial crises. The second half is by having a staff member of the county department, on the mother's request, teach her housekeeping skills and household management, that she can better give her family the maximum benefits available with her limited income.

Speaker Describes Early Pack Trips

Yreka — Stories of early-day pack trips were told by James D. McNeill of Yreka when he recently spoke to the Siskiyou County Historical society at the museum.

Mr. McNeill's grandfather, James Abrams, was one of those who discovered gold on the South Fork of the Salmon river in 1849. It was about these old mining settlements now no longer in existence that Mr. McNeill spoke. They cover the area between Cecilville and Forks of the Salmon, Calif.

The speaker took his audience on a trip starting from the old town of South Fork on the Scott river, down the Salmon river past Shadows creek. This creek was named after Mr. Shaddock, who operated a trading post at the mouth of the creek. The "trip" continued through Cecilville, Brown's Post at the mouth of Plummer creek, Yreka; past the old mines at Starveout Bar, Graham Gulch, Nigger hill and Red hill mines to the Forks of Salmon, the end of the trip.

About \$30,000 in gold was taken from one pocket on a tributary to the South Fork of the Salmon, the speaker said. From the 1880's to 1880's, Bill Bennett operated a hotel, store and post office at the Forks of the Salmon.

President Wayne Ralston conducted the business meeting. It was reported by the co-editors of the Society's publication that plans are progressing on the next issue of the "Siskiyou Pioneer."
