Miami Beach, Fla. —UPI— Ingemar Johansson is the greatest right hand puncher I ever have fought. And anybody fighting him has to respect that wallop or risk the consequences.

I made such a mistake in our first fight, when he knocked me out in the third round. I profited by respecting him in the second fight and knocked him out in the fifth round.

Dark, Houk Show They Boss Clubs

Ralph Houk and Alvin Dark, a pair of "on the spot" first-year managers, are waiting no time letting the New York Yankees and San Francisco Giants know that new bosses are calling the shots.

The training season hasn't even officially started but both Houk and Dark already have introduced ideas that represent a complete departure from the tactics of Casey Stengel and Bill Rigney, their predecessors.

Houk, faced with the problem of living up to Stengel's record of 10 American league championships in 12 years, is speeding up the conditioning of Yankee pitchers. He wants two or three of them to have pitched nine innings by opening day — something Stengel never bothered about — and he has coach Johnny Sain already pressing his hurlers to work as often as possible off the mound.

To Rest Willie
Dark, who the Giants hope will make San Francisco fans forget the bitter disappointments of 1960, announced the new ideas when the Giants opened their Phoenix, Ariz., camp Wednesday. He plans to rest Willie Mays at intervals during the season and he is going to experiment with outfielder Felipe Alou as a third baseman.

The Los Angeles Dodgers, who are never without a spring hero, came up with a 1961 edition in Dick Nen, a 20-year-old rookie from Wilmington, Calif., who hit several 450-foot drives during Wednesday's workout. Manager Walt Alston announced the Dodgers will play their first intrasquad game on Sunday.

The Baltimore Orioles staged an intra-squad game at Miami, Fla., and found the offerings of "Iron Mike" very much to their liking as Milt Pappas and Dave Nicholson each hit two homers and Jerry Walker, Art Quirk and Billy Hoefft also connected for round-trippers. LA Angeles Open First Spring Training Friday

The Angels, one of the American league's two new clubs, go into camp with 34 men on their own roster, three free agents and three men signed to their Dallas-Fort Worth farm club roster.

With the club having been stocked through a draft of players from the other American league teams, Rigney's squad was predominantly a veteran group.

The average age of the men on the regular squad is 26.9 years with the 14 pitchers averaging 25.5 years, the catchers 29.5 years, the infielders 27.9 and the outfielders 27.8.

Manager Alvin Dark held his first workout as a major league pilot Wednesday with only 16 Giants on hand. The roll call has been cut by the airline strike, but almost all of the missing players have messaged that they are on their way.

Stars of Wednesday's 90 minute session were big Willie McCovey and catcher Tom Haller. Both belted the ball over the fence with consistency.

The 205-pound McCovey has reported to camp some 30 pounds lighter than he was last spring. Haller is a 210-pound left hander conceded a real chance of sticking with the Giants this year if he can overcome his problems hitting a curve.

Included in PSC's list of victims this season are the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, Washington State university, Central Washington, and Oregon College of Education, the defending District 2 NAIA team champion.

Westcott's grapplers whitewashed the OCE Wolves, considered to be PSC's toughest foe in the District 2 meet, by a 26-0 count in dual match activity. The Vikings also hold a 36-0 win over Southern Oregon and 24-7 and 29-3 victories over Lewis and Clark, both scheduled to enter the NAIA test.
